

Weekly Balance Sheet Compares Good, Bad News

The week's balance sheet between the good and bad news in the hot and cold wars:

THE GOOD

1. Field Marshal Alexander Papagos, scourge of Communists and staunch friend of the United States won an overwhelming victory in Greece's third national election in three years. It remained to be seen whether Papagos could put steel into the tottering Greek economy as he had put steel into the Greek army. In any event the Greeks had their best chance for a strong central government since the end of World War II. For the West it meant that three of the toughest armies in Europe—Yugoslav, Greek and Turkish—were man, the southern wall against Russian aggression.

2. Britons had the assurances of their chancellor of the exchequer, R. A. Butler, that the nation no longer was in danger of "bleeding to death" from loss of gold and dollars. Britain, heart and banker of the vast sterling area, earned \$82,000,000 more in October than it spent. It was not the end of an economic battle which has included some \$3,000,000,000 in American aid, but it was a "breathing space."

3. A strong French force, including paratroopers, struck deep into rebel territory above Hanoi in Indo-China, along the Viet Minh lifeline from Red China. The attackers withdrew after destroying supply dumps which are more important to the Reds than manpower. It signified growing French strength and meant that, for now at least, Hanoi was safe.

THE BAD

1. A deadlock within a deadlock was developing on the Korean truce issue. An Indian proposal to the United Nations which sought to meet objections of both sides on the exchange of war prisoners, met immediate U. S. opposition. The Russians also were reported cool, as was Peiping. However, many of our Western Allies were urging careful study of the Indian plan which held out the hope for an early cease-fire while a neutral commission argued how and under what circumstances war prisoners should be released.

2. Hopes for the early unification of Western Europe were deteriorating steadily. Opposition was growing both in France and West Germany, keys to any plan to join Europe economically, politically or militarily. In Germany Chancellor Konrad Adenauer suffered one of the worst defeats of his political career when the Bundestag turned down his motion for passage of the German peace treaty and the European army plan. In France, opposition was coming from both Socialists and De Gaulists.

3. Increased efforts to set up an Eastern Mediterranean defense command reflected fears—held particularly in Turkey—that Iran now would go Communist sooner rather than later, not only vastly extending Turkey's frontier with the Reds but endangering the whole Mid-Eastern oil set-up. There also was a British conviction that British troops eventually would have to leave Suez and that the Island of Cyprus would become the nerve center of Mid-Eastern defenses.

PRINEVILLE, Nov. 21 — The November meeting of the Central Oregon Chamber of Commerce will be held Tuesday night, Nov. 25, in Redmond, with the area's power shortage expected to be the principal topic of discussion.

It is also expected that members of the Madras and other delegation will urge renewed backing for the Portland General Electric Company's plan to construct a multi-million dollar power generating dam at the Pelton site, in the Deschutes gorge.

Women Are More Plentiful Than Men in America

CHICAGO, Nov. 21 (AP)—Lady, if you can't find a man, cheer up. You are not alone.

There definitely is a shortage of men, an American Medical Association Journal editorial said Friday.

And the situation will get worse.

The Journal said if it had not been for the war deaths in World War II the present excess of American women over men would be about one-third of a million less.

Other factors contributing to the scarcity of men, the editorial said, is the high death rate in males, and the entrance of more female immigrants into this country.

But because of continuing war deaths, "the present indications are that this excess will become even larger in the future," the AMA editorial predicted.

The 1950 census showed there were 1,430,000 more women than men in the United States. The greatest difference occurs in the age groups over 45 years, where women outnumber men 1,000 to 956, the Journal said.
