Members of 13 Central Oregon garden clubs, some 150 strong, participated in the Cascade district convention of the Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs, Saturday in Gilchrist. Mrs. Verne I. Brader of Chemult, president of the Gilchrist club, extended the welcome to the group, and Mrs. Ben Evick, district president, conducted the meeting.

Speakers were Mrs. J. George Eisenhauer of Portland, state president, and Mrs. L. W. Franks of Redmond, president-elect. Other special guests were Mrs. Walter Wilhelm of Portland, past president; Mrs. Charles Bushnell, Scappoose, director of the Columbia district; Mrs. Fred Sexton of Molalla, news letter chairman, and Mrs. Jack Shumway of Powell Butte, conservation chairman.

Mrs. Eisenhauer, in her talk, pointed out that the federation has been working for conservation of state resources for 25 years. Mrs. Franks reported that 75 acres of burned-over land in the Fremont National Forest will be reseeded this season through the efforts of the Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs. A contribution of \$5 seeds one-half acre. On June 2, a plaque will be dedicated in the reseeded area.
