

Good, Bad News Of Week Listed In Press Survey

The week's balance sheet between the good and bad news in the hot and cold wars.

The Good
1. Brig. Gen. Layton L. Boatner, who believes "you don't negotiate with prisoners," gradually was bringing Red prisoners on bloody Kojima Island under control. He said the fighting "is over." The 70,000 unruly Reds were being split up into compounds of 500 men each and at week's end the job was nearly half completed. A proposal that neutral nations inspect the prisoner-of-war camps should, if accepted, knock the props from Red propaganda charges that the prisoners were being mistreated.

State Visit Made
2. A state visit to Turkey by Greek King Paul and Queen Frederika called attention to one of the least noted but one of the strongest links in the steel girdle the West is attempting to fashion for the confinement of Communism. The two nations together have more than 500,000 tough, well-trained men ready to fight Communist aggression and have left no doubts either about their willingness to fight if attacked or their enthusiastic endorsement of Western democratic principles.

French Premier Antoine Pinay continued his campaign against Communist cells suspected of endangering both the internal and external security of France. At the same time he continued to gain strength among right-wing political factions. It held hope that at one of the most critical periods since the war, a strong French government would be a heavy contributor toward unity of Europe.

The Bad
1. West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer was running into strong but expected opposition to his treaty linking West Germany with the European army. Russia and the East German stooges continued a campaign of harassment against West Berlin and it was reported East German school boys were to be trained in the use of rifles for a potential, Communist-controlled East German army.

Warning Sounded
He told the British people they were in peril of losing all their possessions and glories because, as a nation, they were precariously near economic bankruptcy. His Chancellor of the Exchequer bore him out the next day when it was announced in Commons that Britain's export-import balance for May ran \$250,000,000 into the red.

3. Premier Jawaharlal Nehru attacked the North Atlantic Treaty Organization as a "degenerating body" which would perpetuate colonialism. He admitted that a war between the great powers would bring disaster to the entire world, but he maintained his fence-straddling position as a neutral. His position seemed increasingly strange — for one whose country was a particular beneficiary of Western self-rule policies and which today has Communists both inside the house and on its doorstep.

ZEVELY APPOINTED
PRINEVILLE, June 13—R. W. Zevely, who retired as postmaster here in 1950, has been named to take charge of ticket sales of the 1952 Crooked River roundup, scheduled for August 8, 9 and 10. It was announced yesterday by Manager J. A. Cain. Zevely will succeed H. C. Hulett, supervisor of the Ochoco national forest, who for a number of years has handled the ticket sales of the roundup. Hulett is recuperating from a recent sudden and serious illness which will necessitate his inactivity for a time.

Eisenhower, Taft

Midwestern delegates who privately pledged themselves to Eisenhower in the past week, and two North Carolina delegates made public endorsements. He expressed the belief that "many more" had been converted at the New York conferences.

Taft Active
Taft also has scheduled meetings with the Pennsylvania delegation and with the 24-member Maryland delegation which visited Eisenhower Wednesday.

From Detroit Eisenhower will go to Denver where he will meet delegations from the Far West.

Other developments:
Sen. Richard B. Russell of Georgia, candidate for the Democratic nomination, set off on a 15-state Western tour, opening with conferences with Nebraska Democrats at Omaha Friday.

Eisenhower told New Jersey delegates Thursday that the federal government should aim at cutting \$300,000,000 to \$400,000,000 from the budget, which is now running around \$80,000,000,000 a year, with proportionate tax relief.

Lower Taxes Goal
Taft, in a later speech before the National Republican Club at New York, pledged himself to lower taxes "immediately" and spoke of trimming the budget to \$55,000,000,000 by 1954.

President Truman told his weekly news conference that he does not intend to do anything about the fact that Gen. Douglas MacArthur has accepted the role of GOP convention keynote, despite an Army regulation forbidding officers on active duty from taking part in political conventions.

Showdown Hinted
Lodge hinted at a New York news conference that the Eisenhower forces will seek an early showdown with Taft at the convention by challenging the selection of Walter S. Hallahan of West Virginia as temporary chairman. Asserting that Hallahan is a "rabid Taft partisan," Lodge said: "The basic plan of Taft to win the nomination is going to be stopped. We've got the machinery of the national committee but not the convention."

