All 13 Reds Found Guilty In New York

NEW YORK, Jan. 21 (AP)—All 13 Communist defendants were found guilty by a federal jury Wednesday on charges they taught and advocated the overthrow of the U. S. government by force and violence.

The jury reached its verdict after 48 hours and 24 minutes of actual deliberation on the seventh day since it was closeted to consider the fate of the defendants.

Mrs. Lucille Collette, foreman of the jury read the verdict: "We find all the defendants guilty as charged."

Eleven top Communist leaders were convicted in the same courtroom after a record-breaking 11 months trial, more than three years ago.

Note Opened
Federal Judge Dimock opened a note from the jury at 11:45 a. m. It stated simply: "We have reached a verdict."

Within seconds the courtroom filled with spectators and deputy U. S. marshals and government building guards took their places around the courtroom.

Each of the defendants faced a possible maximum penalty of five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine, upon conviction.

The 13 lower-echelon party leaders were among 21 originally indicted. Four are now fugitives, two had their cases severed because of illness, and two were acquitted earlier.

Sentencing Set
Judge Dimock set a week from today for sentencing and sent all the prisoners to the Federal House of Detention.

He asked U. S. Attorney Myles J. Lane to discuss with him, however, the detention of Jacob Mindel, 71-year-old defendant who suffered a heart attack during the trial.

Judge Dimock thanked the jury for a "simply phenomenal" exhibition of "careful study and knowledge you showed of the record."

He told them their verdict was "amply justified by the evidence."

Deputy DA Post Still Unfilled

Action taken last week by the Redmond city council to allow no new tenants in the Redmond air base housing unit may or may not help District Attorney E. O. Stadter fill the post of deputy district attorney there.

The position was vacated January 5 when Thomas Boeke resigned due to an over load of work. None of the other Redmond attorneys approached for the job have accepted, Stadter said.

Complaints involving residents of the housing unit which was opened after the second world war, have multiplied the deputy's work, Stadter continued. Compared with the amount of work, compensation was too low. However, Boeke said that the \$75 per month he received for his services was not the determining factor in his resignation.

Stadter contends that the salaries paid Oregon district attorneys and their deputies are "far too low."

"The problem requires action by the legislature," he said.

In Boeke's case, the Deschutes county court offered to raise the stipend \$35. However, this did not affect the former deputy's decision to resign.

Stadter claims that Redmond needs a deputy district attorney. The possible absence of one will prevent people there from using to full advantage the legal services rightfully theirs.

