Dodger's Meyer Twirls 3 to 0 Win Over Cubs

NEW YORK, July 21 (AP)—Pitcher Russ Meyer finally has convinced Brooklyn Manager Charley Dressen that he needs more work to be a consistent winner—and from now on he'll get it.

The fiery right-hander says the big reason for his nine-straight, five-hit, 3-0 victory over the Cubs last night was "that I got knocked out of the box on Saturday."

"I had better stuff last night than in any of my last four starts," Meyer said. "I like to work often. My arm stiffens up or I don't have control when I have a long time between starts."

Dressen was torn between elation over the best job yet by Meyer and anger over the pitch by righthander Bob Rush that felled Dodger outfielder Earl Furlilo. Furlilo wasn't seriously hurt, but he won't play today because Dressen wants to rest him.

Cub manager Phil Cavarretta said Rush merely pitched Furlilo high and tight and had no intention of "dusting him off."

The victory put the Brooks 3 1/2 games in front of idle Milwaukee. Campy's homer was the only run Meyer really needed as he turned in his eighth victory against four defeats.

Other Action
In the only other major-league action yesterday, the Cardinals made 15 hits to top Pittsburgh, 4-4, after the Pirates won the wind-up of a suspended Sunday game, 6-4. Neither team scored in the four final innings yesterday, but it was a different story in the regularly-scheduled contest.

Steve Bilko hit two home runs and two singles to drive in four runs. Lefty Cliff Chambers pitched two-hit scoreless relief ball for four innings to gain the victory.

American League All-Stars Win Centralia Trip

The American League all-stars are champions, and as such will make the trip to Centralia, Wash., July 30-31 and August 1, to play in the Pacific Northwest Little League tournament.

The title was clinched last night at the municipal field, before a large crowd of spectators, when the American League all-stars walloped their National League rivals, 8 to 3, behind the effective pitching of Ron Laughlin and Dave Watson. Gary Jonas caught for this team.

The only hit achieved by the Nationals was a homer by Alton Mitchell, which scored all three runs for his team. George Hawes was the leading hitter for the American leaguers. He got one for two.

Laughlin, starting pitcher for the American League team, struck out seven opposing batters. Sidney Smith struck out eight of the nine National League batters facing him, after he went into the game, replacing Dick Hamby. Andy Cleveland caught for the National League team.

Lee Sala upset by Randy Sandy
NEW YORK, July 21 (AP)—Ring veteran Lee Sala today blamed his surprise loss to young Randy Sandy on a fractured left thumb and asked for a re-match with the promising Harlem middleweight as soon as the injury heals.

The 23-year-old Sandy received a split decision over the 25-year-old Sala of Donora, Pa., in their televised 10-round bout last night at Brooklyn's Eastern Parkway arena.

Judges Arthur Suskind and Bert Grant saw the fight the same way, voting for Sandy, six rounds to four. However, Referee Ray Miller voted for Sala, 5-4-1. The United Press gave five rounds to each.

Bow Hunters Set Medford Session
The fourth annual tournament of the Oregon Bow Hunters, to be held near Medford July 25 and 26, is expected to attract a number of entrants from Central Oregon.

The shoot is being sponsored by two host clubs, the Rogue Archers of Medford and the Malin Bow Hunters of Malin.

It is planned to simulate wild life conditions, in that targets will be spaced around the countryside in such a manner that they will resemble actual hunting shots. The targets will be replicas of life-sized animals, mounted on cardboard, and no one will shoot at the same target twice. One arrow each will be shot by each contestant, at each of the 100 targets.

Trophies will be presented to winners in various divisions.

In the first round over Columbia-Edgewater country club here yesterday, Bruce Cudd, Portland, and Tal Smith of Alameda, Calif., fired five-under par 67s—to take the lead.

Other top scores turned in during the first round included Dick Yost, a Camp Roberts, Calif., soldier, 68; Gary Hval, Eastmoreland, 68; Ray Koch, Portland, 70, and Eddie Draper, Seattle, 70.

Hogan Receives Giant Welcome
NEW YORK, July 21 (AP)—Ben Hogan came home today from his victory in the British Open golf tournament and was met by the biggest reception given an athlete since Bobby Jones returned from a similar triumph 23 years ago.

It was a fitting tribute to the man who made one of the greatest comebacks in sports history following a near-fatal auto crash which doctors said would incapacitate him for the rest of his life.

The British Open victory July 10 was the "grand slam" climax for the 41-year-old Texan. Added to his U. S. Open title and the Masters crown he won earlier this year, the British triumph gave him a record rivalling Jones.

Oakland's Milne Clings to Lead in PCL Bat Race

SAN FRANCISCO, July 21 (AP)—Pete Milne of Oakland kept his bat rattling at a .344 clip throughout the week to hold onto the lead in the Pacific Coast League batting derby.

Milne kept his four point bulge over the idle Dino Restelli, winding up the week with exactly the same average as last week, according to figures released by league statistician William Weiss.

The figures, including games of last Sunday, showed that Dale Long of Hollywood was holding securely to the long ball leadership. The hard-hitting star had 22 home runs and had blasted across 30 runs.

Fred Richards of Los Angeles led the loop in hits, having banged out 153 safeties, five more than Milne.

Arlie Wilson of Seattle, league batting champ in 1949, moved up on Restelli and Milne during the week, increasing his mark by six points to .344, just 10 percentage points off the pace.

Trapping Report Released by OGC

The 1952-53 trapping season report, released by the Oregon Game Commission, discloses that pelts with an estimated value of \$5,043.85 were taken in Deschutes county during this period.

Broken into categories, the report gives the following information: Reports were received from 23 trappers in Deschutes county; they took three other pelts, which sold for an average price of \$15.37 each; 52 muskrat, \$13.24 each; 1,017 muskrat, \$1.09 each; 293 beaver, \$10.40 each; 13 marten, \$8.69 each; eight raccoons, at 83 cents for each pelt; one civet cat, 23 cents; one weasel, 70 cents, and miscellaneous pelts valued at \$34.58.

HONOLULU, July 21 (AP)—Coast Guard planes and patrol boats searched the Pacific today for the 40-foot ketch Marmaduke, unreported for more than 10 days in the 1953 trans-Pacific Yacht race.

The Coast Guard said it was "not overly worried" about Marmaduke as no rough weather has been reported for the past two weeks. The ship is owned by Willis E. Short of La Jolla, Calif.

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Prall Qualifies For 2nd Tourney
