Memorial Day Services Set

REDMOND, May 21—Memorial Day services on Saturday, May 30, will start at 8:30 a. m. when a caravan of citizens will leave from the American Legion hall at 8th and Glacier streets for Terrebonne. Services will be held at the cemetery in Terrebonne at 9 a. m., following decoration of the graves. Marion Taylor for the Ray Johnson post of the Legion is chairman for the morning's schedule, assisted by Commander Sylvester Meigs of the local Veterans of Foreign Wars post, and in Terrebonne by the Pioneer club. There will be a speaker at the cemetery services and a firing squad will be present from the 72d AAA Gun Battalion of Battery B national guard unit, under Captain Arthur Miller.

The entourage will then return to Redmond and will parade from the high school north to Cascade street, east to Sixth and south to Highland which is the McKenzie highway. The high school band is to play prior to the flag raising on the high school grounds before the parade. From Sixth and Highland the route will be by automobiles to the Redmond cemetery. The Redmond Ministerial association are arranging for a speaker at the latter services and the decoration of graves and military rites will also be observed.

Taylor emphasizes that the Memorial Day observances are for all the public and encourages all organizations as well as individual citizens to be represented in their observance and in the parade.

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New Methods of Soil Productivity Increase Studied

New methods of increasing the productivity of sub-irrigated meadow lands in soil conservation districts around Klamath Falls, Silver Lake and Lakeview were checked this week by Wayne W. Austin, SCS regional agronomist, from the Portland office, and J. B. Rogers, area conservationist in the Bend office.

Natural meadow grass that has been yielding only a ton or so of hay to the acre is being replaced by new types that are yielding up to three tons per acre, as a result of the innovations, Austin observed.

The process involves the construction of drainage ditches, to take off some of the excess moisture and leach black alkali from the soil, and the planting of oats, barley or some other grain crop for two or three years, to make certain that weeds, brush and natural grasses definitely have been killed out. Then the soil is replanted to high yielding meadow grasses, thereby increasing by several times the supply of livestock feed, Austin observed.

Big Area Covered

Several outstanding examples have been obtained, as proof that productivity of these meadowlands can be increased materially, and more and more ranchers are adopting the new soil development practices, Austin said.

During the past two weeks Austin and Rogers have met with boards of supervisors in five SCS districts. They also have checked on soil management, range seeding and soil improvement practices in these districts. An unusual machine has been developed by a Bly man, utilizing the soil-mulching methods of the rototiller on a vastly enlarged scale, by means of which weeds, brush and sod are transformed into a fine mulch in one operation, Austin said. More than 500 acres of meadowland already has been put in condition for leveling and seeding, as a result of operation of this unusual machine, Austin noted.
