

## Campaign Costs Filed With State Elections Bureau

SALEM, Nov. 21.—The Oregon Railroad Association spent \$50,383 in support of the referred legislative act to increase the weight-mile tax rate on trucks and in opposition to the long-haul-trucker-sponsored initiative measure to abolish the weight-mile tax, the State Elections Bureau said this week.

Safeway Stores, Inc., Milton L. Selby secretary, spent \$22,448.21 in support of an initiative proposal to alter Oregon's milk production and marketing act.

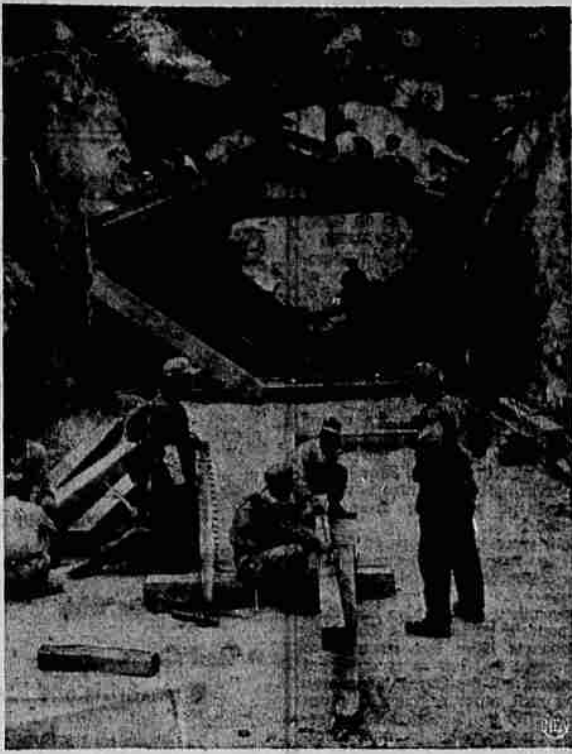

## Lawmakers Plan Portland Meet

PORTLAND, Nov. 21.—At least 80 out of 90 members of the 1953 Oregon state Legislature were expected here Friday.

Occasion is a meeting to talk over the code revision program to be considered officially later as well as other activities.

The lawmakers will attend a meeting of the League of Oregon Cities and later attend a reception at the Benson hotel at which new and old members can get acquainted.

State Rep. Rudie Wilhelm, who is expected to be speaker of the House, said he had received assurance that 58 of the 60 members of that body would attend. State Sen. Eugene Marsh said 22 of the 30 senators had promised to attend. Marsh is expected to be president of the Senate.

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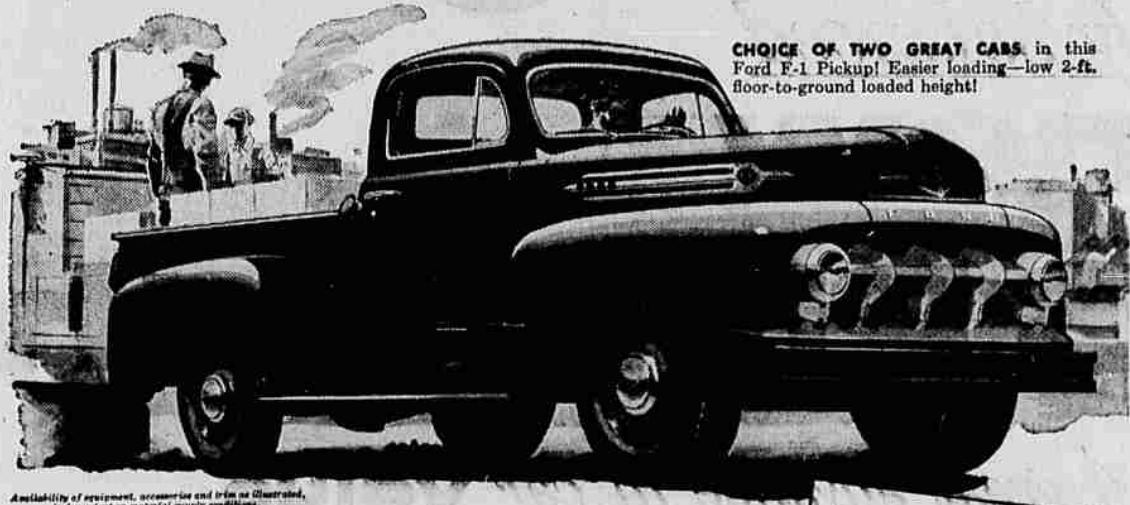
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
