PRINEVILLE—The eighth annual convention of the Oregon Association of Public Accountants will be held here Thursday through Saturday. It will be the first time that the organization has ever held its conclave in Central Oregon.

Convention arrangements and planning have been made by R. P. McRae, Prineville public accountant and mayor of the host city. Headquarters will be the Ochoco Inn.

Inter-professional co-operation will be emphasized in the sessions. Two of the speakers in this category are Frank Spears, Portland, representing the Oregon Bar, and J. B. Franzwa, also of Portland, for the Oregon Bankers association. Other speakers include Donald Brajlich, Gonzaga University, and W. A. Dahlberg, University of Oregon.

On the final day, the Oregon Committee on Tax and Accounting Information will meet in conjunction with the OAPA. Speaker will be George Diel, Portland newsman. All public accountants of Oregon are invited to this session.

Crop Duster Dies in Crash

LA GRANDE, Ore. (UP)—Louis E. Coffey, 36, of Baker, Ore., was killed Saturday in the crash of a light plane while dusting a farm crop near here.

Coffey, who was considered one of the best mountain flyers in the Northwest, was killed outright. Investigating officers said one of the plane's wings hooked in a power line and sent the aircraft tumbling to the ground where it caught fire.

Coffey was manager of the Oregon Trail Lines Service in Baker, and manager of the Baker Airport. Coffey was on route to Harry K. Coffey, Portland businessman killed last week in a plane crash near Hood River.

Word of Death Received Here

Word has been received here of the death of La Vern F. Roubinek at Pasco, Wash., on June 18. Death was the result of injuries sustained when his car was struck and forced from the road by a hit-run driver about 20 miles from Pasco.

Infant Daughter Drowns on Picnic

VANCOUVER, Wash. (UP)—Becky Ann Ramey, 18-months-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Ramey of Vancouver, drowned in Salmon Creek about 15 miles north of here yesterday during a family picnic.

Clark County Sheriff Clarence S. McKay said the child apparently toddled off while Mrs. Ramey was laying out the picnic lunch, and tumbled into the fast-moving waters of the creek.

The body was recovered about 45 minutes after the child was discovered to be missing. It had been carried some 150 feet downstream.

The father immediately began artificial respiration while waiting for county officers to arrive. The girl was dead on arrival at St. Joseph's hospital here.

Guard Killed By Convicts In Michigan

LANSING, Kan. (UP)—Six prisoners who killed a guard and wounded a woman hostage in an escape attempt at Kansas State Penitentiary were held under security guard today.

The prisoners surrendered yesterday after a gun battle with prison officials and guards. Two of the convicts were wounded.

Deputy Warden Lawrence L. Potts said that first degree murder charges would probably be placed against the six for the fatal shooting of Henry M. Kenaga, 38, a guard for 25 years.

Kenaga was shot when he resisted the prisoners as they tried to enter a waiting room for the prison yard.

Mrs. Frankie Scroggins, 26, Kansas City, Mo., received a chest wound, but was later released from a Kansas City, Kan., hospital.

The prisoners seized eight visitors and held them for an hour in the prison visiting room. Two of the hostages were children, James City, Kan., and Janet Manes, 2, Teneka, Kan.

The prisoners made their break in the prison yard during the regular Sunday visiting hour. They used homemade pistols and knives fashioned in the prison machine shop to rush a gatekeeper and snipe at guards.

Warden Charles Edmondson and Deputy Warden Lawrence Potts led a group of armed guards into the room where the prisoners had taken their hostages. The man advanced with guns blazing and the prisoners released their hostages and surrendered.

COOS BAY—A band of Coos Bay Pirates will arrive by air in Bend June 25, promoting the annual Timberoo loggers' festival in Coos Bay July 24, according to Chief Skull Joe Kelley.

Police said the man was one of a group of a half dozen persons who gathered in front of the office and shouted anti-American slogans after a pro-Communist demonstration in downtown Havana had been broken up.

The iron thrown through the U office window was wrapped in a bed sheet on which had been printed in Spanish with shoe dye. "Yankees out of Guatemala; McCarthy out of Cuba."

Francis L. McCarthy is UP bureau chief in Havana. At present, he temporarily is out of the country on assignment.
