Players Appear Certain to Cop Football Honors

NEW YORK, Nov. 21 (AP)—Don Gottlob of Sam Houston State and Wes Bair of Illinois State Normal, both of whom have finished their football seasons, Friday appeared virtually certain to win the small college total offense and forward passing championships.

Gottlob topped the total offense rankings with 2,470 yards and Noel Reebenacker of Massachusetts, who also has completed his season, was second with 2,080. Gottlob's nearest rivals with games remaining are Jimmy Felix of Western Kentucky State, eighth with 1,330 yards, and Johnny Unitas of Louisville, ninth with 1,270.

Bair's 135 completions appears likely to win him the passing title. Reebenacker and Gottlob, each of whom completed 132, are runners-up. Unitas, with 101; Felix with 97 and Frank Siggins of Dayton with 92, are Bair's closest pursuers still in action and each has one more game.

It's a different story in the rushing and pass receiving departments, where Richie Wolf of Arkansas State and Jim Ladd of Bowling Green have finished the seasons with rather narrow leads over still active rivals.

Campaign Over
Wolf has finished his campaign with 1,250 rushing yards as have his six closest challengers, headed by Leo Lewis of Lincoln, Mo., University with 1,239. But the latest NCAA figures show that Hugh Pepper of Mississippi Southern, who ranks eighth with 1,019 yards, has a good chance to win.

Pepper has two more games. If he maintains his nine-game average of 113 yards, he will come close. Any improvement on that average will give him the rushing title. Ladd leads the pass receivers with 43. But eighth-ranked Dave Rivers, back of Louisville, with 36, has one more game. He can replace Ladd by catching eight against Mississippi Southern Saturday.

Football Briefs

PULLMAN (AP)—Washington State End Ed Barker, previously declared out for the season with a knee injury, will play against Oklahoma A & M Saturday at Stillwater.

What had been diagnosed by trainer Bucky Walters as "severe medial ligament strains," mended so rapidly, that Barker threw away his cast Monday night. The team flies to Stillwater today.

SEATTLE (AP)—Don Heinrich, star passer for the Washington Huskies, was reported to have been given a six-day pass from the Army to play in the Washington State game Nov. 29.

Heinrich is to be inducted Nov. 24 and Coach Howie Odell said he would plan to go into the game without him, grooming Sam Mitchell for the spot. The Huskies have no game this Saturday.

EUGENE (AP)—The Oregon Webfoots planned one last practice Friday before their big game with the Oregon State Beavers.

The Webfoots showed signs of a very powerful aerial offensive in their workout Thursday and all three quarterbacks, Hal Dunham, George Shaw and Barney Holland went through fancy passing exercises.

CORVALLIS (AP)—The Oregon State Beavers close their practice sessions Friday and then leave for Portland and the game with Oregon.

Quarterback Jim Withrow will play in the game Saturday, but not full time, Coach Kip Taylor said.

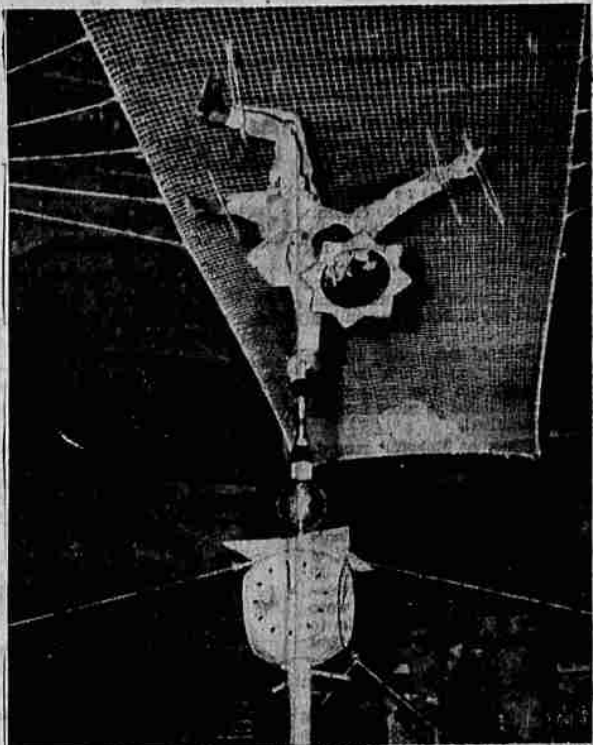
BANQUET PLANNED

'Bobo' Olson KO's Lee Sala, Now Wants Crack at Title

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 21 (AP)—Carl (Bobo) Olson is ready for another crack at the world's middleweight crown—although admittedly he may receive it by default.

Olson, the No. 1 challenger for the title now held by Sugar Ray Robinson, disposed of Lee Sala of Demora, Pa., via a second round knockout Thursday night. Sala was the No. 2 challenger.

