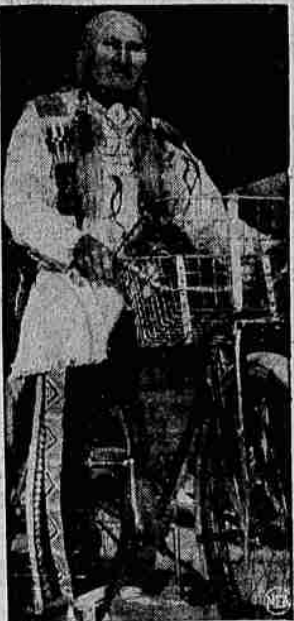

Kimball Reports On Foreign Aid

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21 (UP)—Navy Secretary Dan A. Kimball said Tuesday Marshall Plan and military aid for Western European countries "has been money well spent."

Kimball, who returned last week from a European inspection tour, said "the Marshall Plan plus military aid has got things going over there."

He said he got an "overall favorable impression" of the European situation, although "we are not out of the woods yet."

Kimball told a news conference too many people in the United States believe this country is paying the whole cost for European defense preparations.

All of the countries in NATO are being heavily taxed for this purpose and the United States contribution is supplemental," he said.

For example, the tax on an electric refrigerator in Greece is about six times the cost of the refrigerator itself, Kimball said.

He "guessed" the United States pays about 20 per cent of the defense bill for European countries, but emphasized it was strictly a guess.

Kimball was asked whether the United States needs to enlarge its fleet in Korean waters and whether a larger fleet would make it possible to end the war more quickly.

Kimball said, "not unless more forces of all services were sent to Korea. If we're going to force a decision on the ground then we'd have to put more forces in there."

John Burgess, who had been missing since Saturday morning on a hunting trip with his father, was pronounced in "good condition" after he was rescued Monday.

John conceded he was a "little bit scared, especially at night." "And it sure got cold," he said.

When he saw he was lost "I just stayed in one spot in the open. I knew they would find me," he said.

HIGHLANDS, N. C. Oct. 21 (UP)—A "pathfinder" scout who became lost for 35 hours in Blue Valley Tuesday owed his rescue from the trackless wilderness to two taxi drivers.

Hebert McKelvey, 16-year-old Eagle Scout from Franklin, N. C., was found huddled on a sandbar in the middle of a stream by Clyde Bingham and Romulus Carpenter, both cabbies from his home town.

Bingham and Carpenter had left their jobs of threading urban mazes to join the search party of more than 100 men who searched the valley with bloodhounds when McKelvey, who wears a pathfinder merit badge, got lost on a camping trip.

Redmond to Pick Mayor, Council

REDMOND, Oct. 21 — Redmond citizens will elect a mayor and six councilmen and state their preference on an advisory poll when they ballot on local, state and national issues November 4.

No candidates had filed for city offices as of Monday, Oct. 20, but caucuses are meeting to formulate slates this week.

The city recorder's office has the forms for filing, and the deadline is Saturday, Oct. 25. The question on the advisory poll reads: "Should the city of Redmond annually budget an amount sufficient to cover the cost of installing and maintaining, during the Christmas season, a decoration project for the downtown business area."

A special election will be called, some time after Nov. 4, for Redmond people to vote on the new city charter, which is still in the hands of the Portland advisory attorney. It will call for consideration, among other matters, of a \$200,000 bond issue for the extension of Redmond's water system, bonds to be sold in blocks over a period of 10 years; the staggering of terms of city councilmen, and election of a municipal judge.