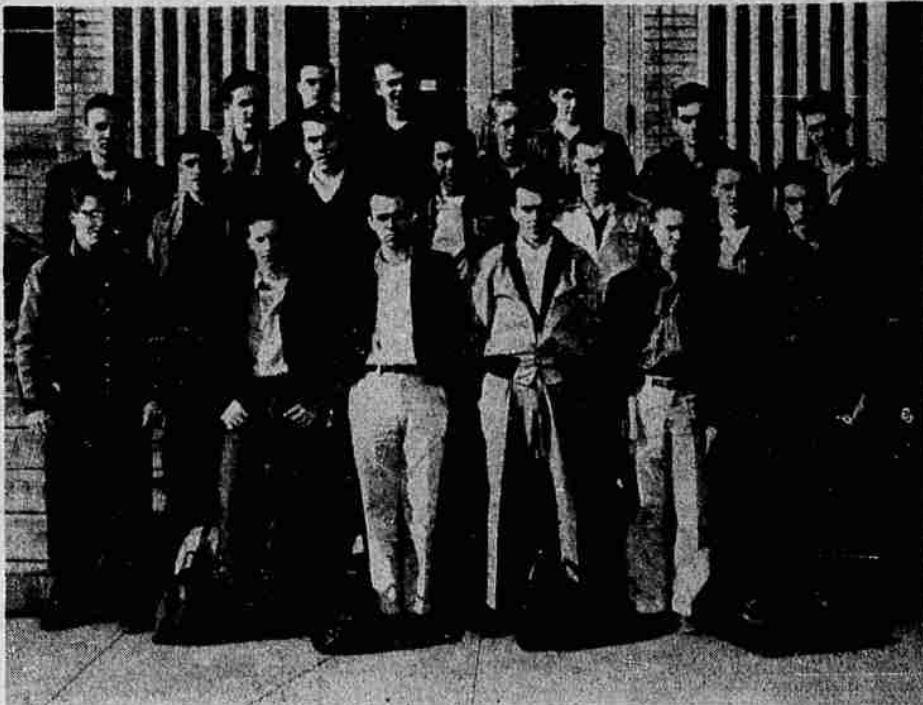
Eligibility List Filed at City Hall

McKay Says His Chief Aim Is to Serve All the People

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (U.P.)—Secretary of Interior Douglas McKay Wednesday described himself as a "middle of the road" on public power and said his "principal interest is to serve all the people."

"I'm neither for nor against public or private power," the new secretary told newsmen. "Private enterprise and public ownership can work hand in hand. I want each to get a fair break."

Asked about his attitude on multipurpose reclamation projects, the former Oregon governor said he is "thoroughly in accord with their development when feasible."

However, McKay said he will work for "revision" of public preference laws. He said the nation needs a "more effective water policy which should come from congress to be followed by the interior department."

He is Niles E. Hamberg, 22, and he has been charged with stealing a 30-ton truck and trailer at Redding, Calif., Monday night and starting on a joyride which ended when he was arrested by state police last night at Terrebonne.

According to Oregon state police, Hamberg admitted taking the huge outfit, owned by the Oregon-California-Nevada Fast Freight line, on an impulse after he had climbed into the cab of the idle unit with the intention of taking a nap. The youth also told arresting officers, they reported, that his home is at North Bend, Wash., and that he decided to drive the truck as far as possible in that direction until the supply of diesel fuel gave out.

Deciding that the big trailer was too cumbersome, Hamberg abandoned it at Klamath Falls, he said. Authorities there, informed by Redding police of the theft, in turn notified state police at Bend after the abandoned trailer had been found. Bend state police notified an officer at Madras, who intercepted the truck at Terrebonne about 9 o'clock last night.

It was expected that California authorities will arrive within the next day or so, to return Hamberg to Redding for trial.

Pelton Dam Bill In Preparation

SALEM, Jan. 21 (AP)—A bill to authorize court appeals from decisions of the state's Hydroelectric Commission was being prepared by central Oregon legislators Wednesday to clear the way for construction of the Pelton dam.

The commission at present is sole authority on hydroelectric decisions within the state. The lawmakers disclosed they would also propose that commission membership be raised from three to five—four to be appointed by the governor and the fifth to be the state engineer.

Reason for the legislation is to get the Pelton dam going on the Deschutes river, the legislators said.

The bill is being spearheaded by Rep. Boyd Overhulse of Madras. Other lawmakers who will join Overhulse in sponsoring the measure are Representatives B. A. Stover and Alva C. Goodrich, both of Bend; Rep. Ed Geary, Klamath Falls; Sen. Philip H. Hitchcock, Klamath Falls, and Sen. Elmo H. Smith, Burns.

20 Young Men Off for Service

Twenty young men from Central Oregon left by Trailways bus at 1:15 Tuesday afternoon for the Portland induction center, from where they will be sent to various training centers. The group was part of a 22-man quota to be filled in January by the Tri-County selective service board, No. 20.

Wulf was named leader of the group and Johnson was assistant leader.

McKay pledged to end the government's wardship of Indians "as quickly as possible."

"The Indians must be regarded as people and citizens, not as Indians," he said. He said the first step is "getting the Indian kids in public school rather than one on the reservation."

McKay left no doubt as to his stand on the controversial offshore oil deposits which former President Truman turned over to the Navy Friday.

"I believe in states' rights for the tidelands," he said.

Road Opening Date Indefinite

The South Santiam highway will be closed for some time, as a result of the huge slide that occurred Sunday during the peak of the heavy rainstorm sweeping the Pacific Northwest, according to word received in Bend today.

The slide, at Milepost 45.5, this side of the Mountain House, carried a large section of the highway into the South Santiam river. It will be necessary for state highway crews to carve a detour through the slide area, it was reported.

