Advisory Group Favors Changes

PORTLAND, Jan. 21 (AP)—The State Milk Marketing Administration's new advisory committee Wednesday recommended legislation to set up new milk marketing areas and to fine price violators.

The advisory group, meeting with the administration, also recommended another plan to establish present minimum milk prices as maximums.

Action on proposals to legalize present milk distributor pools, define a producer-distributor as a dairyman that produces at least 75 per cent of the milk he sells and to boost wages of milk administration employees, was deferred.

The requested law to punish unfair trade practices in the dairy industry would allow the milk administration to fine price violators from \$100 to \$50 through court action.

Proposed change in the marketing section of the milk law would allow the administration to set up marketing areas as it sees fit. This would permit grouping several counties into a single marketing area in cases where similar problems and conditions prevail.

Trumans Heading For Home Town Of Independence

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Jan. 21 (AP)—Harry S. Truman and his wife, Bess, were on their way to Independence, Mo., Wednesday to take their place as "just plain private citizens" for the first time since 1934.

The former President was riding aboard the presidential railroad car loaned to him by President Eisenhower. The car was a part of the Baltimore and Ohio Limited No. 1, due to arrive here Wednesday afternoon.

Here Mr. Truman and his wife will board a Missouri and Pacific train for Independence and will arrive in the little Kansas City suburb at about 7:30 p.m.

In Public Eye
 Since 1934, when he first was elected U. S. senator, Mr. Truman and his wife have been in the public eye. Bess Truman is first to admit that she is glad it's over.

At a luncheon Tuesday with his outgoing Cabinet, Mr. Truman quipped that he was now "just Mr. Truman, plain citizen."

He lost the last symbol of the presidency as the train pulled out—his Secret Service guard. Jackson N. Krill, head of the Secret Service office in Kansas City which for nearly eight years has guarded Mr. Truman during his trips home, pulled off his detail after the inauguration Tuesday and said that "Mr. Truman is on his own now."
