

Stock Disposal May Be Backed By Court Order

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—The Securities and Exchange Commission Thursday asked a federal court order to enforce its decision approving the break-up of American Power and Light Co.

It asked the U. S. District Court in Portland, Me., to issue an order backing up its approval last week of AP&L's plan to turn Washington Water Power Co. over to AP&L stockholders. The court scheduled a hearing on the proposal for July 17.

AP&L has been under SEC instructions since 1942 to dissolve itself and go out of business. The Washington Water Power Co., serving the eastern part of the state of Washington and northern Idaho is its last large remaining holding.

AP&L management estimate they will distribute their Washington Water Power Co. stock to AP&L stockholders within four months.

When distribution is completed, officials say they will wind up remaining company matters promptly.

Senate Approves Controls Bill

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—The Senate passed and sent to the House Thursday a bill to continue price-wage-rent controls to next March 1.

Passage was by a 58-to-18 roll call vote.

The bill continues the Defense Production Act, which is scheduled to expire June 30.

The Senate bill would keep wage, price and rent controls for eight more months, but continues authority for allocation and consumer credit controls for an additional year—until June 30, 1953.

The bill now goes to the House, where the Banking Committee is completing its own version of a controls measure. The House committee already has recommended extending wage-price-rent and allocations controls for one year, but dropping real estate and consumer credit curbs.

Senate approval came after a motion by Sen. George W. Malone R-Nev. to send the bill back to the Senate Banking Committee was defeated by voice vote.

The way was cleared for Senate passage when sponsors of two amendments dealing with the steel strike gave up trying to tack onto the measure proposals involving presidential power to seize the steel mills. The Senate had battled all week on seizure amendments and had defeated four of them earlier.

Marine Barracks Scene of Rioting

CAMP PENDLETON, Calif., June 13 (AP)—Marine guards armed with bayonet-tipped rifles and tear gas were called into action to quell a riot of 50 prisoners at the Camp Pendleton Disciplinary Barracks last Tuesday night, it was reported Friday.

Spokesman for the base commander, Maj. Gen. Oliver P. Smith confirming that armed guards put down a "demonstration" by prisoners in the camp stockade but added that "no one was seriously injured."

It was reported that the prisoners used rocks and fists in the hour-long fight, which started when the prisoners were denied smoking privileges as a disciplinary measure.

Reports from nearby Oceanside said the guards broke up the battle with bayonets and tear gas, but base officials did not confirm them.

TO GET MORE CASH

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—The Senate has voted to give retired federal employees a cost-of-living increase in their annuities.

The Senate passed by voice vote and sent to the House Thursday a bill to pay the increases from the \$4,500,000,000 Civil Service retirement fund. It was estimated they would amount to \$61,000,000 over a two-year period.

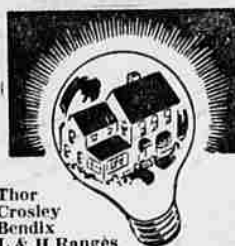
A map used with the travelogue shows the route, north through Bend to the John Day valley, taken by Editor Rogers in his trip into eastern Oregon.

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Britain Losing Dollar Reserves

LONDON, June 13 (AP)—Britain, warned by Prime Minister Winston Churchill that she is perilously near bankruptcy, was told Thursday that the drain on her dwindling gold and dollar reserves has been only slowed and not stopped by drastic economic restrictions.

Chancellor and Exchequer R. A. Butler told the House of Commons that the vital reserves continued to dwindle. Shortly before he spoke statistics were released revealing that Britain's import-export balance ran into the red by \$250,000,000 last month.

Near Bankruptcy
Churchill said Wednesday that Britain is in peril of losing her possessions and glory because she is close to bankruptcy. Britons, he said, are standing on "a treacherous trap door" but his warning was "not a cry of despair... it is more than the alert. It is the alarm."

Butler said the drastic measures taken by the Churchill government had cut the loss in gold and dollar reserves to under 10,000,000 pounds \$28,000,000 during April and May. But he admitted that the dollar position had been helped in part because figures for this quarter include the first installment of a \$300,000,000 defense aid grant from the U. S.

450 Doctors Due For Induction

WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—The Defense Department Thursday ordered selective service to draft 450 priority one physicians during August unless a sufficient number voluntarily enters the armed forces.

If they actually are inducted, they will constitute the first large group of physicians to be drafted since World War II.

Last summer selective service issued a call for 485 physicians, but postponed it when enough volunteered. So far, it has been necessary to draft only three physicians. This occurred in July, 1951.

TO STAY IN OREGON
PORTLAND, June 13 (AP)—Wade Swede Halbrook, the fabulous seven-foot basketball star who personally guided Lincoln high to a state title this year, said Thursday he definitely will attend an Oregon college this fall.

But just which one, Halbrook would not say. He said his choice would be made among the University of Oregon, Oregon State, or the University of Portland.

LABORATORY SOUGHT
WASHINGTON, June 13 (AP)—A committee of cattlemen has urged the Senate to "take prompt action" on a house-approved measure to set up a \$10,000,000 foot-and-mouth disease laboratory in this country.

The cattlemen, members of the Agriculture Department's industry advisory committee on the disease, warned the Senate of the "generally threatening picture" of the deadly livestock disease "the world over."

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Smoke Jumpers To See Action

FORT COLLINS, Colo., June 13 (AP)—"Smoke Jumpers" were to join the 350 men fighting the four-day-old fire in the Roosevelt National Forest of Northern Colorado Friday.

Forest Supervisor E. H. Mason issued an appeal for supervisory fire-fighting aid from Region 1 Headquarters of the Forest Service at Missoula, Mont., after the fire, fanned by blistering hot southwesterly winds, leaped the fire line on the east side and engulfed a ranch.

"Everything went against us," said Albert Straub, administrative assistant of the forest. "The wind—the heat, and more spot fires to watch out for. It just got to be too much for us."

Some 350 men were battling the tremendous fire, which at latest report already had destroyed between 2,500 and 3,000 acres of spruce and lodgepole pine timber.

Portland Bakers Refuse Offer

PORTLAND, June 13 (AP)—By a vote of 254 to 73, Portland bakers Thursday rejected a \$5 a week pay boost and other benefits offered by management to end the six-week old strike against 25 major bakeries here.

Union officials said the issue of Sundays off remained the chief obstacle to a settlement.

The offer also included a health and welfare program.

Union Business Agent John Leffelman said it was now up to the federal conciliation service to arrange any more negotiating sessions.

INJURIES FATAL
NORTH BEND, Ore., June 13 (AP)—Eugene Brooks, 38, Reedsport, died in a hospital here Thursday from injuries suffered Wednesday in a truck accident on the Loon Lake road east of Reedsport.

Brooks and William Conkey were riding in an empty lumber truck when the shoulder of the road gave way and toppled the truck down a steep slope.
