Cordon Wins Victory Over Morse on Resources Issue

WASHINGTON—Sen. Guy Cordon (R-Ore.) won a hard fought victory this past week over his Oregon colleague, Sen. Wayne Morse, in a contest that ended in triumph not only for Cordon but the Eisenhower administration in the field of resource development.

Cordon successfully prevented Morse from killing off for this session of Congress final action on several bills which would implement the administration's "partnership" river development policy.

Morse, curiously enough, switched the scene of the battle from the field of his own normal preference—the Senate floor—to that field in which Cordon customarily maneuvers—the Senate cloakroom.

Here is what happened:

Three "partnership" bills involving Oregon and Washington projects were referred for consideration to the Senate Public Works Committee: Cougar dam on the McKenzie River, Priest Rapids and John Day projects on the Columbia. The first two have been passed by the House. Favorable Senate action would give the administration its first tangible evidence of congressional endorsement of the "partnership" idea, which Morse has assailed repeatedly over the past year.

Morse, as a member of that committee, sought to slow down—if not halt final approval of the bills by suggesting the committee hold hearings on them in the Pacific Northwest after Congress adjourns for the year. This would have killed off their chances in the 83rd Congress, requiring that they run the gauntlet all over again through both House and Senate in the 84th Congress that convenes next year.

Cordon, sponsor of the Cougar and John Day bills, but not on the committee, sought quick action on the Cougar bill by requesting it be sent to the Senate floor.

And so the battle between the two senators was joined—in the cloakroom where Cordon exhorted to support a given position or oppose a particular bill for such and such reasons. The Cougar dam project—involving but 37,500 kilowatts—was a minor item in the lives of other senators, who heard the contrary pleas for support from both Morse and Cordon.

The decision would be made by a vote of the 11 senators who comprise the flood control subcommittee of the Senate Public Works Committee. They met and they debated the issue behind closed doors on at least four occasions before the verdict was reached by which the Cougar bill was approved without further delay.

The battle reached a semi-wind-up over a week ago when Morse moved to defer further consideration and hold hearings in Oregon, but was defeated by a tie vote 5 to 5. Morse had lined up four Democrats to support him: Chavez (N. Mex.), Stennic (Miss.), Kerr (Okla.) and Burke (Ohio). Cordon had won the support of the fifth Democrat, Holland (Fla.) and four of the five Republicans: Chairman Bush (Conn. Cal.), Beall (Md.) and Upton (N. H.).

These lines held firm in the final vote, which became 6 to 5 when the lone absentee from the previous meeting, Kuchel (R-Calif.), was represented and voted for Cordon.

Cordon put on a stiff campaign of persuasion to break the back of Morse's stalling maneuver, and by so doing got favorable action on the Cougar bill, which virtually assures its passage by Congress within the next week or two. It is doubtful Morse will openly oppose the bill on the Senate floor, a position he has cautiously avoided to date.

Possibly, Morse will do as he did on another "partnership" bill that sailed through the Senate this past week—walk out of the chamber during its debate and return after it has been passed. This was a measure authorizing the Alabama Power Co. to build five power projects on the Coosa River in Alabama and Georgia, where federal authorization had been given in 1945 for comprehensive

federal development that had never been started.

The power company would finance the entire venture at its own expense and assure comprehensive development of the river under terms of a Federal Power Commission license yet to be granted. The "partnership" feature enters only in this respect: the bill says that if Congress should later adopt a policy of reimbursing private interests for flood control and river navigation improvements, then this utility could collect for its investment in these features of the five dams.

The bill was sponsored not by the administration or its spokesmen in Congress, but by Democratic Sens. Lister Hill and John Sparkman, with whom Morse is usually allied on the various issues before the Senate.

When it came up, Morse left the chamber. It was passed. He returned.

Did he oppose it in the committee as he had bucked Cougar? Senator Cordon wanted to know that too, apparently, when he asked Chairman Bush during debate on the Coosa bill whether the vote in committee had been unanimous.

Bush said he understood one vote against it had been cast, but this was not recorded so it could not be checked. A committee staff member reported that Morse had cast a vote of opposition.

But Bush told Cordon on the floor: "I do not think a record vote was taken in committee, because the opposition was confined to one vote. I thought that that vote had been changed in the last analysis, but I cannot say positively that it was."

Safe Landing Believed Made

LOS ANGELES (UP)—Two California fliers, whose flying boat was reported forced down in Guatemala on a flight from Mexico to Bogota, today were believed to have landed safely on a Guatemalan lake, according to word received here.

The fliers were identified as Capt. Lee Crutcher, 46, Los Angeles, the pilot, and his son-in-law, Douglas McLean, San Lorenzo, Calif., the co-pilot.

Crutcher's mother, Mrs. Lee W. Crutcher Sr., a resident of nearby Pasadena, said the safe landing was disclosed in a cablegram from Crutcher's wife, Helen, in Buena Ventura, Columbia.

The flying boat, a Navy PBV, recently was purchased in the United States by the Columbian Airline Soraco, from which Crutcher's wife apparently received her information of the safe landing.

The two fliers took off from nearby Burbank Tuesday. After a stop at Tapachula, Mexico, the plane then headed for its next stop, San Jose, Costa Rica.

Welcome Mat Out at Prineville

PRINEVILLE—When some 150 members of the Oregon Association of Public Accountants and their families and an expected 2000 amateur geologists arrive here this week for meetings they will be greeted by huge "welcome" signs at the intersection of Third and Main streets, chief business thoroughfares. The sign, a permanent one has been provided by the Merchants' association. A permit has been secured from the state highway department to erect it when visitors are in Prineville in numbers for special meetings.

The accountants will assemble Thursday and end their convention with a banquet Saturday night. With an agate show at the grounds of the Crooked River roundup as a special goal, rock hounds will hold their sessions Saturday and Sunday. Guided tours to semi-precious stone "diggings" will be held on Sunday.

Chou En-Lai Lonely Man

GENEVA (UP)—Communist Chinese Premier Chou En-Lai was a lonely man today.

The departure of British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov and U.S. Undersecretary of State Walter Bedell Smith left Chou without a single major diplomat for conferences.

In addition, new French Premier Pierre Mendes-France postponed his expected trip to Geneva and gave no indication when he will arrive. Eden and Smith were reported to have urged Mendes-France not to rush to Geneva.

Diplomats said an immediate trip might imply that Mendes-France was suing for peace and thus make the Communists all the more unreasonable in their demands.

Some sources suggested Chou was remaining in Geneva to wait for the new French premier's negotiations with Communist Indo-China Vice Premier Pham Van Dong.

The departure of the other diplomats leaves the way open for direct negotiations between the French and Indo-Chinese Communists on a cease fire. Both the Communists and Mendes-France have favored this approach, but the United States opposes it.

American officials always have feared that France's position is too weak in Indo-China for her not to get the worst of any deal she has made alone. By joining the discussions, the United States hoped to strengthen France's bargaining position.