"We are ready for Robinson any time he wants to fight," said Manager Sid Flaherty Friday. "However, I certainly doubt that Sugar Ray ever plans to fight again."

The ever silent Olson had no statement to make after his terrific "punching job" on Sala Thursday night.

"I'll just do whatever my manager says," was his sole comment on the future.

A crowd of 7,000 that paid \$27.056 to watch the slaughter howled in glee as the local favorite polished off the highly-touted young eastern campaigner.

The two men had waltzed through the first round, carefully feeling each other out and barely throwing a punch. It appears that Olson must have discovered something.

At the start of the second stanza, Sala came out and let loose a terrific left hook that swished past Olson's head. Bobo ducked and hid his time. Sala came again, and this time the Honolulu battler ripped a right straight at Sala's

jaw and the Pennsylvania youth dropped to the canvas.

He stayed for a count of seven, then got to his feet to finish the compulsory count of nine. But his legs were wobbly and Olson tore in with a left to the head and then a right to the jaw that sent his foe face forward to the floor.

At the count of three Sala rolled over on his back; he was sitting up at the eight count and was able to regain his feet just after the count of 10 had been tolled by Referee Jack Downey. Both fighters had weighed in at 163 pounds.

Part of the sell-out crowd at Winterland was attracted by world heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano, who refereed the 10-round semi-windup between veteran Nick Moran of Sonora, Mexico, and Maurice Harper of Oakland. Harper won a unanimous decision. It was Marciano's first appearance in San Francisco and he received a tremendous ovation.

Michigan Given Shaky Chance to Deadlock Race

CHICAGO, Nov. 24 (AP)—The odds-makers figured Friday that the Big Ten athletic directors will have to ponder a while Sunday before they choose between Michigan and Wisconsin as the Midwest's Rose Bowl representative.

Michigan, however, was rated as only a shaky choice to deadlock the Badgers for the conference championship and become one of the two teams meriting consideration in the balloting for the post-season game.

Only One Point
The Wolverines were rated only a point choice over Ohio State for their traditional final Saturday clash at Columbus, and the Buckeyes, winners of four of six conference matches, were given a good chance to pull an upset.

Wisconsin, on the other hand, was a 13-point favorite to down Minnesota, another of the four teams still in the running for the league title and the bowl, in their annual battle this year at Madison.

Michigan and Wisconsin were the top favorites to be the Rose Bowl club. If both win Saturday, they will tie for the Big Ten crown and one of them will go to the bowl. Should one win and the other lose, then the victor would be the league titleholder and would automatically get the bowl berth.

Also Chance
Minnesota and Purdue also had chances to get into the title and bowl race, but for either of these clubs to make the jump, both of the current league leaders must lose.

Purdue was a 14-point choice to drop the intra-state rival Hoosiers in their fight for the Old Oaken Bucket at Lafayette.

Only one other Big Ten game was on deck for the final day of the season, Northwestern at Illinois. The Illini—were 10-point favorites. Iowa will close its season against Notre Dame and was a two-touchdown underdog, while Michigan State was a four-touchdown favorite to finish the season undefeated and untied and with 24 straight wins by dropping Marquette at East Lansing.

Attendance Not Really So Bad; Trautman Claims

COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 21 (AP)—Minor league baseball's head man backed the alarmists against the wall with facts and figures Friday showing that the decline in attendance figures is not as serious as they might seem.

George M. Trautman, president of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues, attributes the greatest decline in attendance to the fact that some 2,000 players are now in the armed forces.

With 43 leagues operating at the beginning of the season and all finishing, Trautman pointed out that attendance during the past year was 2.7 per cent less than in 1951.

Some 25,301,253 persons paid to see minor league baseball last season according to Trautman. Of

this 24,024,373 were for regular season games, while the other paid admissions were for league playoffs.

Trautman said there had been "numerous contributing factors" in the decline in the number of minor leagues and clubs since 1949 but he believes the demands upon young men by the armed forces is the greatest. There were 59 minor leagues in 1949 while only 43 operate now.

The minor league proxy also reminded that the leagues are faced with "that old, haunting bugaboo—unlimited radio and television."

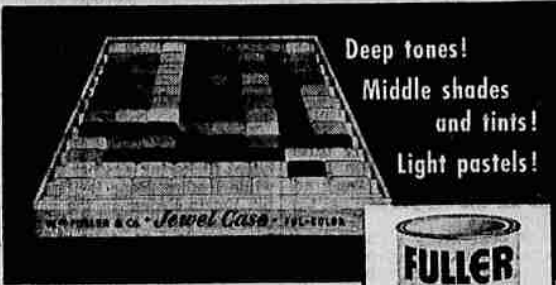
In class A-1, Marshfield entertains Benson of Portland at Coos Bay. In class A-2, St. Helens plays host to Mt. Angel.
