Teams Seeking Berths in U. S. Cage Tourneys

NEW YORK, Feb. 21 (AP)—College basketball's battles for tournament berths resume full-blown tonight as Oklahoma A & M seeks to clinch at least a tie for the Missouri Valley title by beating Tulsa, and North Carolina State squares off with North Carolina in a Southern Conference showdown.

In all, nine of the nation's top 10 teams are in action. Indiana, ranked tops by the United Press board of coaches, goes after its 13th straight Big Ten conference triumph at home against Ohio State, while second-ranked Seton Hall shoots for its 26th straight victory against Loyola at Chicago Stadium.

There also are vital games affecting conference leadership in the Southwest, where Rice is at Texas Christian, and in the Southern Division of the Pacific Coast Conference, where California guards its lead against Southern California. The Trojans beat California, 68 to 66, last night.

The famed coaching Iba Brothers, Hank of the Oklahoma Aggies and Clarence of Tulsa, match will again tonight at Tulsa with the conference leadership at stake. The Aggies, 5-2 in league play and 17-5 overall, can assure themselves of at least a tie for the Missouri Valley title by winning. A Tulsa triumph will deadlock the teams at 5-3.

Got a Firm Grip
In the Southern Conference, North Carolina State can retain undisputed possession of first place and avenge a previous defeat by turning back North Carolina at Chapel Hill. N. C. Coach Frank McGuire's Tarheels edged State, 70 to 69, last month. N. C. State is 12-3 in conference play and North Carolina 15-4.

Seton Hall, the nation's only remaining undefeated major college team, can tie a record tonight by extending its streak to 26 straight. The major college single season record of 26 was set by Long Island University and Holy Cross. The game will be a stiff test of Seton Hall's ability to win away from home.

Needs Game to Run
Texas Christian, tied with Texas at 6-2 in the Southwest Conference race, needs a victory over Rice at home tonight to stay in the running. Texas should have little trouble at home against last-place Southern Methodist.

Southern California can tie for the PCC's southern division lead by beating California again tonight. Two free throws in the last minute by Ken Flowers won for the Trojans last night. Meanwhile, the Washington Huskies clinched their third straight northern division crown by walloping Oregon, 84 to 67. It was their 13th straight league triumph. In other PCC games, Washington State beat Oregon State 56 to 50, and UCLA trimmed Stanford, 75 to 50.

Cougars Snap Losing Streak

PULLMAN, Feb. 21 (AP)—Washington State's Cougars snapped an 11-game losing streak last night by turning back fourth-place Oregon State, 56-50, in a Northern Division basketball tilt.

It was the Cougars' first victory since they downed the Beavers in Corvallis Jan. 6. Oregon State dominated the first half, but Washington State surged ahead early in the third period on a pair of field goals by Forward Bob Swanson and another by high point man Pete Mullins.

The baskets gave the Cougars a 32-27 lead and they were ahead by no less than four points from then on. Field goals by Forward Jim Suggre and Center Ted Romanoff brought the Beavers within four points, 35-39, late in the third period, which ended with the count 42-37.

Fouls Help
The Cougars pulled down their second victory in 14 division tries by making good on 10 free throws in the final period. They led by margins of 49-42, 53-45, and 56-47 as they fought on even terms with the taller Beavers on the backboards and made hay out of the three-minute rule for the first time this year.

Mullins, accounting for 10 of the Cougars' free throws, led all scorers with 20. Guard Ron Benkinn followed with 11. Tony Vlastelica, Oregon State's fine hook shot artist, had a limited number of scoring chances and tallied 13 points.

Layne-Charles Bout Arranged

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 21 (AP)—Former heavyweight champ, Ezzard Charles and Rex Layne, the Utah rough-houser, will stage an "elimination" contest here on April Fool's Day, with the winner guaranteed a shot at Rocky Marciano's world championship in September.

That is, provided Marciano still wears the crown. He faces Joe Walcott on April 10 in Chicago. But if Marciano wins the Walcott match, he'll meet the victor of the Layne-Charles battle in an open air extravaganza at Kezar Stadium.

"This is where Marciano wants to defend his title next time out," promoter Jimmy Murray said after he had signed the Layne-Charles match. "He knows it would guarantee a big gate." Kezar, a football stadium with a 60,000 seat capacity, would handle about 80,000 for a boxing match.

Charles and Layne have met before, Charles winning at Pittsburg on a TKO and Layne taking a very disputed decision by Jack Dempsey at Salt Lake.

For the April 1 battle, each will take home 30 per cent of the receipts with the house slated for a \$50,000 gate.

Brewery Buys St. Louis Cards From Fred Saigh

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 21 (AP)—The St. Louis Cardinals had a new and untried owner today, but the steady hand of a baseball veteran was at the helm.

August A. Busch, Jr., head of the Anheuser-Busch, Inc., brewery which bought the club from Fred M. Saigh, said he would be president of the National League team but made it clear that William Walsingham, Jr., would be in charge of its activities.

Walsingham, a career baseball man who started as a ticket seller at Sportsman's Park when his uncle, the late Sam Breadon, owned the Red Birds, took over the job with a backlog of front office experience.

Worth More Money
He is a vice-president, a job he has held since 1947 when he took over as operating head of the baseball organization which includes nine minor league clubs. Saigh, who begins serving a 15-month federal prison sentence on May 4 for income tax evasion, sold the Cardinal property outright to Busch yesterday for \$3,750,000, turning down a higher offer from a Milwaukee brewer, so that the club would remain in St. Louis.

Busch said \$2,500,000 of the amount was in cash and the remainder was borrowed. Saigh said he was satisfied with the deal, although he could have gotten more, because the \$2,500,000 was his net in the transaction.

New To The Game
Saigh admitted he was a new to the baseball game and hasn't even seen a game "in recent years," but said he plans to go to Florida soon to watch the Cardinals in spring training at St. Petersburg. His previous sports interests were confined to Schmauss, show horses and big game and fox hunting. His lavish estate, Grant's Farm, is stocked with deer and buffalo.

The principal product of Anheuser-Busch is Budweiser beer, but Busch said a contract for broadcasting the Cardinals games by a competing brewery would not be changed, this year at least.

Araujo Defeats Paddy DeMarco

NEW YORK, Feb. 21 (AP)—Matchmaker Billy Brown designated young Georgia Araujo lightweight challenger today because of his split 10-round decision over Paddy DeMarco, the "Brooklyn Billy-goat," before 5,163 at Madison Square Garden.

The 22-year-old speedster from Providence, R.I., out-boxed Paddy consistently last night and out-fought him at times in their nationally televised and broadcast bout.

Araujo, 133 1/2 pounds, had the better of the milling when he could keep his 135-pound opponent at long range, when he could evade Paddy's rushes and spear him with left jabs or knock him back onto his heels with paid left hooks.

But when Paddy's headlong rushes pinned the fast-stepping Portuguese Negro from Providence against the ropes or in corners, DeMarco's combined head-and-hook attack gave Georgia the worst of it. "I'm asking promoter Jim Norris to match Araujo with champion James Carter for the title at the Garden in May," matchmaker Brown said. "The New York commission has approved Georgia as a logical contender."
