All-Star Game Set at Hollywood

HOLLYWOOD (UP) — The Pacific Coast League-leading Hollywood Stars take to the diamond tonight against an all-star team made up of the best players in the seven other PCL clubs.

The contest is the 12th renewal of the All-Star game. It will begin at Gilmore Field at 8:15 p.m. PDT. San Francisco manager Tommy Heath and Oakland pilot Chuck Dressen will direct the All-Star against Manager Bobby Bragan of the Stars.

Hollywood will start Lino Donos (9-2) on the mound against Al Gettel of Oakland for the All-Stars.

Other fingers on the All-Star roster include Chick Pleretti and Chet Johnson of Sacramento, Art Schalkock of Oakland and Eddie Erault of San Diego.

The starting All-Star infield will be Nippy Jones, Sacramento, first base; Al Federoff, San Diego, second; Russ Rose, Oakland, shortstop; and Reno Cheso, San Francisco, third.

In the outfield will be Harry Elliott of San Diego, Sam Chapman of Oakland and Walt Judnick of Portland, backed by San Francisco's Ted Beard and Seattle's Jackie Tobin.

Catchers will be Ray Orteig of Seattle and Al Evans of Los Angeles.

Ex-College Star Listed Suicide

LAS VEGAS (UP) — The death of former college basketball star Dan Duch, 29, in a room at the plush Sahara Hotel here was listed by police today as an apparent suicide.

Officers reported yesterday the death of the former Compton College, Calif., and Montana State college athlete, saying he apparently shot himself to death with a .22 caliber automatic pistol.

They said he left a note in which he said he was heavily in debt.

Matthews May Get Return Bout

SEATTLE (UP) — Deacon Jack Hurley, manager of Harry (Kid) Matthews, may get the return bout with Don Cockell he has been stumping for.

Seattle promoters indicated during the weekend they are trying to get a return bout between Matthews and the British heavy weight fighter for some time later this summer.

Cockell has beaten Matthews twice, once last month in London and last year in Seattle.

RYFF FAVORED
BROOKLYN (UP) — Unbeaten Frankie Ryff of New York was favored at 8-5 to beat Brian Kelly of Niagara Falls, Ont., tonight in their televised 10 round lightweight bout at Eastern Parkway Arena.

Ryff, former national and international Golden Gloves champion, will be making his main event debut and seeking his 12th straight professional victory.

INSIDE BASEBALL for Little Leaguers

Being in position to field a bunt and throw immediately to the right base can mean the difference between victory and defeat. In the 1953 World Series, Yogi Berra fielded bunts and made throws to third base to retire runners on consecutive plays and thus snuffed out a Dodger rally. Berra's knowledge of the fundamentals and his ability to execute them was the turning point in this key game.

Arthur Dede, former Dodger catcher and present coach of rookie players, tells young catchers to imagine that their mitt is a dustpan held vertically and their throwing hand is a whisk broom. The action in fielding a bunt is that of sweeping the ball into the dustpan, getting a good grip on it, and throwing in a continuous motion.

Betty Jameson Tourney Winner

CHICAGO (UP) — Betty Jameson, 25, won her first tournament in 10 months with a 6 and 5 drubbing of Louise Suggs to capture the 25th Women's Western Open Golf Tournament.

The veteran pro from San Antonio, Tex., won her first tournament since the Miami Beach open with an old hickory-shafted putter and some keen wedge shots Saturday.

Miss Suggs, Atlanta, Ga., four-time winner of the tourney, only trailed by three at the end of the first 18 holes, but wilted in the second round.

Miss Jameson won her \$1,000 first place money the hard way. She beat former Western Open winner Betty Rawls and Patti Berg, another four-time winner of the tourney, before meeting Miss Suggs.

'Even Money' In Fight Tonight

NEW YORK (UP) — Fresh from surprise performances, middleweights Italo Scorticchini of Italy and Pedro Gonzales of Rankin, Pa., will clash tonight in a TV 10 rounder at St. Nicholas Arena. And the odds were at "even money."

The more experienced Scorticchini held top welterweight contender Carmine Basilio to a draw in his latest bout. Young Gonzales won an upset decision over middleweight contender Ralph (Tiger) Jones on May 24.

