Hardware, Tavern Teams Win First Softball Contests

Masterson-St. Clair and the West Side Tavern are perched temporarily at the top rung of the City Soft Ball League ladder as the result of victories in the inaugural double-header at Municipal ball park last night.

The Hardware players defeated the Lundgren Sales team, 14 to 9, while the West Side Tavern trounced the Lundgren Red Sox, 11 to 4, in the five-inning nightcap.

Masterson-St. Clair unleashed a savage hitting attack in the fourth inning to put across six runs on singles by Seems, Mayor and Gray, a triple by Douglas and a home run by Fault. They then came back in the fifth with four more runs on four singles and a home run by Mayer. Anderson, the Masterson-St. Clair pitcher, homered in the seventh to put across two more scores for the winners.

20 Safe Blows
The hardware boys collected a total of 20 safe blows off the offerings of Musgrave, Lundgren Sales pitcher, while the lumber workers accounted for nine hits off Anderson.

In the nightcap the Lundgren Red Sox took an early lead, with one score in the first and three more in the third, but the West Side Tavern got their batting eyes in the fourth, when they shoved across five runs, and 4 more in the fifth. They had earlier made two scores in the third but were still trailing until their batting bombardment got under way in the fourth and fifth innings. They collected a total of 12 hits off Cecil, the Red Sox chucker, while the Lundgrens were able to find Lions for only two safe blows.

Some slow fielding by all teams, due to early season unpreparedness, together with the chilly weather, accounted for the soaring scores in the two contests.

Jockey Rides 12 Wins in 14 Tries

CHICAGO, May 21 (UP)—Johnny Adams calmly made preparations Wednesday for an attempt to continue one of the longest winning horse race streak on record for any jockey.

The Iowa, Kan., rider drove home five winners in six mounts Tuesday at Lincoln Fields to push a three-day string to 12 winners in 14 tries.

Adams, 37, had a watermelon smile after Tuesday's program even though his day's straight victory string was broken in the last race.

"You can't win 'em all," he explained, "and I'm mighty lucky to roll up this many."

He has won 17 races since the meet opened May 12.

Adams rode five straight winners last Saturday and pushed his unbeaten record to seven Monday before losing the last race in three starts.

His winning mounts Tuesday were Rebel Raider, Honor Deck, Speedy Baby, Asphalt and Flying Bold. He failed with Worcester in the final race.

SOCE May Play In Loop Again

ASHLAND, Ore., May 21 (UP)—Southern Oregon College of Education appeared Wednesday to be headed for another season's play in the Far Western conference.

Marshall Woodell, who attended a recent meeting of the conference as the school's representative at Chico, Calif., said there were still proponents of a larger northern California small college conference to include such teams as San Jose State and California Poly.

But definite formation of such a conference has been delayed at least a year.

When the new California conference was first proposed, Southern Oregon took steps to join the Oregon Collegiate Conference. As a result, the Red Raiders may land up with double-conference status.

The school has included a full sports schedule with OCC members in the 1952-53 slate and the recently adopted 1953 Far Western conference basketball schedule will pit SOCE against all the Far Western conference schools.
