New York Giants In Driver's Seat In Pro League

NEW YORK, Oct. 13 (AP)—The New York Giants, who have taken a back seat to the Cleveland Browns for the past two seasons, kicked themselves into the driver's seat Monday in the National Football League's American Conference with a 17-9 triumph over the Mid-west powerhouse.

While New York made its record 3-0 at the expense of the conference champions, the San Francisco Forty-Niners remained the league's only other perfect-record team by making the Detroit Lions their third straight victim, 28-0, as the pros reeled off six games Sunday.

In the other contests, the defending champion Los Angeles Rams came from behind with 24 last-period points to edge Green Bay, 30-28; the Chicago Bears downed Dallas, 38-20; and the Chicago Cardinals beat Washington, 17-6.

Faint Grin
Brown's contract was extended to eight years when he signed a new five-year pact Saturday but he managed only a faint grin as he blamed Cleveland's defeat on "a couple of errors and a better club." The defeat dropped Cleveland into a three-way tie for second with the Eagles and Cards.

Brown said the big "error" was the pass which Charlie Conerly completed to Bob Wilkinson for a 7-yard touchdown with only 14 seconds to go in the first half. "But they've got a nice ball club and they were just too much for us yesterday."

It was the New York defense—a burly, relentless crew headed by tackles Arnie Weinmeister and Al Derogatis, guards Jon Baker and Bill Albright and linebacker John Canaday—that humbled the proud Browns before a crowd of 51,858.

Lou Groza's three field goals, one a 52-yarder, gave Cleveland a 9-7 lead going into the final quarter. But Ray Poole's 25-yard field goal early in the fourth period put New York ahead to stay, 10-9. Less than 60 seconds later, Otto Graham got off a hurried pass against the rushing Giant defense. Halfback Tom Landry intercepted it on the Brown 20 and ran for the touchdown that insured the New York victory.

Tight Defense
Bill Wilson, Hugh McElhenny, Frankie Albert and Don Burke scored San Francisco's touchdowns as the Forty-Niners defense held Detroit to four first downs. Green Bay led Los Angeles, 26-6, after three periods but two touchdowns by Dan Towler, one by Bob Carey and Bot Waterfield's 22-yard field goal gave the Rams their first 1952 victory.

End Bob Walston kicked four field goals, two coming in the last two minutes, to lead Philadelphia to victory over Pittsburgh.

The Bears won easily against Dallas at Wrigley Field as quarterback Bob Williams threw two touchdowns passes to Gene Schroeder and one to Chuck Hunsinger while completing 13 out of 15 tosses.

Touchdowns by Charlie Trippi and Billy Cross plus Joe Geri's field goal enabled the Cards to beat Washington.

Horse Withdrawn From Inaugural

NEW YORK, Oct. 13 (AP)—King Ranch trainer Max Hirsch said he will announce a definite decision Monday as to whether To Market will serve as a substitute starter for the withdrawn Crafty Admiral in the inaugural \$50,000 Washington International at Laurel Saturday.

Beaten by 17 lengths in the Jockey Club Gold Cup race at Belmont Park Oct. 4, Crafty Admiral was withdrawn from Saturday's mile and a half test because trainer Bob Odell felt "it would be too much to ask him to run another mile and a half with only two weeks rest."

Hirsch said he would confer with owner Robert Kieberg today regarding To Market's availability and announce when the horse would start Monday.

Giardello Meets Giambra Tonight

NEW YORK, Oct. 13 (AP)—Joey Giardello of Philadelphia and Joey Giambra of Buffalo, N. Y., a pair of ambitious young middleweights, clash Monday night in a 10-round feature bout at Eastern Parkway Arena.

Giardello was an 85 favorite for the scrap, which will be televised in many eastern cities. The Philadelphia has recently risen to ninth ranking in the division after wins over Billy Graham, Georgia Small, and Pierre Langlois.

Giambra has 27 victories in 28 fights, including 18 knockouts.

Pacific Coast Grid Teams Fail to Achieve 'Balance'

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 13 (AP)—This was supposed to be the season of great "balance" in the Pacific Coast conference football race. Every game was supposed to be a toss-up.

But look what happened on Saturday.

California exploded to a 41-7 victory over Oregon.

Stanford blew-up a 41-7 lead over Oregon State and then won, 41-28, with the second stringers on the field.

