He Doesn't Want 'Grab Bag' Prize

LOS ANGELES (UP)—Falling in efforts to get rid of his "grab bag" prize by giving it to police, a coroner or friends, Robert Shapiro decided today to store it in an old trunk, leave the trunk in a warehouse unclaimed, and hope it will be auctioned off to some other unsuspecting bidder. Shapiro got the crated "prize" at an auction. When he got it home he discovered the crate contained an urn—which in turn contained human ashes.

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It was on May 14, 1951, that the Eagles purchased the Greenwood avenue building from the Rex Brown estate, remodeled the garage building and moved in on Labor Day, 1951.

Final payment and satisfaction of a \$21,000 mortgage on the building was completed last week. W. M. Loy, secretary of the local Eagles, has stressed that tonight will not be "just another meeting night," but a history making date for the Bend Eagles, who 12 years ago had few assets and only 12 paid up members. At present, assets of the Eagles here amounts to over \$100,000.

Membership of the local aerie is well over 1,200, and the lodge is the second largest in Oregon.

Officers of the lodge will have dinner with Wetherald at the Pine Tavern this evening at 6:30, and at 7 p.m., the grand aerie official will speak over KBND. Wetherald will be escorted to the ball at 7:30.

A class will be initiated in connection with tonight's mortgage burning rites.

Eradication Of Sagebrush Under Study

REDMOND — Grass yield on thousands of acres of rangeland in the Pine Mountain area may be increased several hundred percent by chemical eradication of sagebrush. This is the opinion of Don Hyder of the Squaw Butte experimental station. Hyder reports that the first sagebrush chemical eradication trial was established in Deschutes county Wednesday morning on the Bradetich Brothers Pine Mountain ranch near Millican. In that trial, Cal Butler Air Service sprayed approximately 50 acres of sage-covered range with 24-D at the rate of 1½ pounds actual acid to the acre.

The demonstration trial is being underwritten by Bradetich Brothers as result of similar experimental work that proved successful at the experiment station last year. The grass yield at Squaw Butte was increased from 200 to 800 pounds air-dried forage per acre. Hyder figures the yield on Pine Mountain should be larger than that at Squaw Butte. Butler sprayed for the Bureau of Land Management last year also, with good results. He is putting out other trials this season. It is Hyder's opinion that it would be feasible to spray thousands of acres of rangeland in the Pine Mountain area by plane.

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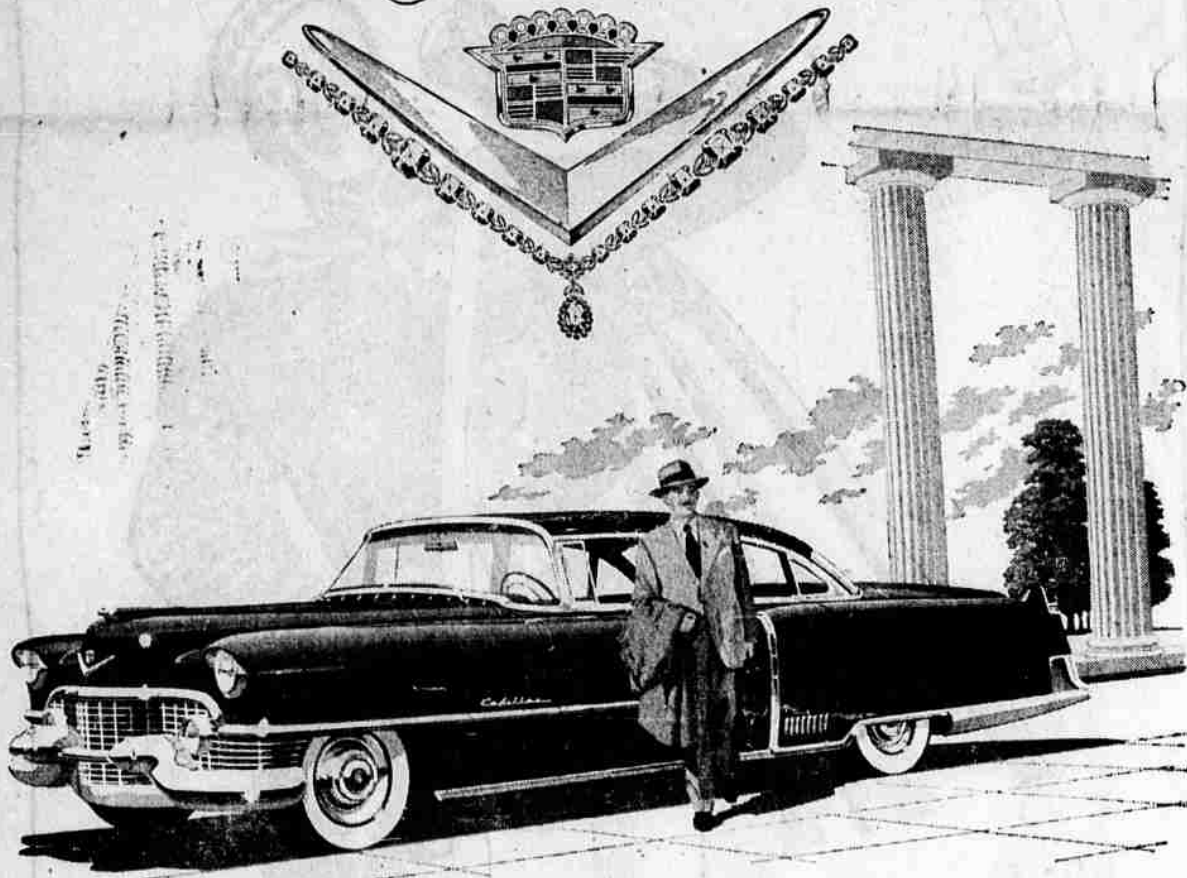
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