Indicating the seriousness of the undertaking, the highway in the slide area crosses the face of an ancient, weathered volcano. Geologists have found that the entire face of the slope, about a mile across, is "on the move," posing for highway maintenance crews a major problem.

Several years ago a similar slide carried the timbered slope over the highway and into the gorge of the South Santiam.

Eight Cabinet Members Confirmed by Senators

Flood Stage Of Willamette Moving North

(By United Press)

Flood stage of the Willamette river moved rapidly downstream Wednesday and residents of the flood-stricken upper valley regions began the soggy job of cleaning up. Rivers in the flooded southwestern Oregon section continued to fall but the situation in some areas still was critical.

The Willamette rose to 19.5 feet at Portland Wednesday, 1.5 feet above flood stage. The weather bureau said the river was expected to crest at 20 feet late Wednesday night. Some low-lying docks were expected to be flooded but otherwise Portland officials foresaw little damage.

Crests at Salem

The river crested at 26 feet at Salem early Wednesday. At Albany the stream was at 24.7 feet, a drop of 3.25 feet in 24 hours, but still nearly five feet above flood stage.

As the Willamette valley began drying off and flooded-out residents hoped the worst was over, reports began trickling in from the southwestern coastal area of damage caused by high winds, slides and floods during the last four days.

A "ham" radio operator at Brookings relayed word from M. S. Brainard, a newspaper correspondent, that some 250 persons still were stranded at Gold Beach and all private and public facilities for caring for them were becoming exhausted.

Telephone communication between Brookings and Gold Beach was restored Tuesday night but the area otherwise was isolated, except for light plane service.

U.S. 101 Still Blocked

Highway 101 still was a blocked near Gold Beach but other major north-south routes were open into California. The Oregon Motor Association reported Wednesday that a slide which blocked Highway 99 near Redding, Cal., Tuesday night had been cleared and traffic was going through. The association said four inches of water covered 99 near Lake Labish but traffic was going through with police escort. The Redwood highway between Grants Pass and Crescent City, Calif., also was opened Wednesday.

Still closed were the Albany-Corvallis alternate route and the South Santiam highway.

Archery Group Sets Meeting

Roger Lee, Weaker of Brodie Twins, Dies; Father Says He Guesses 'Lord Knew Best'

CHICAGO, Jan. 21 (AP)—Roger Lee Brodie, whose fate was sealed on an operating table 35 days ago when he was separated from his stronger Siamese twin, died Tuesday night after more than 800 hours in a deep coma.

Twin Rodney Dee rested easily in a nearby crib while doctors and nurses made an eleventh hour attempt to save his brother.

Roger Lee's tiny body was sponged repeatedly in an attempt to bring down his rising body temperature. His throat was swabbed free of choking mucus as his respiration faltered.

At about 9 p. m. CST the 16-month-old child's heart stopped beating.

Weekly Press Conferences To Continue, TV Also Eyed

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (U.P.)—President Eisenhower will continue the system of holding regular weekly news conferences, and possibly televising one a month if mechanical problems can be worked out, it was announced Wednesday.

Presidential Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said

there would be no news conference this week because of the heavy amount of work facing Mr. Eisenhower.

However, Hagerty said he "assumed" that Mr. Eisenhower would have his first meeting with newsmen next week.

Hagerty said the present freedom of questioning would continue and that Mr. Eisenhower had no intention of changing the system that has been in effect at the White House for many years.

Plans Uncertain

Prospects of a televised and broadcast meeting with reporters once a month remained to be developed finally.

"This is the way we are thinking," Hagerty said.

There never has been a "live" television broadcast of a presidential news conference although television cameras have recorded some portions of conferences for broadcast later.

There had been some speculation recently that Mr. Eisenhower would object to regularly-scheduled no-questions-barred meetings with newsmen such as the late Franklin D. Roosevelt started and Harry S. Truman continued.

Plug by HST

Last Thursday at his 324th and final news conference as President, Mr. Truman put in a plug for the open and free news conference.

"I think it is important for our democratic system of government that every medium of communication between the citizens and their government, particularly the President, be kept open as far as possible," Mr. Truman said in a statement.

