Uniform Divorce Law Supported

WASHINGTON, June 21 (AP)—The Senate Saturday passed legislation to guarantee that valid divorces granted in any state will be legal in all others if they meet specified standards.

The bill potentially affects millions of divorced persons whose decrees could be considered valid in one state but not in another.

The measure now goes to the House. The measure, sponsored by Sen. Pat McCarran (D-Nev.), requires that any legal divorce "must be given full faith and credit" in any other state if it meets the following standards:

Standards Set 1. The decree is final. 2. The decree is valid. 3. The decree declares that jurisdictional requirements of the state granting the divorce have been met. 4. "The state in which the decree was granted was the last state in which the couple lived together as man and wife, or the defendant was personally subject to the state's jurisdiction or appeared generally in the proceedings."

The measure would not necessarily cover "quickie" Nevada divorces or those of other states which require short residence by only one party.

Loggan Accepts Navy Invitation

A Bend man, Frank H. Loggan of KEND, has accepted an invitation from the United States Navy to visit Hawaii by plane and return to the mainland aboard an aircraft carrier, and will leave tomorrow for San Francisco. He will be a member of a group that will be flown from Alameda, Calif., to Pearl Harbor, T. H., as the navy's guest aboard the huge flying boat, Mars.

In Hawaii, members of the group will visit navy installations and join in a flight around the island of Oahu. There will also be a tour of Pearl Harbor naval shipyard and the Pearl Harbor naval base. A trip aboard a Pacific Fleet submarine has also been arranged for the visitors from the mainland.

The carrier on which the party will return will dock at San Diego, on July 3. Loggan will make the trip south to San Francisco tomorrow by United Air Lines, and will return to Bend from San Diego, at the end of the Hawaiian trip, by plane.

Loggan received the invitation to be a guest of the navy on the trip to Hawaii from Rear Admiral Allen E. Smith, commandant, 13th Naval District.

TO BUY NEW ORGAN PRINEVILLE, June 21—The choir of the Prineville Community church, which two years ago raised around \$350 for use in bringing a west European displaced family here, has abandoned the plan. While \$150 of the funds will be devoted to activities for the foreign field, the balance, it was voted, will go toward the purchase of a new organ, it has been announced by the pastor, Rev. Laurance A. Burdette.

Dr. Christopher Graham, 66, who became associated with the Doctors Mayo in 1894 in the partnership of Mayo, Stinchfield and Graham, died at his home Friday of a heart attack. The early partnership, after some changes, grew into the famed clinic.

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
