Swearingen Hits Support Program

BAKER, Ore., Nov. 21 (AP)—Fixed, high-level government farm price supports encourage overproduction, restrict consumption, reduce exports and prevent conversion of surplus grain into livestock products, the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation convention was told Wednesday.

Marshall Swearingen, president of the group, said "we believe in 100 per cent of parity, but the government should not be called upon to supply it from the treasury. We believe that quality, enterprise and a free market should supply it. The government should not guarantee any group a profit."

Europe's Nations Move Away From Ideals of Unity Plan

Events in Europe today move like a sluggish river. The current is almost imperceptible, but week by week it may be measured and the direction remains the same. It is away from the high ideals set forth in dreams of a Europe unified politically and economically and back to tribal jealousies and suspicions traditionally settled by war, from the stone axe to the final, blinding flash of the atom bomb.

This sluggish European river flows along a path cut through the centuries, and apparently it can be reversed only by the strongest sustained pressures, and those from the outside, primarily from the United States.

For a time the United States applied those pressures and reversed the flow.

Then came our political campaigns and now the stale period while we await the change in administrations.

Six months ago, when hopes were running high first for the economic and military and finally for the political unity of Europe, a lion's share of the credit went to NATO Commander Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Only Eisenhower, it was said, the man who led the combined armies of the West to the final destruction of Hitler, had the stature to persuade Germans and

French to join in the same army. Next January, as President of the United States, Eisenhower will find much of his work to do over, both in France and in Germany.

This week, West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, one of the architects of European unity, suffered his worst political defeat in three years.

The Bonn Parliament rejected his request for ratification next week of the West German Peace Treaty and the European Army.

Earlier, West Germany's major political parties had united behind a resolution declaring the forthcoming elections in the Saar illegal and refusing to recognize any Saar government resulting from the elections.

Both were expressions of dissatisfaction with the government, and a rejection of the whole theory of unity.

Two other clouds also hover on Adenauer's horizon. His Christian Democrats have lost strength to both right and left in recent local elections and the German supreme court still must rule on a claim brought by the Socialists that German rearmament is unconstitutional.

In France, the Pinay government continues determinedly cheerful about prospects for eventual French ratification of the peace treaty and the army plan. But the Pinay government also is in trouble over Pinay's insistence on government

economies and strong criticism from both Socialists and right-wing De Gaullists of the German and European army treaties. De Gaulle may even attempt to throw the question of French and German participation in a common army into a national referendum.

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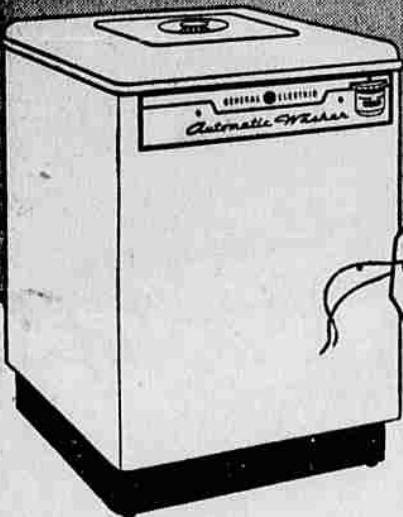
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
