Presbyterian Church Notes Jubilee Year

The local First Presbyterian church joins with the city of Bend in observing its golden jubilee this year. According to the old records of the church, nine charter members founded the organization on July 30, 1903. Two years later the church became a corporation under the laws of the state of Oregon.

This fall the church will make proper recognition of its birthday through a fiftieth anniversary celebration planned by a group of members. A feature of the program will be the presentation of a detailed review of the life of the church in its first half-century, prepared by Mrs. C. L. McCauley, the church historian, who has made extensive and careful research into the history of the organization, as recorded in early newspapers and in private papers of early Bend residents.
