Collectors Offer High Prices For Civil War Money

WASHINGTON, April 21 (AP)—May be Mrs. Hank Fort had something in her song called, "Save Your Confederate Money, Boys—The South Shall Rise Again."

Mrs. Fort, of course, wrote the song in jest in collaboration with Larry Markes and Justin Stone.

She tried it out on visiting editors at a Press Club breakfast here and caught some rebel yells when she allowed that after the South "whups the Yanks, the South will open up the banks—and declare a dividend!"

Well, now, it develops that some Confederate money is worth a pretty penny these days. The report came out appropriately during National Coin Week.

Money Valuable
E. Ward Russell, head of the Washington Numismatic Society, says that some of the South's inflationary Civil War currency has been bringing fancy prices at auction. The Society has a public exhibit of some of this money this week at the National museum.

For example, says Russell, a 1793 penny in good condition recently brought \$2,000.

If you happen to have a Confederate half dollar minted in 1861—an original, and not a re-strike, you can name your own price. Only four such pieces were struck that year.

But to get back to Mrs. Fort. She's an attractive lady and comes by her Southern accent with honesty since she hails from Nashville, Tenn.

Music in Soul
"My parents both were artistic," she says, and I was born with music in my soul. It just had to come out."

Mrs. Fort has been writing songs about as long as she can remember. Being from Tennessee she took a shine to Sen. Estes Kefauver when that gentleman was making a bid for the Democratic Presidential nomination.

She composed a little ditty which she called "The Tall Guy in the Coonskin Cap." This one got quite a house when the band struck up at various pre-convention Kefauver rallies.

Another tune Mrs. Fort particularly likes is one she called "Put your shoes on, Lucy—You're a big girl now."

Still another she called "You Can't Hurt Me, Cause I'm Daid." Mrs. Fort, a flutney person, held up our interview a half an hour for something more important.

"You don't mind, do you, if I turn on this kid show on the television?" she asked.

She turned on the set and took down with the giggles through the whole thing.

Most of her songs were a southern flavor, but there's one word she doesn't like. That's "hillbilly." "My stuff," she said, "is real music and not the hill kind."

New England Red Probe Renewed

WASHINGTON, April 21 (AP)—The House Un-American Activities committee called three Boston witnesses to testify today as it resumed its investigation of alleged Red infiltration in the New England area.

Chairman Harold H. Velde (R-Ill.) told newsmen that Theodore S. Polunbaum, 28-year-old employee of the photographic department of the United Press in Boston, was scheduled as the first witness in the three-day hearing. The other two called for the first session were not identified.

Polunbaum and his wife, Nina, were described by committee counsel at a hearing last week as having been "participants" in a Communist Party youth movement in New Haven, Conn., in the late 1940's.

Dr. Daniel Fine, 29-year-old graduate and now a resident physician at Boston's Peter Bent Brigham hospital, refused to say then if he knew them, on grounds his answer might be self-incriminating. He also pleaded possible self-incrimination in refusing to say if he is a Communist.

Bend Man Taken In Texas Town

A Bend man, 24-year-old Bob Ballentine, was apprehended by city police in Sweetwater, Texas, while he was operating an automobile reported stolen from the Central Oregon Motors, Redmond, early last week.

Although no complaint has been filed against Ballentine to date, F. B. I. authorities have taken him into custody at Sweetwater, reports received here have stated. The car, a red Lincoln convertible, is registered to Lloyd Hudspeth, John Day, and was in the garage at Redmond for repairs.

The F. B. I. was called into the case because the car was taken across state boundaries. Ballentine has been employed at a creamery in Redmond.
