

Beavers, Stars Again Rained Out In Portland

SAN FRANCISCO, May 21 (AP)—Manager Bobby Bragan of the Hollywood Stars looked anxiously out the window today and wondered if the Portland weatherman was going to toss another strike at his ball club.

The Stars, rated a hot pennant contender, have been rained out for the last two nights in their series with the Beavers while first place Seattle and second place Los Angeles were winning on both occasions.

As a result, the third place Twinks have skidded to 6½ games behind Seattle and three behind the surprising Seraphs, losing a full game while cooling their heels in the lobby. They'll try and make up some lost ground tonight when they are slated to open the Portland series at last with a doubleheader.

Elsewhere around the circuit, the final score was 3-2 in all three contests.

Seattle's Steve Nagy notched his fifth victory of the campaign while beating the San Francisco Seals with a five-hitter. Walt Judnich got his usual clutch hit in the first inning when he singled in two Sud runs. The other one Seattle needed came home in the third as Ray Orteig was hitting into a double play with three on. Bill Boemler took the loss, his seventh.

Dixie Upright, who just joined the Angels from the St. Louis Browns, smashed a 345-foot homer with a man aboard in the eighth to help veto the Solons. Dixie was pinch hitting for Frank Diprima and unloaded against Burt Barkelew, who was tabbed with his third loss. The smash erased a 2-1 lead that Sacramento had earned in the top of the frame when Hank Schenz singled in two runs.

The Oakland Oaks extended their winning streak to two straight as they clipped San Diego in the 12th inning, 3-2 with the aid of a 110-foot pop to the first base line. With Pete Milne on second and two out in that frame, Jim Marshall smacked a hot roller which hit the pebble and hopped over Tom Alston's head for a game-winning single.

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Hitters in Big Leagues Have Big Day at Plate Wednesday

NEW YORK, May 21 (AP)—Take to the storm cellars you hitters with your no-hit, low-hit performances, the lively batters suddenly have discovered the lively ball.

Yesterday was no time for the weak-hearted to go to the ball game, especially in the National League. At the finish there were 182 hits for eight games, 103 in the National and 79 in the American. There were 54 extra base hits, 15 homers, eight triples, and 31 doubles.

The Giants set the pace with 21 hits, including three homers, three triples and three doubles in their 16-6 trouncing of the Cubs for fourth straight victory. The Cardinals collected 17 hits as they also hit their high for the season with an 11-6 victory over Pittsburgh—in which Red Schoendienst even made Stan Musial envious with six runs batted in on a homer, two doubles, and a single for a perfect night. Pittsburgh collected 14 hits.

Cincinnati was the third N. L. club to hit a season high for the day with a 14-hit 14-5 victory over the Phillies, who made 11 hits in defeat. Things were a little quieter in Milwaukee where Brooklyn's Billy Loes pitched a six-hitter and Brooklyn picked up 10 in a 7-2 triumph.

Washington hit its high in hits for the year in a 16-hit 8-3 win over collapsible Cleveland while Boston made nine hits in 14 innings in its 3-2 victory over St. Louis. Decided on Del Wilber's pinch-homer. The Yankees and Tigers each made 12 hits as the Bombers again won in the final inning 9-8. The only pitching battle of the day found lefty Morris Martin turning in a five-hitter for the A's in a 2-1 victory over lefty Billy Pierce of the White Sox, who yielded seven hits.

A four-run rally in the third and an eight run rally in the eighth were the crushers for the Giants at Chicago as Monte Irvin, Alvin Dark, and Dave Williams hit homers, Bobby Thomson, Henry Thompson and Whitey Lockman tripled, and Tookie Gilbert, Irvin, and Dark doubled. Dee Fondy and Roy Smalley hit Chicago homers.

Six Stolen Bases
Schoendienst boosted his average 24 points to .354, second highest in the league with his big night at St. Louis while Musial and Steve Bilko collected three hits each and Frank Smith got four for Pittsburgh.

Brooklyn added six stolen bases to its 10 hits at Milwaukee as Loes became their fourth route-going pitcher in a row. The Dodgers never trailed after Jackie Robinson hit a two-run first inning homer.

Wilber's third homer, all in pinch-hit roles, gave veteran Ellis Kinder his second victory in as many days in a battle of relievers at Boston. Loser Don Larsen pitched scoreless three hit ball for seven innings for the Browns before the blast by Wilber.

Joe Astroth's single in the ninth brought home the winning run for the A's after Cass Michaels and Ed McInnes walked and moved up on a wild pitch by Pierce. It was the second time the White Sox dropped a two game series to the S's.

Sports Parade

NEW YORK, May 21 (AP)—Back in 1925 first baseman Wally Pipp of the New York Yankees was injured and a husky young fellow named Lou Gehrig took his place. Pipp never got back his job. Gehrig won it and kept it for 15 years during which he played a record 2,130 consecutive ball games.

Back a couple of weeks ago, first baseman Joe Collins of the Yankees was injured and a husky young fellow named Don Bollweg took his place. Collins, to date, hasn't got his job back. Bollweg has, for the moment, won the post and hopes to make it stick for a long while to come.

He Works Harder
Not that the six-foot, one inch athlete from Wheaton, Ill. thinks for himself as another Gehrig. Actually, soft-speaking Don is a bit too modest and self deprecating for a fellow who "came in on a pass" and is hitting a resounding .341.

"I don't have the talent some of the other fellows have," he insists in the manner of a man stating solid facts. "So I have to work harder than most of the others."

Being on first base for the Yankees is all the inspiration he needs however. Because rawboned Don never thought actually that he would come this far.

Played Soft Ball
"I played soft ball when I was a kid," he recalled, "and didn't think much about hard ball. My dad kept after me and so, just to satisfy him more than anything, I went to a Cardinal tryout camp near my home in 1941. I was pretty surprised when they gave me a contract."

Thus in 1942, Don went into the Cardinal chain with Washington, Pa. But before the next season started he was in the Army. There followed three years of service, one year with an armored division, and two in the Air Corps as a radio instructor.

When he came out in 1946, and the Cardinals sent him to Columbus, Ga., Bollweg had such a terrible year at bat that "I almost quit the game."

Joins Yankee Chain
After another season with Columbus, Don moved on to Houston for two years and then, in 1950, to Rochester, and in 1951 to Kansas City in the Yankee chain.

Yet even this spring Bollweg's hopes weren't very high.

"I'm a slow starter and I thought they gave up on me when I hit only about .135 this spring," he recalled.

Bruins Place 3rd in Annual Big Six Meet

The Bend high school Lava Bears placed third yesterday in the Big Six track meet held at Springfield, with a total of 51 points. Salem was first, with 120 points and Eugene second, with 104 1/6 points. Albany had 58 2/3 points; Springfield 42 2/3 points and Corvallis was last with 27 1/4 points.

The most spectacular performance by any member of the Bend squad was that of Lyle Schoosow, who defeated Miskanen of Eugene in the mile run. Miskanen won the mile last week in the state track meet. Schoosow yesterday ran in the rain, and turned in the excellent time of 4:39.4, to take first place in the mile race.

Volney Sigmund was tied for first in the pole vault, at 11 feet. Stan Vile was 4th in the 100-yard dash and Millard Marsh was sixth in this event. Ned Mackey was sixth in the 440 and Vile was second in the 220. Miles Boardman was second in the broad jump and lower hurdles, and Marsh was fourth in the broad jump. Bill Baer tied for second in the high jump. In the javelin throw Gary Monical was fourth and Dick James sixth. The Bend relay team, composed of Vile, Leonard Anderson, Marsh and Boardman, took second place in this event.
