

Radio Station in Manila Spreads Gospel in East

MANILA (UP)—A radio station built by the faith of three young Americans on the outskirts of Manila daily spreads the voice of Christianity around the world and through the Iron Curtain of Soviet Russia and Red China.

For 19 hours a day in 34 languages and dialects, radio station DZAS broadcasts to 25 countries programs of public interest and welfare—music, education, first aid, hygiene, agriculture, news—and Bible studies.

Its eight powerful transmitters, using specially beamed antennas, carry into the farthest corners of Russia and China, from Japan to Indonesia and all countries in between, and even to the United States and Europe. Its main aim, however, is to spread Christianity in Asia.

The non-commercial, non-profit station is inter-denominational. No time is sold. Its airwaves are freely open to all missionary and evangelical groups, to churches and local pastors and individuals, so long as their objective is to preach salvation through Christ.

Built On Faith
There is no fixed income. The station and its operators are supported only by the donations of listeners and persons.

Literally, the station was built on faith. After the end of the world war II, John C. Broger, a navy veteran from Fullerton, California, Robert Bowman, Altadena, California, and William J. Roberts, Englewood, California, got together to use their radio talents by starting a station to spread the gospel in Asia.

They tried first to establish the station in China but red tape prevented it.

"We thank God now for that," Bowman said.

Philippine laws were quick to give them approval and sanction to the plan. With only \$10,000 in the bank in December, 1945, the three took an option on 12 1/2 acres of land just north of Manila worth \$20,000. Then they went to the United States to raise money.

Money Provided
One week before the option date was up they were still several thousand dollars short of the \$20,000 needed.

"We decided not to worry," Bowman, who is presently running the station, said. "If God wanted us to succeed, he would provide a way. We decided on a week of prayer."

On the day the option was due to lapse they were \$4,000 short. Coming into their office in Whittier, Calif., that morning, the three men found a letter from a Chicago businessman who, while on a vacation in California, had heard them tell of their plan.

"My heart has been moved," the businessman said. "Please accept my check."

It was for \$5,000. The contributions continued and soon they had enough money for a bare beginning. Broger put the first program on the air in June, 1948. The contributions continued and the station grew.

Today, the material value of the station is estimated at close to a quarter of a million dollars. Its spiritual value to its staff and its listeners is much greater than that.

Bohlen Delivers His Credentials To Red Official

MOSCOW, April 21 (UP)—U. S. Ambassador Charles E. Bohlen handed his credentials to President Klement Voroshilov of the Soviet Union Monday and stated that the guiding principle of American foreign policy is peace.

Bohlen rode in state from the U. S. embassy to the Kremlin to make his formal call on Voroshilov.

As he handed over his credentials and the letter of recall for his predecessor, George Kennan, Bohlen said:

"In its foreign policy the government of the United States is consistently guided by the desire to contribute to the cause of peace in the world, enhance respect for international obligations and develop friendly relations between all countries."

Plans to Move Buildings Made

CRESCENT, April 21—A site to which two buildings recently purchased from Brooks-Scanlon, Inc. will be moved was cleared this past week end when 15 men and 10 boys "turned to" and removed timber and brush from the grounds, in Crescent. The buildings will be moved here from Brooks-Scanlon camp, now at Timbers.

On Wednesday and Thursday, several men with power saws felled trees. Final clearing work will be done this week, when the ground will be ready for the buildings.

The buildings are to be used by the First Baptist church of Crescent, of which the Rev. Earl L. Baker is pastor. One building will be used for a parsonage and one for a Sunday school room, with an auditorium and chapel to be added later. Services at present are being held in an old school building in Crescent.

German Hunting Not So Easy Now

MUNICH, Germany (UP)—There's still good hunting in Germany, but the free and easy days of the early occupation are over.

A German hunting license now costs \$10, a would-be hunter has to pass a stiff test in German hunting rules, and, to top it all off, he has to pay by the pound, if he wants to take home his bag of game.

The first class of U. S. army hunting instructors has graduated, prepared to teach GI sportsmen to hunt the German way. Baron Kurt von Egloffstein and staff of three German woodsmen trained the Army instructors. Courses for GIs will now be set up in recreation areas across southern Germany.

The toughest rule of all is that the hunter must pay for the game before he can take it home. A rabbit costs about 50 cents, a pheasant 80 cents and a small deer 35 cents a pound.

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Plane Collision Takes 4 Lives

GAINESVILLE, Tex., April 21 (UP)—A collision in air between an Army observation plane and a two-engine Navy S-N-B sent the smaller aircraft spinning to earth near Gainesville and killed four men.

The S-N-B, Naval equivalent of a C-54, limped into Perrin Air Force Base near Denison, Tex., and landed safely yesterday, though its right wing tip was sheared off in the crash.

The single-engine LC-126 Army observation plane, a military adaptation of the four-seated Cessna, was based at Fort Sill, Okla., and was en route there from Camp Polk, La. It crashed and burned.

Three of the men aboard were pilots who earlier had flown to Camp Polk in planes which Fort Sill officers borrowed from other posts when a hailstorm wrecked its own fleet of artillery observation aircraft.

The dead were identified as James K. Knox, a civilian flight instructor who was piloting the fatal plane, Capt. Jack P. Keil, Lt. Claude L. Cox Jr., and Lt. Don B. Alexander. All listed Lawton, Okla., home addresses.

REDMOND, April 21 — At a stockholders meeting of Deschutes Farmers Cooperative held last week in Redmond grange hall, the members voted approval of the proposed common and preferred stock issuance, and authorized their legal representatives to apply for incorporation in the state of Oregon. 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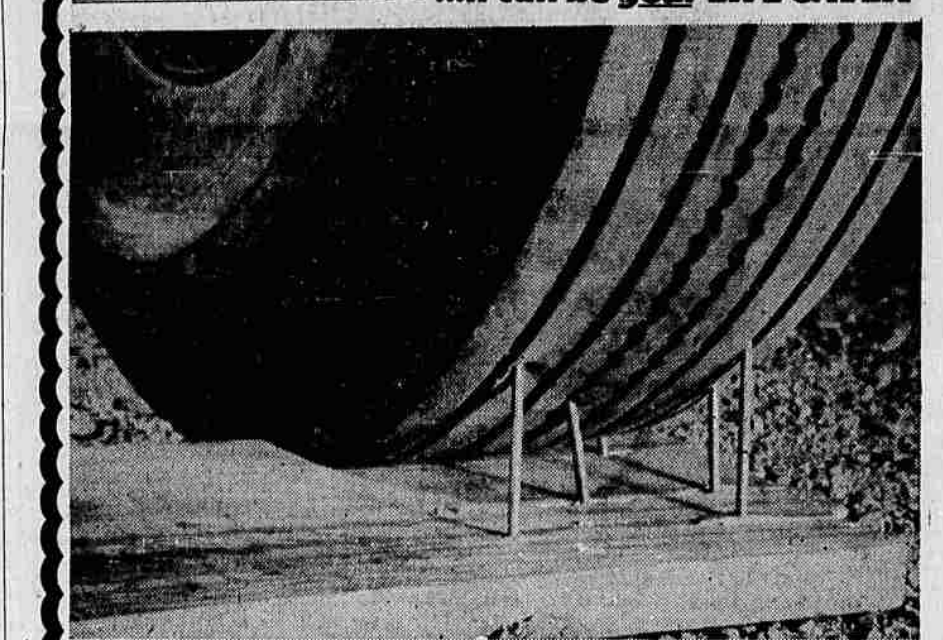
