

Adlai Stevenson May Address Demo Convention

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., May 13 (AP)—Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson, boomed as a "draft" candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, may make a welcoming speech to the party's national convention, it was learned Tuesday.

Stevenson, who returned to his desk here after a 12-day trip to the West Coast, discussed the possibility of making a speech to the convention in Chicago July 21 with National Committeeman Jacob M. Arvey in Chicago Monday.

The governor asked Arvey, who has been trying to push the Stevenson for President bandwagon, whether it was the custom for the host governor to welcome the convention. No decision was made at once.

Stevenson, who has said he "could not accept" the presidential nomination, continues to sidestep the question of whether he'd accept a draft. When a reporter asked him the question Monday, Stevenson replied by handing him a couplet which said:

"The more I see of this awful mess,
The more I want to be president less."

Jackpot Winner \$102,000 Richer

NENANA, Alaska, May 13 (AP)—The Tanana River ice pack broke up at 5:04 p.m. (Alaska time) Monday and Charles E. Montjoy, of Juneau, was the sole winner of the \$102,000 jackpot, largest in the 36-year history of the famed ice pool.

Montjoy, a supervisor for the Alaskan Native Service, was the only ticket-holder to guess the exact time the ice would begin to move on the river at this Central Alaska community.

Three hundred persons, the entire population of the village, cheered as the ice broke up with a mighty roar to herald the coming of spring to the Territory. It was the unofficial signal for riverboats to begin moving supplies to winter-bound native villages.

Montjoy's winnings represented a "one-in-a-million" guess. In recent years the Tanana pool has grown so popular that as many as a dozen persons had picked the winning minute. Some persons handed together as corporations in order to increase the individual's chances and cut down the share paid to Uncle Sam for income taxes.

POW Action Seen As Part of Plan

HONOLULU, May 13 (AP)—Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway charged Monday night that the actions of Communist war prisoners on Kojima Island are part of a "Communist general plan" to sabotage the United Nations.

Ridgway made his statement at a press conference here on his way to succeed Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower as supreme commander of the North Atlantic Treaty forces.

He said he placed "great significance on the Kojima prison riots as part of a Communist general plan and intent to cause maximum worldwide embarrassment and destruction of the U. N. through public opinion," but he added:

"While the Communists will do their utmost to exploit this opportunity, the U. N. has fully recognized its responsibility to God and man in its handling of prisoners."

McKay, Langlie In Washington

OLYMPIA, May 13 (AP)—Gov. Arthur Langlie was scheduled to appear before the Senate Appropriations committee Wednesday to ask that cuts in the federal budget for power dams now under construction on the Columbia river be restored.

The cuts were made by a house committee recently.

"The reductions mean that power from dams now under construction will be delayed seriously at a time when the northwest is feeling the pinch of the power shortage more and more," Langlie said Monday.

The reduced appropriations eliminated The Dalles dam project from this year's budget and cut deeply into appropriations for the McNary, Chief Joseph and Albeni Falls dams, he said.

Gov. Douglas McKay of Oregon also will be in the nation's capital to try and convince lawmakers that money should be restored. McKay will return Friday night.

JETS NEED PARTS

Sen. Robert Taft Hopes to Lengthen Lead With Win in West Virginia Primary Today

WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP)—Sen. Robert A. Taft banked on the West Virginia primary Tuesday to lengthen his lead in the Republican delegate race and offset a minor loss in Monday's contests.

Supporters of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, Taft's chief rival for the GOP presidential nomination, hoped to salvage some of the 16 national convention delegates to be named in West Virginia. But Taft was assured of five before the polls opened because the Eisenhower organization failed to enter a complete slate of delegates.

While the West Virginia delegate contest was between Taft and Eisenhower, Taft was matched in the presidential preference primary against former Gov. Harold E. Stassen of Minnesota. Eisenhower was not entered for this "popularity contest" vote, which does not bind the delegates, and "write-in" votes were not counted. Eisenhower won 10 delegates

and Taft won from six to eight in state Republican conventions Monday in Rhode Island and Wyoming.

The Eisenhower forces smothered an attempt to elect a "harmony" slate divided between Taft and Eisenhower. They succeeded in naming Eisenhower backers to all eight of the state's delegate posts.

For Taft, this defeat was offset in part in Wyoming where six of the 12 delegates elected openly favored Taft. Two were listed for Eisenhower and four were uncommitted. The Taft camp claimed at least two and "probably" all four of the uncommitted delegates, without challenge from the Eisenhower backers.