Earlier in the campaign, Southern California trampled on what was supposed to be a good Washington State eleven, 34-7, and UCLA walked all over Washington, 32-7.

And that's the way it has been all season. The only thing that can be said about the "closeness" of the conference games is the fact that there haven't been any shutouts.

Real Toss-Up
However, there is something in the making for this week-end that indicates a real toss-up struggle. It pits unbeaten UCLA against a Stanford club that also has won all its games. Saturday the Bruins, sparked by reserve back Ted Narleski, who was playing for the injured Paul Cameron, trampled a good Rice team from the Southwest conference, 20-0. At the same time, Stanford unleashed a powerful ground attack for the first time this season, in whipping the Beaver club that had nearly upset Michigan State.

Sports Parade

NEW YORK, Oct. 13 (AP)—A "build-up" was in full swing Monday to obtain an unexpected shot at Rocky Marciano's crown for Ezzard Charles, the Toothless Tiger of the heavyweight jungle.

Ezzard of the peaceful and palpitating heart moves into Madison Square Garden on Oct. 24 against well-battered Cesar Brila, the Argentine door mat. When he wins that one for two victories in a row—such is the calibre of heavy-weight challengers, that the dums will start beating frenziedly.

Call it boxing blasphemy, or just plain poor judgment, but you will hear Ezzard mentioned in the same breath with such as Jim Corbett, Jimi DeFries, Jack Dempsey and Joe Louis. The connecting link is that they were former champions who tried to regain the title.

About the only unusual fact of any comparison is that this is the first boxing area in which two ex-champions were hopeful of regaining the title. Jersey Joe Walcott, the ancient warrior, still hasn't given up.

The only inference you can draw from the continuing struggles of Old Jersey and the reluctant Charles, a timid gladiator since learning he had weak heart muscles, is that there is a paucity of candidates for a proposed Marciano "Bum of the Month" club.

As for Walcott, you remember clearly the tight-lipped trepidation among his camp followers the night Marciano knocked him dead. You remember, too, the unexpected anguish in the eyes of bland Felix Bocchicchio as he announced "Joe is through and if he does fight I won't handle him because I don't want to see him get hurt."

Walcott, never talked as a conversationalist, talked Felix out of that stand the next day.

Yet, as it develops, Walcott's defeat was a break for Charles. Because you can remember back to the July night a year ago when Ezzard, in his third title fight with Walcott, was knocked out by the creaking clouter, and subsequent fourth fight in which Old Joe won a decision.

Charles sat in his dressing room that last time completely resigned to never getting into the ring again for the championship.

"This is it, for me, I guess," he said. "Nobody would pay a quarter to see us fight another time."

The advent of Marciano as champion changed all that apparently, even though in his next fight Charles was defeated by Rex Layne.

Because already the feelers are out, suggesting Charles as a Marciano opponent after the Rock stows Old Jersey away for keeps at Miami in February. And all of this on one fight, and an inconclusive one at that as far as proving Ezzard shouldn't pay his way in to a Marciano bout.

The theory is that Charles began demonstrating he was a tiger with teeth by knocking out Bernie Reynolds last Wednesday night in the second round. This is the same Reynolds who, in his one fight last year, was flattened by Joe Kahut—also in the second round.

That would seem to give Kahut precedence for a title bout with the Rock if that's all you need to qualify. But the odds are now that Charles will be Marciano's post-Walcott dancing partner.

There's just one consoling thought in the whole setup. Marciano is a robust man at the spaghetti plate and a little action will keep him sveite. As for the customers, considering the opposition at hand a "little action" is all they can expect.

Tennis Title Won By Garnar Mulloy

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 13 (AP)—The U. S. Davis Cup Committee wants to assemble a young team for this winter's assault on Australia, but they're going to have a tough time keeping 35-year-old Garnar Mulloy off the squad.

The veteran star from Coral Gables, Fla., added another highlight to his brilliant 1952 season Sunday when he won the Pan-American championship by beating Art Larsen of San Leandro, Calif., 7-5, 8-6, 7-5, 4-6, 7-5.

Add to that the fact that Mulloy was the only Yank to reach the finals of the U. S. championship at Forest Hills, N. Y., before he lost to Australia's Frank Sedgman, and his terrific spring showing when he won five out of seven tournaments, and his record is a strong bid for a singles job against the Aussies.

