Noe Won't Play In N. Y. Game

EUGENE, March 21 (AP)—Bill Borchert, University of Oregon basketball coach, today said he had received word that Center Chet Noe will not take part in the East-West college-all-star game in New York.

Earlier, Noe had been invited to play in the game to repay if he was interested. He did and went to the AAU tourney in Denver, expecting to go on to New York to compete in the game.

However, Borchert said he had received a telegram from Irving March of the sponsoring New York Herald Tribune which said that first telegram was merely a feeler and that the teams had enough centers already. Borchert informed Noe in Denver.

Noe, who originally had not planned to participate in any post-season events until he received what he thought was invitation to play in all-star game, will lose his eligibility to compete on Oregon's track team as a shot-putter. His participation in the AAU meet in Denver makes him ineligible for track competition, under Pacific Coast conference rules.

Anger Shown By Billy Cox For Benching

MIAMI, Fla., March 21 (AP)—Third Baseman Billy Cox, slumped aside in the Dodgers' spring juggling of their infield, snapped out his irritation with manager Charley Dressen today and there were quick, angry grumbles of sympathy from other members of the team.

Alarmed that serious dissension might be breaking out in the ranks of the National League champions, Dodger high brass were holding hurried conferences with Cox and other players to restore peace.

Cox, the skinny, fancy-fielding veteran, has been almost the "forgotten man" of the Dodgers' camp this spring as Manager Dressen tried out a succession of rookies at third and, finally, as Dressen put Jackie Robinson at third in the last two games to make room for Junior Gilliam at Robinson's old second-base slot.

The 33-year-old Cox, generally considered the finest fielding third baseman in the major leagues, bore his benching in silence until yesterday. Then he suddenly snapped out, "this ain't worth a damn."

Several other Dodger players, asking not to be quoted by name, criticized Dressen even more severely for what they considered a slight to Cox.

The situation developed so alarmingly that Club President Walter O'Malley disclosed last night that Vice Presidents E. J. Buzzy, B. A. V. and Fresno Thompson would go so far as to work to "deal promptly" with the situation.

I cannot believe that a serious situation exists, as no player has spoken to Buzzy, Thompson, or myself," said O'Malley. "Buzzy will join Thompson and Dressen today and, if there is anything more to this than spring popoff, we will deal promptly with the situation."

Shortstop and team captain Alvin Dark of the Giants saw fit today to affirm his allegiance to Manager Leo Durocher.

"Leo's the manager," he said. "I'll play any position he wants me to."

Dark spoke at a press conference hastily called by Durocher to refute reports that Dark was deliberately undermining the manager's effort to create a new infield built around rookie shortstop Daryl Spencer.

The reports stated that Dark was frustrating the shift by refusing to play at top speed in exhibition games.

Dark, who has a two-year contract, said the stories "are not true." He conceded that he had looked bad in recent exhibition games but said the diamonds had been rough. He said the stories were distortions by newspapermen and then stormed out of the room in which the conference was held.

Whitfield won the 600-yard race in 1:11.5 at the Knights of Columbus indoor games in Cleveland last night, with McKenley second, while Stanfield and Rhoden warmed up for tonight's performance at the Canadian Legion Meet in Montreal. Stanfield won the 50-yard open dash in 5.4 seconds and Rhoden won the 500-yard open race in 59 seconds.

SPARTANBURG, S. C., March 21 (AP)—Louise Suggs of Atlanta, Ga., sets out to bolster her stroke lead today in the second round of the \$3,500 Betsy Rawls Invitational golf tournament.

Miss Suggs chopped seven strokes off women's par yesterday with a first round 68.

That gave her only a one-stroke edge over Miss Rawls, the local player for whom the women's professional tournament was named, and Jackie Pung of Honolulu. Miss Rawls and Mrs. Pung opened the 54-hole competition with 69's.

The Rainiers meet Portland here tomorrow for their final pre-season tilt.

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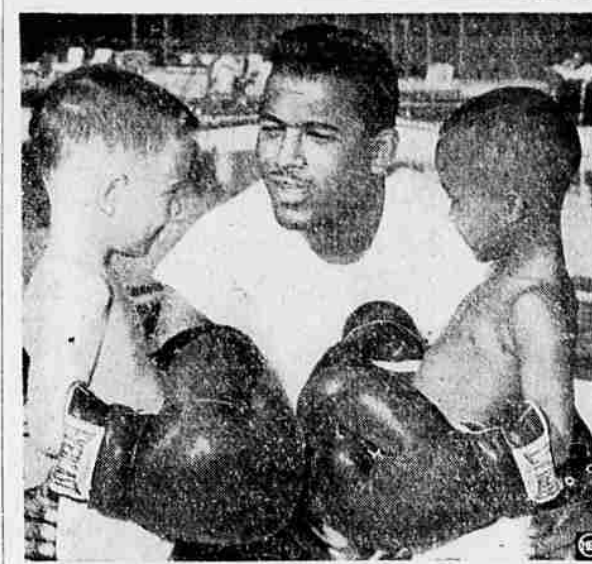