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Congress Today

Senate Republican Leader William F. Knowland today predicted the Republicans will beat down after "quite a hassle" Democratic drive to boost personal income tax exemptions this year.

Knowland and other GOP senators believe they have the votes to hold the tax reform bill in line with administration recommendations and without any amendments providing general income tax relief.

Knowland (Calif.) said he hopes the Senate will be ready to start debating the House-approved bill late this week and that he expects the debate to last a week or 10 days.

As revised by the Senate Finance Committee, the administration measure would provide tax relief totalling about \$1,477,000,000 in the next fiscal year for group of individuals and for business. The business concessions are intended to encourage investment and create jobs.

Led by Sen. Walter F. George (D-Ga.), most Senate Democrats

are expected to support a move to increase personal income tax exemptions by \$100 over the present \$600 for each taxpayer and dependent.

If this should fail, they are expected to back George's proposal for a \$20 tax cut for all individuals (\$40 for married couples) whose annual tax bill is \$500 or more.

Other congressional news: Tribute: The House and Senate today pay tribute to Hawaiian delegate Joseph R. Farrington and Sen. Lester C. Hunt of Wyoming, who died within a matter of hours Saturday. Both houses will recess after eulogies. Farrington died of a heart attack in his office. Hunt died four hours after shooting himself while at his desk in the Senate Office Building.

Trade: Sen. J. William Fulbright (D-Ark.) accused congressional Republicans of killing President Eisenhower's trade program through a policy of "procrastination, hesitation and doubt." He said he will support no more foreign aid except military assistance and Point Four technical aid because such programs are merely "stop-gap" expedients forced by lack of action on overall trade policy.

Military Budget: Testimony before the Senate Appropriations Committee recently revealed that the administration has decided to leave \$2-billion it does not plan to spend in the Army budget to allow public ears that U.S. ground forces are being cut too drastically. The money was appropriated in past years.

Farm: Farm state congressmen believe the forthcoming announcement by Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson of an 11 per cent cut in acreage allotments for wheat and other basic crops for another year. They said farmers should not have to take a double cut in income next year.

Ex-Red Praised By Roy Cohn
NEW YORK (UP) — Roy Cohn, chief counsel for the Senate Permanent Investigations Subcommittee, said last night that former Communist editor Louis Budenz has given "a great deal of information" about "Communists who occupy important positions in the newspaper field."

Cohn, appearing as the radio and TV guest of columnist Walter Winchell, did not indicate, however, that the McCarthy subcommittee would follow up Budenz's alleged "leads. He said the committee would concentrate next on "cleaning out" subversives in our defense plants."

Cohn said Budenz "out to know what he is talking about" because it was his job as editor of the "Communist Daily Worker in the '30s" to place Communists in important newspaper posts. Cohn suggested that some of these still hold important jobs on papers and in radio and other communication media.

Cohn said he intended to continue to fight the Communist conspiracy, even if he is ousted as chief counsel for the subcommittee as the result of the recent Army McCarthy hearings. He said he would "carry on" in a private capacity, although it would mean a personal sacrifice.

In introducing Cohn, Winchell described him as a man who should have some credit for sending atomic spies Ethel and Julius Rosenberg to the electric chair.

Cohn helped prepare the government's case against the Rosenbergs while serving as an assistant in the U.S. District Attorneys' office here.

LOS ANGELES (UP) — Gooey Humor ice cream man Henry Hodge, 24, became somewhat ill-humored Sunday with a "customer."

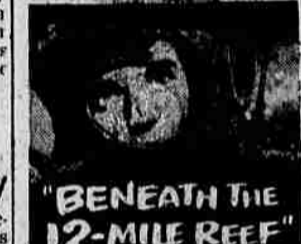
A man stopped Hodge on the street and asked what flavors he had. When the ice cream man poked his head into the freezer to see, the man poked a knife against Hodge's back.

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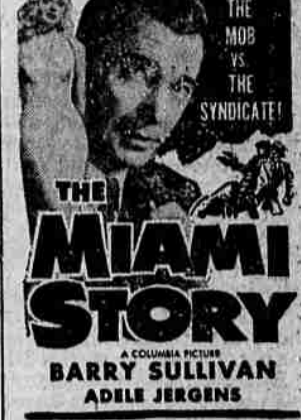
