Gilchrist Women Hostesses At Successful Flower Show

Residents of many Central Oregon communities were guests of the Gilchrist Garden club, at the organization's annual flower show, held Tuesday evening at the community club house, in the picturesque village 50 miles south of Bend. A profusion of flowers lent color and fragrance to the large hall, and a display of garden vegetables in one corner gave evidence that Gilchrist gardeners are practical, as well as beauty-conscious.

The proof that flowers in an amazing variety grow in the pine-studded village was accepted as a challenge by visitors from areas which have fewer natural obstacles to overcome. The soil at Gilchrist is of pumice type, and in order to have gardens, residents have hauled topsoil from the narrow valley that borders the Deschutes. The beauty and delicacy of the blossoms, and the Paul Bunyan qualities of the vegetables, caused some visitors to remark that the "impossible" had been accomplished.

Punch was served from a beautifully-appointed table in the lounge of the large clubhouse. A net table cloth over light blue was the background for heirloom silver pieces and pink asters. Mrs. V. I. Brader, Mrs. R. J. Terrell, Miss Mary Geales Gilchrist and Frank Gilchrist Jr. poured.

Judges were Mrs. Ben Evick of Madras, board member for the Cascade district of the Oregon Federation of Garden Clubs, and Mrs. C. L. Rasmussen and Mrs. F. M. Stoltsberry of Bend.

In the section for vegetables, Mrs. W. A. Hitt placed first, Mrs. Leslie Noelin second and Mrs. Guy Ferguson third.

In the horticulture section, Mrs. Isom Ezell was first with roses, Mrs. Leslie Noelin second with sweet peas, and Mrs. Sam Ware third with delphiniums. Mrs. Guy Ferguson's gladiolus won first and second places, and Mrs. C. B. Breazeale's were third.