Canada Honker Trying to Lure Birds South?

Bend's riverside residents were wondering today if the Canada honker, one of two geese brought here from Redmond this week and released in the Mirror pond, is attempting to induce the local birds to join in a southward migration.

Since the honker joined the Mirror pond flock, the local geese have been in the air frequently, and before sunrise this morning 20 of the big birds formed a temporary "V" over the pond and headed into the south. However, they soon returned, and settled on the Mirror pond.

Riverside residents said it appeared that one of the flying geese was attempting to steer the local flock into the south, but lost control of the flight when it moved away from the Mirror pond.

The visiting goose, brought here from the Robert Mitchell place near Redmond, is a migrant that had been fed and cared for by Mitchell. A white-fronted goose was also brought here by Mitchell.

ALARM ANSWERED

The Bend fire department answered a still alarm Tuesday at 6:15 p. m. and sent a truck to 820 Roosevelt, where a car fire had been reported. The fire was out when the truck reached the scene. The car, owned by J. W. Cunningham, was not greatly damaged, it was reported.

Wilson's Fate Not Decided By Lawmakers

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21 (AP)—The Senate Wednesday belatedly confirmed eight of President Eisenhower's cabinet choices.

The fate of Charles E. Wilson to be defense secretary remained much in doubt.

The approved eight were expected to be sworn in at the White House late in the day, putting the Eisenhower cabinet in business after a 24-hour delay.

Mr. Eisenhower had requested they be approved Tuesday so they could take over a few hours after he became President. Sen. Wayne Morse (Ind.-Ore.) blocked the hurry-up action.

Wednesday Morse told the Senate he now was ready to okay the eight.

"Up in Air"

Senate Majority Leader Robert A. Taft told newsmen the entire Wilson matter is "up in the air."

Another Republican senator, who asked that he not be identified, believed Mr. Eisenhower "will have to withdraw the Wilson appointment." There was no suggestion from the White House that such a move is in prospect.

George M. Humphrey, Ohio, secretary of treasury.

Herbert Brownell Jr., New York, attorney general.

Arthur E. Summerfield of Michigan, postmaster general.

Elza Taft Benson, Utah, secretary of agriculture.

Sinclair Weeks of Massachusetts, secretary of commerce.

Martin P. Durkin, Maryland, secretary of labor.

Also Confirmed

Also confirmed was Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby of Texas to be federal security administrator. Mr. Eisenhower has said Mrs. Hobby will set in on cabinet meetings.

The Senate acted by voice vote on all the nominations at once. There were no audible negative votes.

Morse, who blocked action on eight cabinet selections Tuesday, told the Senate today he now is satisfied the men "meet the test" of character and ability.

After Morse finished, there was a long discussion of the views of Douglas McKay—the secretary of interior nominee. Sen. Warren G. Magnuson (D-Wash.) said he wanted to be on record against McKay's nomination because of the former Oregon governor's views on public power, tidelands and development of Alaska.

Also Oppose Views

Morse and Sen. Herbert H. Lehman (D-N.Y.) said they also oppose McKay's views. They said they will vote for him, however, as Eisenhower's choice. All agreed that there is no question about McKay's personal "integrity."

Sen. Spessard L. Holland (D-Fla.) joined Sen. Russell Long (D-La.) in applauding McKay's stand for state ownership of the tidelands, and Sen. Guy M. Cordon (R-Ore.) defended McKay's views on the controversial public power issue.

Cordon said McKay believes public and private power interests can work together but opposes "socialized" power schemes.

Youth Charged With Pointing Gun at Another

Robert M. Calloway, 23, who lives near Redmond, was arrested today by state police officers on a charge of pointing a gun at another. A complaint signed by Don F. Adkins, Salem, alleges that Calloway, falsely identifying himself as a federal officer, pointed a pistol at him and another companion in Redmond last night.

According to Adkins, the car in which he was traveling was following one driven by Calloway on highway 97. Both were heading north toward Redmond. Adkins claims that the glare of his headlights evidently angered Calloway, for when both cars reached Redmond, Calloway accused Adkins and his companion with the pistol. Calloway is being held in Deschutes county jail.
