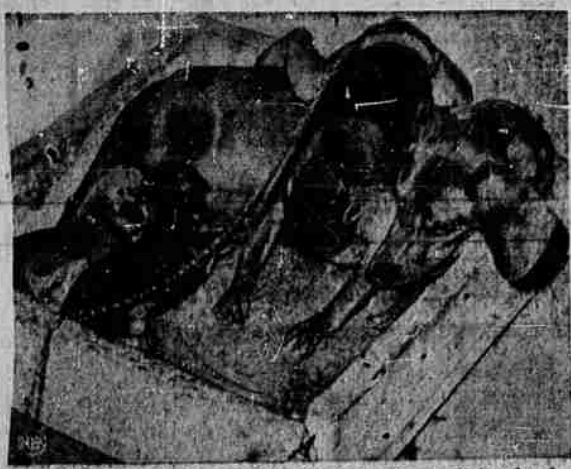


British Actress Thinks Too Much Emphasis on Sex

HOLLYWOOD, Aug. 21 (AP)—One of Hollywood's major problems, according to Patricia Medina, is over emphasis on sex—both on and off the screen.
The dark-eyed beauty stated her case against filmdom's stress on sex in a soft English accent, and a slight pout on her pretty lips. "If people on another planet managed somehow to get copies of Hollywood movies, they'd think the earth was inhabited by nothing but a bunch of sexy characters without any morals."
"On the other hand, male Martians might get the idea that all women on earth are built along the lines of beauty queens," she smiled. "We'd certainly have invaders from out of space if that were the case."
Pat, who recently completed a starring role opposite Glenn Ford in "Plunder of the Sun," shook her head and said that British movies have fewer low necklines and are more subtle with sex.
"English films
"It may be to the financial disadvantage of English films," she said, "but there never have been any outstanding sexy glamor girls over there."
"We've got too many here in Hollywood—and the worst part of it is, they carry through with their film roles in real life. They begin to believe their publicity agents and the cheese-cake pictures they have posed for."
"Lots of glamor girls who become national figures in a matter of a few months think it's the smart thing to get mixed up with a fast crowd and thrill seekers. It's a matter of too much money and too much success too fast and they don't know how to handle it."
The actress said many glamor newcomers reach a certain point of sophistication, then start looking for something new and different. That's when the trouble begins.
"Overcome By Stars
"It takes a lot of character and fortitude to overcome the situation," Pat explained. "Those who make the grade usually are the girls who realize how much they have to lose by trying to play sirens in their personal lives as well as on the screen."
"Once they know that, many of them go on to become great stars."
Pat herself is on the sexy side, 102 well-proportioned pounds on a five-foot, three-inch frame. She speaks French, Spanish and Italian in addition to English and is best known for her bad girl parts in movies.
"People remember the wicked women characters longer than they do virtuous heroines," she said. "Therefore, I like the kind of roles I play. But not because I think the parts are particularly true to life."
"It would be a heck of a world if all the women in the world behaved like movie heroines. Nobody'd be safe."

Welfare Expenses Survey Indicates Decrease in July

Public assistance expenditures in Deschutes county were lower last month than in June, when bills were cleared prior to the end of the fiscal year. Total July expense was \$18,480.67 as compared with \$21,788.28 the previous month. Miss Olive Jameson, Deschutes public welfare commission administrator, announced today.
The July sum also was about \$1700 lower than May figures. Miss Jameson added, Most of the reduction was in general assistance grants.
The following expenditures were authorized by the welfare commission meeting Wednesday: \$1,558.07 for general assistance; \$13,258 for old age assistance; \$1,935 for aid to dependent children; \$59 for aid to the blind; and \$1,650 for aid to the disabled.
Attending the meeting were Chairman W. C. Coyner, Kenneth G. Musker of Redmond, Mrs. B.A. Stover, O. W. Grubb, County Judge C. L. Allen, and County Commissioners E. E. Varco and A. E. Stevens.
It was Munkres' first meeting as a member of the commission, Miss Jameson said. He replaced J. B. Roberts, a veteran commission member who retired earlier this summer.
RED INVITATION SET
PORTLAND, Aug. 21 (AP)—Col. Thomas H. Lipscomb, Portland district engineer, announced today his office will invite bids about Sept. 8 for dredging the channel in Coos Bay and Isthmus Slough. Lipscomb said the Coos Bay channel would be dredged to a depth of at least 30 feet and the Isthmus Slough channel to 22 feet, at mean low water.

