

Red Ambassador In Iran 'Sick' Following Coup

Until about a month ago, Anatol Iosifovich Lavrentiev was eating high on the hog. Then trouble befell. Now Lavrentiev is reported "ill" — and no wonder.

Lavrentiev is 49 years old, a balding, stocky man who is Russian ambassador to Iran. Until last month's sudden coup which saw the downfall of Iranian Premier Mohammed Mossadegh and restoration of the Shah, he looked as if Lavrentiev was about to hand to the Russians one of their biggest prizes.

Iran seemed ready to fall to Communism.

It was the second time that disaster had struck Lavrentiev, once regarded as one of Communism's brightest, younger lights.

It was he who failed to read the signs in Yugoslavia correctly. Yugoslavia's Marshal Tito reportedly put the finger on him in 1947. That was the period when the Yugoslav-Soviet crisis was at its height, and Tito was supposed to have complained to Soviet Foreign Minister Vyacheslav Molotov that Lavrentiev was "stupid."

"He may be stupid," Molotov is said to have replied, "but he is a good Communist."

It was perhaps natural that Molotov, who has made a career of mediocrity, should choose such a one as his own particular favorite.

At any rate, Lavrentiev was around as Russian ambassador to Yugoslavia when the big split occurred.

Lavrentiev is of the Communist school of "economic" diplomats which produced such really brilliant men as Jacob Malik and Andrei Gromyko, both of whom have been formidable antagonists of the United States in the United Nations.

Last July, with Mossadegh showing signs of wanting some kind of economic agreement with Russia, Lavrentiev was moved to Tehran.

His arrival was followed by the flight of the Shah and by violent pro-Communist demonstrations staged by the Communist Tudeh party. But, with success almost in his grasp, it was torn away.

What judgment, his Moscow bosses may lower on him is problematical. Whether Molotov can get his favorite out of trouble again is doubtful.

Truman Remarks Aimed at Youth

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Sept. 21 (AP)—Former President Harry S. Truman believes that American youth dedicated "unswervingly to honest democratic principles" can play an important part in uniting the world under the banner of freedom.

Mr. Truman, in his first commercial appearance on television, made a 10-minute speech to American boys and girls yesterday from his downtown Kansas City office. He appeared on the weekly "excursion" program broadcast nationally by NBC under sponsorship of the Ford Foundation.

Network officials said Mr. Truman would make two more appearances on the show next year, the dates to be announced later.

Mrs. Truman told his unseen audience that he believed eventually there would be complete understanding among all free nations of the world and that the United Nations would be "the means to create peace in the world for future generations."

"By deed and example, we must work to bring the nations of the world together," he said. "The best way we can do this, I have always believed, is to dedicate ourselves unswervingly to honest democratic principles."

Investigations by GOP-Led Committees Near 100 Mark

ROME, Sept. 21 (AP)—An international committee of scientists warned today that poliomyelitis threatens to become a serious problem throughout the world and urged the setting up of region research laboratories to combat it.

The eight committeemen also condemned "widespread and indiscriminate administration of gamma globulin to persons who have had no known contact with poliomyelitis."

Under the chairmanship of Dr. John R. Paul, professor of preventive medicine of Yale University, the committee submitted a report to the United Nations World Health Organization after a week's study here.

World Famed Doctors
Fellow members of the committee included Dr. Thomas Francis Jr., professor of epidemiology of the University of Michigan, and Dr. A. J. Rhodes, director of research of the Hospital for Sick Children, Toronto, Canada.

Epidemic poliomyelitis presents one of the most formidable problems of public health today, the report said, and what causes concern is the "complete failure so far to control the disease."

No Treatment Perfect
"Treatment, prolonged and expensive as it is, is only a palliative," the report said. "A nerve cell, once irreparably damaged, can not be replaced."

The scientists recommended the establishment by the world health group of research laboratories all over the world to identify, type and study the strains of polio virus and provide materials for diagnosis and typing to an international research network.

A number of "urgent" research projects should be started by the laboratories, they said.

Scientists Advice
The scientists gave the following advice to the public during polio epidemics:

Fire in Trailer Fatal for Man

REEDSPORT, Sept. 21 (AP)—Earl MacDonald, 57-year-old logging truck contractor, burned to death when fire destroyed his trailerhouse at nearby Winchester Bay early yesterday.

Flames also damaged the home of Walter Thompson, by which the trailer was parked. MacDonald's body was found on the floor of the charred trailer house.

Fire Chief Louis Wessel said the fire apparently started from a cigarette.

Two girls saw the flames shortly after 1 a. m. and awakened Thompson. Thompson said that he got to the trailer door and could hear MacDonald moaning, but could not enter because of the intense heat.

GETS PURPLE HEART
YOKOSUKA, Japan, Sept. 21 (AP)—Sgt. Dick Noone of the U. S. Marine corps, who received serious eye injuries in the final action against Communist troops in Korea, has been awarded the Purple Heart medal.

Marine Co. J. E. Dunlap, commanding officer of the Marine barracks in Yokosuka, has announced. Sgt. Noone, of Redmond, Ore., has returned to the states and is hospitalized in California.

Eisenhower Aide Tries His Hand At Gold Mining

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 (AP)—Backstairs at the White House:

Tom Stephens, President Eisenhower's appointment secretary, took a flyer in gold mining last month in Colorado. By himself, he went into Clear Creek Canyon and had an exciting several hours panning for gold and operating a sluice box.

The rent on the gold pan was more than the value of the few shining grains he collected.

Soft-hearted Secret Service agents made a host of friends among the younger set living in the Denver neighborhood of Mrs. John S. Doud, Mrs. Eisenhower's mother.

They bought the kids toy police badges and the children promptly stationed themselves in the alley behind Mrs. Doud's home, on the alert, after school, for any potential evil-doers.

Bal F. Swan, the rancher who played fishing host several times to the President in Colorado, became quite displeased during Mr. Eisenhower's last visit to the Swan Ranch at Pine, Colo.

Object of his displeasure was a small group of reporters who started landing big rainbow trout in Swan's heavily stocked stream

about a mile above where the President was fishing. Swan sent his manager to the stream and he ordered the reporters out immediately.

The newsmen explained they had been told by White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty it would be perfectly permissible for them to fish at this particular location.

This made no difference to the rancher. The reporters were evicted immediately. Later, they discovered the reason. They were angling in Swan's favorite pool where not even Mr. Eisenhower, himself, had fished.

The Republicans are quite bemused by Democratic threats to make an issue over the duration of Mr. Eisenhower's vacation. The GOP leadership wonders if the Democrats remember that during the last six months of 1944, F.D.R. was in Washington only 29 days. And most of his out-of-town time in that particular period was spent in either Hyde Park, N. Y., or Warm Springs, Ga.

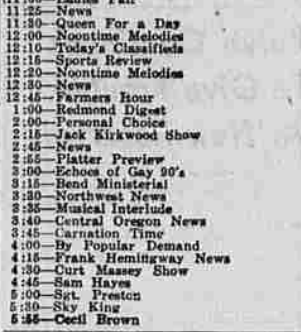
