Mr. and Mrs. James Cook moved to Bend the past week from Klamath Falls. Mrs. Cook is the former Beverly Grubb.

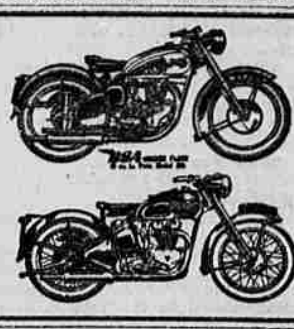

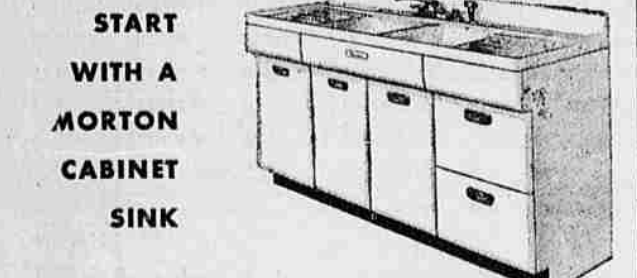

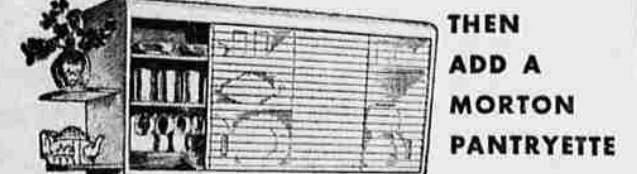