Phone Workers Step Up Drive For Wage Boost

Long distance telephone service in Chicago was interrupted today and one picket was arrested at Kansas City as the CIO Communications Workers stepped up its drive to win wage boosts from the nation's telephone companies.
At St. Louis, federal conciliators called a meeting for Monday to try to end the strike by 53,000 CWA members against Southwestern Bell Telephone Company in six states.
Picketing generally was peaceful against the Southwestern and Indiana Bell Telephone companies today except for a single incident at Kansas City.
At Chicago, 2,000 employees of the American Telephone and Telegraph Co. walked off their jobs "to attend a meeting" and virtually all long distance service was interrupted.
John J. Riley, 28-year-old picket, was arrested and released under \$100 bond at Kansas City after he allegedly threw two milk bottles against a telephone company building. Union officials said Riley acted on his own volition.
Violence subsided in the Indiana telephone strike where many exchanges buildings were under a state of virtual siege by pickets with windows smashed, gas bombs exploded, and cables slashed.
Indiana union members, entering the second month of their strike, streamed through strike headquarters at Indianapolis where grocery and rent aid was distributed. Some ate at a "strike kitchen" set up by an Indianapolis packing house union local.
Union officials charged that state officers planned to call on the National Guard to use "bayonets on defenseless girl pickets."

Rural District Buys Tank Truck

Purchase of a tank truck, in addition to the modern pumper previously ordered, was reported today by H. C. Kerron, head Deschutes Rural Fire Protection District No. 2.
Acquisition of the tank truck completes contemplated equipment purchases by the district, under its contract with the city of Bend for rural fire protection. The \$23,500 pumper truck is expected to be delivered early in December, Kerron said. The tank truck should be ready for delivery about the middle of September, he indicated.
A used truck was purchased, and a 1,000 gallon water tank now is being installed on it, along with a pump capable of delivering up to 500 gallons of water per minute, under pressure.
Under the contemplated plan of operation the pumper would be first to respond to a rural fire call, to be followed by the slower tank truck, with the auxiliary supply of water for use in case no cistern or other supply of water is available. The tank truck, with its pressure pump, also should prove valuable in combatting grass and brush fires, distant from water sources, Kerron believes.

West Side Takes '53 Softball Title

West Side Tavern lost to the Lundgren Red Sox softball team, 10 to 3, and Darst Loggers took the measure of Bend-Portland truck, 12 to 5, in games played last night on the municipal field.
The West Side defeat last night did not deprive this team of the 1953 league championship, however, and also possession of the Mathes cup. West Side won the first half, and second half honors, for the undisputed championship. Darst Loggers placed second in both halves.
The reinforced Lundgren Sales softball team will leave Saturday noon for Mill City, where it will play the softball team from that city tomorrow evening in the first game of the state tournament.

Increase Asked By Underwriters

SALEM, Aug. 21 (AP)—Rates on some types of automobile insurance in Oregon would be boosted 4 to 5 per cent under a schedule filed with the state insurance commissioner by the National Automobile Underwriters association, Commissioner Robert B. Taylor said today.
Public liability and property damage would not be affected, but comprehensive coverage for fire and theft would go up if the schedule is approved.
Taylor said he could not reveal details until the effective date. It contains a new class No. 3, in addition to class No. 1 for drivers under 25 and No. 2 for drivers over 25, Taylor said he is seeking clarification.
It was indicated some classes in Portland might be decreased slightly while the Roseburg-Medford area rates would increase.

One Man Killed In Gun Battle

FRASER, Colo., Aug. 21 (AP)—One man was killed and two wounded yesterday in a blazing barroom gun battle in this Colorado mountain town, one of President Eisenhower's favorite vacation spots.
Charles Dunlap, 50, was being held under police guard in a hospital at nearby Kremmling, Colo., after a 53-year-old Fraser drug-gist, Ray Fox, was shot to death in the sunfight.
The dead man's brother, George Fox, 52, suffered gunshot wounds in the back and shoulder, while Dunlap also was wounded in the shoulder. Neither of the latter was in serious condition, authorities reported.
Sheriff Chancey Van Pelt, famed two-gun sheriff of Grand county, who earlier this year shot to death two bandits after they had kidnapped him, said the shooting was the result of a long standing feud between the Fox brothers and Dunlap.