Larsen, blond southpaw who formerly held the U. S. title, cracked under pressure in the final set. He tried to rush the net, and Mulloy passed him. He began hitting into the net as he was often trapped out of position.

Shirley Fry of Akron, O., won the women's crown by beating Mrs. Thelma Long of Australia, 6-4, 6-4.

Vic Seixas of Philadelphia, the U. S. No. 1 ranked player who lost to Mulloy in the singles semi-final, teamed with Mexican singles champion Gustavo Palfox to win the doubles crown, beating Felicissimo Gustavo of the Philippines and Noel Brown of San Francisco, 6-4, 6-3, 6-2.

Ducks, Beavers Drop Grid Tests To Californians

PORTLAND, Oct. 13 (AP)—Injuries plagued the Oregon Ducks at Eugene Monday with the announcement that two players will be sidelined for the remainder of the season as the result of fractures received in their bruising game against California Saturday while at Corvallis the Oregon State Beavers nursed only minor injuries after the Stanford game.

Oregon staved off the powerful Golden Bear offense for a 7 to 7 tie at the half time but went under in the second half to lose 41-7. The Beavers failed to overcome a first period Stanford scoring bulge and lost 41-23.

Many Injuries
Tommy Lyon, Oregon Halfback, suffered a broken collar bone at Multnomah stadium Saturday and Stan Gottschalk, reserve center, received a fractured right leg. Two other players, End Ron Lyman and Left Half Manning Barber suffered shoulder injuries and probably will not play against Washington next Saturday.

The Ducks displayed a potent aerial attack led by Quarterback George Shaw who set a new coast conference record by completing 23 passes. His terrific passing netted the lone Oregon touchdown during the second quarter.

California exploded in the third period for three touchdowns and picked up two more in the fourth quarter.

Quick Scores
At Palo Alto, the Indians struck against the Beavers for three touchdowns in the first 12 minutes of play and held a 21-0 half-time lead. In the third quarter, Oregon State picked up one touchdown while the Indians bunched together another three scores. The Beavers fired up in the fourth period to collect three touchdowns and the Indians grabbed one more.

It was Oregon's second loss in three starts in the Pacific Coast conference putting it in sixth place. Oregon State, making its first appearance in conference play this year, is at the bottom of coast standings with winless Idaho and Washington State.

The Ducks play Washington at Seattle next Saturday and Oregon State takes on another top-ranking California team, University of Southern California, in Multnomah stadium here.

State Waterfowl Opening Oct. 24
PORTLAND, Oct. 13 (AP)—The Oregon Game Commission announced Monday the migratory waterfowl hunting season will open October 24 and will run for a straight 70 days until New Year's day, 1953.

Oregon and California game commissioners agreed last August at a meeting of the Pacific flyway council in Klamath Falls on a uniform opening date for both states. Idaho's season opened October 11 and Washington's opens October 17.

Hunters will be allowed a daily bag and possession limit of six ducks. They will be allowed to add two widgeons (baldpates) or two pintails, or one of each, making a total of eight birds.

Daily bag and possession limit on geese remains at six. Not more than two birds of the dark species—common Canadian goose and subspecies and the white-fronted goose—may be included among the six.

There is a separate limit of three brant, black sea brant only, formerly included in the goose limit.

Another revision of this year's regulations permits the shooting of waterfowl from a boat having a motor attached if the boat is fastened within or tied immediately alongside a stationary hunting blind.

The population of trumpeter swans, once nearly extinct, has grown from 73 in 1935 to 571 in this country due to conservation efforts.

Hunter Kills Son In Oregon Woods

KLAMATH FALLS, Oct. 13 (AP)—A grief stricken father Monday mourned the death of his son who he accidentally shot while hunting on Big Aspen mountain about 30 miles west of here.

Dead was 23-year-old Richard Andrew Moore, Klamath Falls car salesman, who was shot Sunday by his father, Vernon Moore, about 11:20 a. m.

The elder Moore said he was hunting in heavy brush when he heard a deer and then saw a pair of horns through his field glasses. He fired. The bullet entered the boy's throat.

Young Moore died in his father's arms at 11:45 a. m. while a third member of the party, Ray Bocham went for help to a ranger station about an hour away.

A party including Bocham, Moore, John Barton of radio station KFII, State Patrolman Bill Christiansen and Klamath County Forest Protection Ranger Jack Holmes carried the boy's body off the mountain in a three-hour long trek late Sunday.
