Bend Trio Made First Successful Ascent of Rock

News of the near-disastrous Sunday climb of treacherous Haystack rock, at Cannon Beach, is of special interest to local residents who recall that three Bend men were the first, and among the very few, to reach the top of the steep slippery sea crag.

More than 25 years ago, Nels Skjersaa and Emil Nordene, both still Bend residents, and Nels Wolfberg, now deceased, made the difficult ascent. Through the years, only a very few alpinists have repeated the feat, but many try it annually and a number have lost their lives in the attempt.

The most recent climbers to reach the top are Sherwood Willets, Cannon Beach, and Jim Curtis, a navy man from Tongue Point. They went up the shoreward side, and attempted to climb down the offshore side, but were trapped by heavy surf below and sheer rock cliffs above. A coast guard plane, a navy helicopter, a coast guard patrol boat, two life guards and an ex-marine frogman shared in the spectacular rescue.

First formal action taken by the new area association was opposition to the five-year course in pharmacy now required in Oregon before students can qualify as pharmacists. In opposing the five-year requirement, the Central Oregon pharmacists said they see no need for the extra year.

Dean George Crossen of the Oregon State College school of pharmacy was a guest at the dinner meeting and spoke to the group.

Organization of the Central Oregon chapter of the state association took place under the direction of Orville Corbett, Burns, vice-president of the Oregon Pharmaceutical association, and Lloyd Magill, Bend, secretary of the state association.

The new association will meet once a month, with meetings to be rotated among the various Central Oregon towns. Present for last night's organization meeting were 22 pharmacists.
