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Star's Queen Hurls His Mates Into PCL Lead

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Mel Queen, who is ace-high with Hollywood fans, is making a career of pitching the Stars into the Pacific Coast League lead.

The 36-year-old right-hander did it again last night for the second time in five days as he six-hit the Sacramento Solons for a 6-1 victory which rotated the Twinks back into first place.

Oakland's Oaks made it a complete shuffle of the first division as they swapped places with San Diego by virtue of a 6-3 win over the Padres.

The Los Angeles Angels crept to within a half game of fifth place Seattle with an 8-3 victory, their third in a row over the Rainiers, and the San Francisco Seals continued their fight to get out of the doghouse by downing Portland 5-3 to bring the Beavers within a game and a half of loop purgatory.

Queen Wins Ninth
Queen pitched Hollywood into first place last Saturday and then on Wednesday night Marino Pietretti of Sacramento pitched them right out again.

So last night the Hollywood ace registered his ninth victory in a row since a season-opening loss, improved his already excellent earned-run-average and whacked a three-run double in his team's big inning.

The Twinks scored five runs in the eighth inning, four of them unearned, to break a 1-1 tie and bust up a good ball game. Sacramento's Emil Patrick, who clouted a homer for his squad's only tally, deserved a better fate than the three errors that were committed behind him.

Oakland outscored San Diego 4-3 in the first inning on Jim Marshall's three-run homer. The Acorns added two insurance runs in the eighth off what amounted almost to the Padres second team, Umpire Chris Valenti having retired more Padres in the top of the frame than the Oaks did.

Padres Thumbed
Valenti made four putouts after a disputed call at home, three Padre regulars and manager Lefty O'Doul.

Ed Erautt was the loser for the Padres and Bob Murphy got the win, both pitchers going the distance although in the first frame it looked as if both were going to get early showers.

Bob Spicer scattered nine Seattle hits and Fred Richards clouted a three-run homer as the Angels took their third in a row from Seattle. Los Angeles scored three in the first, and four in the third and Spicer just coasted the rest of the way.

Steve Nagy was the loser and his battery mate Ray Orteig homered for the losers.

The San Francisco Seals, finally beginning to see light from their last place dungeon, won their ninth game in their past 11 starts. The Beavers got three early runs and the Seals chipped away until they finally took the lead in the eighth frame.

San Francisco got 12 hits off loser Red Adams while the Bevos managed but six blows off winner Elmer Singleton and his relief, Bob Muncief.

Seven Teams in National Loop's First Division

There's a seven-team first division in the National League today with everybody but the Pirates at 500 percentage or better and Eddie Stanky, the manager of the pace-setting Cardinals, thinks it may stay that way right up until the stretch month of September.

But his St. Louis sluggers were in a position today to make him a false prophet by taking charge of the race right now with a game and a half lead over the rest of the pack. That's the widest margin any team has enjoyed thus far in the mad housing scramble in the N.L. where everybody is trying to live on the same percentage point.

The Cardinals, slugging away mercilessly, pounded out 17 hits, good for a 17-4 victory over Pittsburgh Thursday night, the only team which Stanky eliminates in the mad pennant scramble. That boosted their edge over the slumping Dodgers and the Phillies, deadlocked in second place, to 1½ games.

The Cardinals batted around, and then some, twice. They poured 13th homer to go in front again and he also drove in four runs to take over the Major League leadership in that department with 41. Rookie Wally Moon lived up to his reputation as the youngster most likely to take first year all-around honors by driving in three runs with a pair of sacrifice flies and a key single.

Poholsky Wins First
Pitcher Tom Poholsky breezed to an easy 11-hit triumph, his first of the season and also drove in four runs with three singles. Catcher Del Rice drove in three runs with a pair of doubles. Poholsky would have fared better in the final reckoning except for a three-run homer by pinch-hitter Preston

Ward in the sixth inning when it really didn't matter for the Pirates.

There was only one other major league game scheduled, between the Giants and Phils at Philadelphia and it was rained out.

Stanky, who has inherited such fine rookies as Moon, outfielder Joe Frazier, first baseman Tom Alston, and shortstop Alex Grammas to go with his great veteran stars of Musial, Red Schoendienst, and catcher Rice and Rip Repulski and Ray Jablonski, a pair of grown up 1933 rookies, is in a strategic position.

He has pitcher Vic Raschi with five wins and no defeats thus far, and Enos Slaughter, the outfielder he gave up for Quick Vic in the "delayed trade" with the Yankees, hasn't been missed because of the fine work of Moon and Frazier.

"I look for a scramble all the way and I think we'll be in it," he said. "The only team which doesn't figure is Pittsburgh, even though it is better. The Pirates will lose games here and there by inexperience but that same youth will come out and upset you, too. It will be the kind of a race that might not be settled until the last week."

Heavy Night Action
In the American League, as the teams settled down today for sectional competition, the problem once again was to head off the resurgent Yankees who just won eight out of 10 in their first western swing. Cleveland, after losing two out of three to the Yankees,

compiled a seven game winning streak and is in the most advantageous spot—first place—a game ahead of New York. In tonight's games it will be the Red Sox at New York, the White Sox at Detroit, Philadelphia at Washington and Baltimore at Cleveland. Pittsburgh is at Brooklyn, New York at Philadelphia and Cincinnati at St. Louis in National League night games and Milwaukee at Chicago in a day game.

Thursday's Star: Tom Poholsky of the Cardinals, who breezed to a 17-4 victory over the Pirates and contributed three singles to drive in four runs as his team took a 1½ game first place lead.

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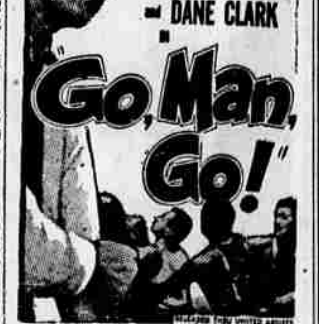
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
