Nagy Hurls 2-Hit Game But Bevos Win by 3-2 Count

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 12 (AP)—What the Portland Beavers do to Steve Nagy shouldn't happen to a pitcher. Their behavior toward the short-statured southpaw is incorrigible and... well, just in downright poor taste.

It was only little more than a fortnight ago that Portland, held to one hit, beat Nagy and Seattle 2-1. Tuesday night Steve soft-balled a two-hitter, and lost 3-2.

However the unlucky left-hander had himself partly to blame for the loss. He had a 1-0 lead until the sixth, when he walked Mike McCormick. Shotstop Artie Wilson then committed his first of two bottles on Joe Brovia's grounder.

Bunt Dropped

Don Eggert dropped a bunt and Nagy, with a good shot to force McCormick at third, threw the ball away. One run was in. Brovia scored on Herm Reich's fly ball. And Eggert came home on Ed Basinsky's single—the only hit of the inning.

Seattle had won eight in a row until Basinsky's hit.

Other clubs also had 2-2-lia. Oakland nipped Los Angeles by that score, and Hollywood downed San Francisco. Sacramento doubled the run trend to down San Diego, 6-4. The win was the sad Sacs first in 10 outings.

Johnny Jorgensen cuffed his ninth homer of the year to stake Oakland to a lead. Then Los Angeles, who outlit the winners 7-5, went ahead with two tallies in the fifth. But catcher Ray Noble singled, stole second and scored the Acoons' winning tally in the sixth when Tookie Gilbert rifled out a one-bagger.

Pitcher Homers

Johnny Lindell, who's only the PCL's winningest pitcher, drove a home run in the sixth frame to get league-leading Hollywood its victory. Lindell, playing right field when he isn't winning games on the mound, made a victor of bonus baby Paul Pettit, who gave the Sacs 10 hits.

Sacramento stayed 29½ games off Hollywood's pace by flattening the third-place Padres. Sac manager Joe Gordon doubled home two runs in the first inning and his charges never looked back.

Chester Johnson, the unique left-hander, got help in the seventh but won credit for the rare Sacramento victory.

St. John's Hoop Boss Quits Post

NEW YORK, Aug. 13 (AP)—The future of big time college basketball in New York was left up in the air Wednesday by the sudden resignation of Frank McGuire as coach of traditionally powerful St. John's.

McGuire, one of the game's top coaches, gave up a contract that still had three years to run at St. John's to accept a similar position at the University of North Carolina.

The switch was taken to mean North Carolina will make an all out effort to gain basketball domination of the Southern Conference, which has been ruled by North Carolina State for the last six years.

Behind him in New York, McGuire left folks wondering "Will St. John's remain a big time team?"

Since the fixing scandals knocked Long Island University out of the game completely and reduced CCNY to the status of a minor team, with NYU fielding sub par teams, St. John's has been left alone to battle with the top teams of other sections for national ranking.

Now St. John's, in picking a new coach, must decide whether to stay a big time team or to de-emphasize.

The big wigs of big league baseball had a severe case of water on the brain Wednesday, trying to figure out what to do with the rain that is piling up double-headers on the pennant contenders.

You couldn't convince the boss men of the Yankees, Indians, Dodgers or Giants that the government has allocated huge funds for relief of drought conditions. They're about to apply for help as flood sufferers.

Once again Tuesday all of the contenders were stranded in heavy rain as rain washed out night games between the Dodgers and Giants, the Yankees and Senators, and an afternoon game between the Indians and the Tigers. The Phillies, who still consider themselves contenders even though they're 6 games behind, also were rained out of their game with the Braves.

That created a heavy slate for today with the Dodgers and Giants meeting in a Cole Porter "night and day" two-admission double header in Brooklyn, the Yankees playing two with the Senators and the Phillies taking on Boston twice at night.

The Indians, who were rained out of two straight games with the Tigers, won't get a chance to make up their postponements until early September, but they figured to be busy enough with the pestiferous Browns who moved in for a double header at night. The Cubs and Reds also had a double bill booked at Chicago, leaving only three single games and making the mid-week slate look like "labor day"—two weeks in advance.

There wasn't much action Tuesday, but wherever it took place, it was bitter and long. The Athletics finally subdued the third place Red Sox, 4 to 3, in 13 innings and moved back into fifth place ahead of Chicago. Carl Scheib went all the way, scattering 10 hits to gain his seventh victory.

It took the Browns 11 innings to subdue the White Sox 3 to 2 and Jim Dyck did it almost alone with a homer in the eighth that (Continued on Page 3)

EUGENE, Aug. 13 (AP)—Tommy Jacobs, Montebello, Calif., and Don Bisplinghoff, Orlando, Fla., led the field of 100 young golfers into the opening 18 holes of 72-hole medal play Wednesday for the National Junior Chamber of Commerce golf title.

Jacobs, who had a 68 Monday, slipped to a 74 Tuesday but his 142 was good enough to edge Bisplinghoff for medalist honors by one stroke. They were the only two players under par in the 36-hole qualifying rounds.

Three players were tied at 149 for third place. They were James Raines of Augusta, Ga., whose 70 was the best card yesterday; Scotty Fraser, Panama City, Fla., and Buddy Manderson, Tuscaloosa, Ala.

California and Florida tied at 610 for four-man team honors. Wednesday's scores by their respective entries will determine the team title. Georgia, was third with 619. Minnesota fourth with 624 and Alabama fifth with 630.

A score of 167 or better was good enough to qualify for the 72-hole tournament. Thirty-nine golfers fell by the wayside.
