William Jensen, who has been engaged in inventory work for the U. S. Bureau of Land Management in Western Oregon for the past four months, has returned to the Bend office.

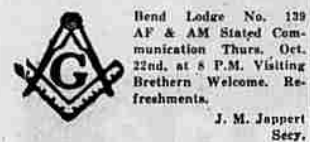

Portland Abortion Case Thrown Out In 4-3 Decision by Supreme Court

SALEM, Oct. 21 (AP)—The Oregon Supreme Court today threw out of court a criminal abortion charge against Dr. George H. Buck of Portland.

The controversial case drew the sharpest division of the high court in some time. It was a four to three decision and prompted five written opinions. Chief Justice Earl C. Latourette wrote the prevailing opinion with special concurring opinions by Justices George Rossman, Walter L. Tooez and William C. Perry. A dissenting opinion was filed by Justice James T. Brand, with Justices Hall S. Lusk and Harold J. Warner concurring.

Primary Issue

The primary issue before the court upon the appeal was whether, under provision of the medical practice act, a duly licensed physician and surgeon could lawfully perform an abortion.

Morse Says GOP Losing Ground

BOSTON, Oct. 21 (AP)—Sen. Wayne Morse (Ind.-Ore.) said yesterday Democratic complaints about President Truman during the last three months of his administration were "compliments" compared to current Republican criticism of President Eisenhower.

Morse, an ex-Republican singled out farm and foreign policy for special criticism. "I am satisfied that farmers have awakened to the doubletalk of the Eisenhower administration," Morse said. "I think they have left Eisenhower."

This was in answer to a question about the significance of the recent special election upset victory by a Democrat in a traditionally Republican farm district of Wisconsin.

Morse said the administration has "neither the vision nor the brains to realize that our surplus production of food is a great asset which ought to be used to beat Russian Communism on the economic front."

Bend Girl Gets Trip to Chicago

Representing Oregon at the national 4-H Club congress in Chicago Nov. 29 to Dec. 3 will be at least 14 club members, including one from Deschutes county, who have won trips in national awards judging. Records of state winners in other divisions will undergo sectional and national competition to decide whether they will be in the group leaving Portland on Thanksgiving day.

County winners who have already been assured trips to Chicago include Barbara Carlile, 17, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Carlile, Bend. She won the trip as a result of her poultry exhibits.

tion defined in the law and not be amenable to the manslaughter statute.

Latourette's opinion held that such an abortion could be lawfully performed, and that a physician and surgeon was not amenable to the criminal abortion statute in that case.

The minority opinion took the opposite view.

The Supreme Court had previously backed up the State Board of Medical Examiners in revoking Dr. Buck's license to practice medicine. Today's opinion may have some effect, observers said, on Dr. Buck's effort to have the revocation lifted. He has served notice of appeal to the United States Supreme Court on that issue.

Theory in Case

The case against Dr. Buck was prosecuted on the theory that although a physician's license could not be revoked for performing an abortion as defined in the medical code, nevertheless, if he performed such an abortion, he could be prosecuted for manslaughter. Under the manslaughter statute, all abortions committed at any stage of pregnancy are made unlawful, unless necessary to preserve the life of the mother. The prevailing opinion held that the indictment against Dr. Buck did not contain an allegation that the abortion performed was not necessary to preserve the health of the mother, and for that reason the indictment was defective. The high court opinion reversed the decree handed down against Dr. Buck in the Multnomah county Circuit Court of Judge Frank J. Loneragan.

Under the medical practice code, certain abortions performed by physicians are permitted when necessary to preserve the mother's health, and after consultation with another physician and surgeon.

Navy Band Concerts Popular With Mid-Oregon Residents

The Central Oregon appearances of the United States Navy Band, Tuesday afternoon and evening in Prineville, were acclaimed as outstanding successes. Total attendance for the two concerts was at least 6,500, and the bandmen gave out with everything they had. "Great music, and a great band," was the popular comment.

Last night's program seemed to include everyone's favorite tune, and it was planned with just that goal in mind. The conductor, Lt. Commr. Charles Brendler, and his bandmen, months ago made a careful study of the most enthusiastically received numbers on former tours, the network programs that drew the greatest response, and the extras most frequently requested.

Generous Applause

The audience was particularly enthusiastic in applauding "On the Trail," from Ferde Grofe's popular "Grand Canyon Suite," and the medley of tunes from "South Pacific," by Richard Rodgers. Also well liked were the modern compositions by Leroy Anderson, "Syncopated Clock" and "Chicken Reel."

Vocal music with band accompaniment seems to have particular appeal, and Ben Mitchell, tenor,

would have been welcome to sing all night. After scoring a hit in "O Paradise," from Myerbeer's opera, "L'Africaine," he came back for two encores.

Another soloist who was greeted with cheers and sighs was Lawrence Wiehe, who played Pryor's intricate arrangement of "Blue Belles of Scotland," to demonstrate his technique, then pleased the audience even more with Hoge Carmichael's immortal "Stardust."

Youngsters Participate

A highlight of the afternoon program, from the youngsters' point of view, came when outstanding high school bandmen from Bend, Redmond, Prineville, Madras, Culver, John Day and Burns were invited to play with the Navy musicians. The Bend high school band was represented by Milton Sexton, French horn, and Bob Jewell, oboe. For that number, the baton was wielded by Mel Lambert, supervisor of music in the Crook county schools.

Commr. Brendler directs without scores, entirely from memory, a feat mastered by very few band and orchestra conductors.