REDMOND, June 13—The Jaycees became officially incorporated and enacted new by-laws at their regular meeting Wednesday night at the Legion hall.
Robert Messenger of Redmond and William Coffey of Portland were guests at the meeting. Mr. Coffey, representing the Western Investors Fund spoke on "Investments" pertaining to American industries.

It will proceed thence to Prineville for Queen Jackie and Party, departing for Portland at 8 a. m.

Mrs. Ernest Moore, who will be accompanied on the jaunt to Portland by Mr. Moore, will be official chaperone of the royal court. Others who will accompany the roundup royal party from Prineville will be Mr. and Mrs. F. G. Petterson, parents of the queen, Miss Lillian Warmuth, niece of the roundup manager and Mr. and Mrs. Joe D. Thomison.

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Boy Describes Murder, Suicide

BLOOMINGTON, Ind., June 13 (AP)—A five-year-old boy told Friday how he looked on while his grandfather shot and killed his ailing wife so she "won't have to cry any more."

The child, David Gallagher, was the only witness when farmer Shelton Hamlin shot down his wife Hazel Thursday with a 12 gauge shotgun and then killed himself with the same weapon.

Hamlin, 53, may have intended his act to be a double mercy slaying, said Deputy Sheriff Kenneth Corbin.

In Ill Health
He committed the shootings "presumably because of falling health," Corbin said.

David told authorities his grandmother had burst into tears several times during the day.

"I saw granddaddy go to the kitchen door with a shotgun behind him. Granddaddy was standing at the kitchen sink washing dishes and crying," the child said.

"Maw, you won't have to cry any more," he said Hamlin told the farm woman.

David said his grandfather raised the shotgun, shot his wife and then turned the weapon on himself.

Die Instantly
Hamlin's body fell alongside that of the woman. Both were killed instantly.

Corbin said the sheriff's office would attempt to learn the nature of the ailments suffered by the 53-year-old victim and her husband.

Neighbors told him both Mr. and Mrs. Hamlin had been ill for some time and that was the only reason they could think of for the slayings.

The church-going couple were reported to be well-to-do financially.

Hamlin borrowed the gun from neighbors Wednesday night. He said he wanted "to chase some dogs away from my cattle."

David and his widowed mother, Mrs. Myrtle J. Gallagher, 25, lived with the Hamlins at their farm home. Mrs. Gallagher was at work when the tragedy took place.

City Budget Vote Slated Next Tuesday

Two polling places have been designated for Tuesday's city budget election. It was announced today by Walter T. Thompson, city recorder, as final arrangements for the June 17 vote were completed. Precinct No. 1 will be at the city hall, in downtown Bend, and Precinct No. 2 will be in the basement of the Kenwood school.

The budget resolution to appear on the Tuesday ballot calls for a tax levy of \$189,527.59, the sum in excess of receipts estimated required for the operation of the various city departments in the 1952-53 fiscal year and the payment of bonds and interest. The \$189,527.59 is in excess of the six per cent limitation.

Hearing Held
The budget was approved by the city commission on June 4, following a public hearing. No protests were voiced at the hearing.

Polls will open at 9 a. m., daylight time, and close at 9 p. m., daylight time.

Persons registered in east side precincts in Bend are to vote at the city hall, and those registered west of the river will ballot at Kenwood school.

☐ BRAKES—If you can push pedal with one inch of floor or if car swerves when stopping, brakes need attention.

☐ STEERING—If you can turn steering wheel several inches without moving front wheels, service is needed.

☐ HORN—Check operation, volume.

☐ WINDSHIELD WIPERS—Check blades, wiper action.

☐ REAR-VIEW MIRRORS—Is glass clear and unobscured?

☐ LIGHTS—Test headlights, parking lamps, tail lamps, stop lights. Check headlight aim and direction switch action.

☐ SAFETY LIGHTS—Test operation of direction signal and backup lamps.

☐ TIRES—Inspect for excessive tread wear, cuts, improper inflation.

☐ GLASS—Check for visibility and crack.

☐ EXHAUST SYSTEM—Is exhaust noisy? Check for exhaust leaks, rust or damage.