David S. Ingalls, Taft campaign manager, said Taft's "overwhelming victory" in Wyoming "furnished further proof of his great popularity in Mountain States which were lost by Dewey in 1948."

"Add this great cattle producing country to the important farm states carried by Taft so

far this year such as Illinois, Wisconsin, Nebraska and Ohio and there can be no question but that the farmers of America want Bob Taft in the White House," he said.

Including the two Monday conventions, the United Press tabulation of delegates elected gave: Taft 348, Eisenhower 319, Stassen 22, Gov. Earl Warren of California 7, Gen. Douglas MacArthur 2 and 132 uncommitted.

The next Republican contests come Friday in the Oregon primary, where the Eisenhower organization expects to win all or nearly all of 18 delegates, and in North Dakota, where Taft expects to get a substantial majority of the 14 named at a state convention.

Although Taft was not entered in the Oregon presidential preference primary, Eisenhower managers were nervous about the possibility that he might win three or four delegates. Eight delegate candidates, regarded as pro-Taft, were entered under a 1905 law which does not bind them to the results of the presidential preference vote.

Among the Democratic presidential candidates, Sen. Estes Kefauver of Tennessee was scheduled to return to Oregon Tuesday in his bid for the state's Democratic delegates. He is pitted against Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois and Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas, both entered without their consent.

West Virginia Democrats elect 28 delegates with 20 votes Tuesday. Only two of the 48 candidates have committed themselves, both for Kefauver.

North Dakota Democrats are choosing 16 delegates with eight votes in a state convention Tuesday. They are expected to be uncommitted.

NAM President Asks Curbs End

WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP)—The National Association of Manufacturers told Congress Tuesday that controls hamper production without relieving inflation, and called for an end to wage-price curbs.

NAM President William J. Grede in testimony prepared for the House Banking Committee, urged a return to a "free market." He said the lawmakers should let the Defense Production Act expire as scheduled on June 30.

The NAM called for legislation to prevent the government from either recommending wage terms or seizing industries as a means of settling labor disputes. Grede also said legislation is needed to stop the government from taking labor's side and opposing management in disputes.

Rep. Jesse P. Wolkott (Mich.), senior Republican member of the committee, said "it is too early to tell what Congress is going to do" about controls.

"There is quite a lot of feeling on both sides," he said, "and the situation hasn't crystallized yet."

PRACTICAL GIFT
WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP)—Author George W. Stimpson sent a copy of his new book to Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower. "Since most of my time during the next few weeks will be spent traveling, I am placing the volume on our airplane and will begin reading it on the trip," Eisenhower said in a thank-you note.

The book is entitled, "A Book About American Politics."

ENGINES GET HOT
LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—The General Electric Company's jet engine J-47, is 12 feet long but turns out more than 10,000 horsepower at high altitude speeds. The temperature inside the engine may get as high as 2,000 degrees Fahrenheit.

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'Immoral' Shows Target of Group

WASHINGTON, May 13 (AP)—Unenthusiastic members of the House Commerce Committee took on the job Tuesday of conducting a congressional crusade against "immoral" radio and television programs.

Chairman Robert Crosser (D-Ohio) had no immediate comment on the assignment which was handed to his committee when the House approved a resolution by Rep. E. O. Gathings (D-Ark.) calling for an investigation of sex and crime on the airwaves.

But informed sources said Crosser is cool to the whole idea.

Rep. Joseph P. O'Hara (R-Minn.), a member of the Commerce committee, told reporters that "I have some doubt as to just what the committee will do. The resolution is as wide open as the poles."

Rep. A. L. Miller (R-Neb.) said Congress is "treading on dangerous ground" when it tries to "legislate morals."

Along with the radio-TV investigation, the House approved another Gathings resolution calling for creation of a nine-man special committee to look into the distribution of "salacious" comic books, pictures and other published material.

Small Fortune Left by Widow

CHICAGO, May 13 (AP)—Investigators who found more than \$200,000 of an eccentric widow's estate wrapped in knee-length bloomers, a pillow slip and a pair of stockings said it would take them until Thursday to count the money.

The estate left by the late Mrs. Cora Draper, 85, in bundles placed in a safety deposit box was estimated at \$300,000. The money stuffed in the pink bloomer legs was in bills ranging from \$5 to \$100.

PLANS SPOILED
TORONTO, May 13 (AP)—Two gunmen spoiled a Toronto jeweler's plans to hold a clearance sale by robbing him of \$25,000 worth of gems and \$4,000 in cash Monday.
