Keen Interest Being Displayed In NRA Session

PRINEVILLE, Aug. 21—LaSelle Coles, manager of the Ochoco Irrigation district here and Oregon director of the National Reclamation association, reported yesterday that the annual convention of the national group October 14, 15 and 16, will draw a record attendance for recent years. Coles, who says he has been informed that hotel reservations are reaching the point of exhaustings accommodations, declares that Oregon reclamationists will be well represented at the session. Judge A. R. Bowman has already made his reservation from this city. The convention headquarters will be at the Mapes hotel.

Widow of Dr. C. S. Edwards Dies Thursday at Redmond

REDMOND, Aug. 21—Services were held here this afternoon for Mrs. Charles S. Edwards, member of a pioneer western family and wife of the late Dr. C. S. Edwards, Bend's first resident physician just 50 years ago. Death came quietly to Mrs. Edwards early yesterday as she slept. She had been in failing health for more than a year.

Private services were held at 2 p. m. this afternoon at the home of her daughter, Mrs. John H. Berning. The body was taken to Portland for cremation. It was Mrs. Edwards' request that the services be private, and that there be no flowers. The Rev. Robert Williams officiated.

Oldest of two children, Mrs. Edwards was the daughter of California pioneers, William Freeman King and Elora Clarissa King, and a granddaughter of James King of William, martyred San Francisco editor of pioneer days and founder and editor of the San Francisco Bulletin. The early-day editor was shot and fatally wounded on May 14, 1856. As a result of the murder of the pioneer editor, the California's second vigilante committee came into existence, in an effort to halt the spread of outlawry in the gold rush days of the "mother lode."

Mrs. Edwards was born in San Francisco on March 5, 1870, and lived in Sonoma county for 20 years before moving to Prineville in 1902. It was in 1904 that Dr. C. S. Edwards and Ethel King were married. In the previous year, Dr. Ed-

wards had moved from Prineville to Bend, early in 1903, and entered the practice of medicine in the Deschutes town, population of which was 226. Dr. Edwards remained in Bend until the fall of 1903, then returned to Prineville to join the late Dr. H. P. Belknap.

Mrs. Edwards is survived by two daughters, Mrs. Berning, Redmond, and Flora Edwards, San Francisco; a grand daughter, Clarissa Berning, Redmond, and a brother, William F. King, Prineville, early day Prineville stockman and merchant for many years mail clerk for the Oregon senate.

Widely known as a musician, Mrs. Edwards made her home here with her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Berning. Although in failing health, Mrs. Edwards was able to attend the Crook county pioneers' annual meeting in Prineville on August 2 and meet many of her old friends.
