Horse Racing, Liquor Bills Reach Committees at Salem

SALEM, Jan. 21 (AP)—Two measures expected to generate some of the liveliest debating of the 1933 Oregon legislative session reached committee stage Wednesday—horse racing and liquor by the drink.

A bill introduced by Rep. Joseph E. Harvey of Portland would take the state's share of pari-mutuel betting on horse and dog races away from county fairs and other expositions and put the money into the general fund for redistribution by the Joint Ways and Means Committee at future sessions of the Legislature.

The first and most important of the liquor bills, introduced to enable the sale of liquor by the drink as approved by Oregon voters in November was up for second reading in the House and assignment to committee Wednesday.

For the first time since prohibition, restaurants and clubs would be permitted to buy liquor containing more than 14 per cent alcohol by volume to sell to their customers or members by the drink.

The measure, House Bill 95, was sponsored by the House Committee on Alcoholic Control at request of the Oregon Liquor Control Commission as the first of 10 bills designed to enable the intent of the voters.

The bottle club outlets—there are 530 in Oregon—would still retain the privilege of bottles brought in by members or guests for sale as at present on a setup basis. But they would be permitted the further privilege of sale by the drink. For counties or cities that don't want to go along with the rest of the state and more liberal liquor

ment which asked the Committee on Natural Resources to submit the bill, said the forest patrol already is in effect and the purpose of this act is to ratify the present existence and use of the forest patrol fund as a sub-account of the general fund and to establish such fund definitely by statute. It applies to the interstate pact between Oregon and Washington over fishing rights on the Columbia river and there deletes a clause providing "that any regulation, may be deemed or interpreted to have modified or changed such agreement shall expire on the 21st day of January of each year."

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
