

Ponderosa Drops First of Season, But Protest Set

Lundgren-Red Sox defeated Bill's Ponderosa 8-1 last night in softball action, in a game protested by Bill's. In the second game, Darst Loggers trimmed V.F.W. 24-1.

Both games were ended in the fifth after the winners had a seven run or better lead.

In the first game the Red Sox hurler, Howard Whitson, set Ponderosa down without a hit, striking out three. The only run for the losers came in the first when Rube Ellis, first man up, walked and came home via a sacrifice and an error.

The Red Sox picked up three runs in the third off two hits, a couple of errors and a couple of passed balls. Joe Fanelle tripled and Rod Hufstader doubled in this inning.

The winners added four more in the fourth off a triple by Bill Plath, single by Vern Wallan, and another triple by Les Hufstader, plus three bases on balls off losing pitcher Chick Lane. One more run in the fifth ended the game, when Bill Plath was on an error and scored on a passed ball. Les Hufstader hit a single and a triple in three trips to lead the Red Sox hitting.

In the second game of the evening, the Darst Loggers bombed the V.F.W. 24-1. Tom Ray of the Loggers had a perfect night at the plate, hitting five for five and scoring four times. Loggers pitcher Marvin Lines held the losers to one hit.

The Loggers picked up five runs in the first, but really got going in the second as they batted around a couple of times and picked up 16 runs before they were through.

The V.F.W. managed to pick up a run in their half of the second, scored by Ron Walker, but that was all. The Loggers picked up one more run in each of the third, fourth, and fifth, and Lines bore down and struck out the last three V.F.W. batters to face him.

Better Working Conditions Sought by Major Leaguers

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UP)—Major league player representatives approved a salary of between \$30,000 and \$35,000 a year for their attorney J. Norman Lewis today while settling forth six more improvements they will ask from club owners at a meeting in New York, July 26.

The player representatives from all 16 clubs held their second meeting with Lewis Monday.

"There were no grievances," said Lewis. "It was a very pleasant meeting."

Six Improvements Asked
But the players did list six improvements which will be presented to the owners.

1. No restrictions on participation in winter league baseball. Only three players from each club may play winter ball at present.

2. Personal negotiation for winter baseball contracts instead of through club officials, as at present.

3. No spring training until March 1.

4. No exhibition games before March 10.

5. One day a week during spring exhibition tours with no game to be played, but merely training.

6. Better set-up on "getaway dates" during the regular season. Teams occasionally play a night game followed by a day game, but Lewis pointed out that the owners were "cooperating as much as possible" to remedy the situation.

Four Annual Meetings
The representatives decided to hold four meetings a year. One will be held the second week in April, another at the All-Star game, one during the World Series and a fourth one during the first week in December.

The players listed their principal sources of player pension fund income as follows, effective after 1956:

1. 60 per cent of gross receipts from gate, radio and television at the All-Star game.

2. 60 per cent of the radio and television receipts at the World Series.

3. Player contributions that now average about \$100,000 a year.

Those present at the meeting were Ralph Kiner of the Cubs who also is the National League representative; Whitey Lockman of the Giants; Carl Erskine of the Dodgers; Robin Roberts of the Phillies; Bob Friend of the Pirates; Warren Spahn of the Braves; Ted Kluszewski of the Reds; Stan Musial of the Cardinals; Allie Reynolds of the Yankees, who also is the American League representative; Bob Feller of the Indians; Sid Hudson of the Red Sox; Bob Young of the Orioles; Feris Fain of the White Sox; Ted Gray of the Tigers; Joe Astroth of the Athletics, and Ed Yost of the Senators.

Low-scoring by contrast was the National league game at Juniper park, where the Elks outdistanced Lundgren's 12-9.

In the American league, Bend Moose came to bat leading 10-2 in the bottom of the third, and before that marathon half-inning was over every player had scored at least once and most of them twice. Total runs for that frame: 25.

Bend Nash got their turn at bat in the top of the fourth, earned no runs, and that was all the ball game.

The Moose got their 25 runs off only seven hits, aided by wobbly opposition fielding. Larry Clark scored five times for the winners, and Terry Rush led them in batting with three for four. Mike Wauque was winning pitcher. Ed Cecil hit two for two for the losers, including a one-run triple in the third.

In the other Little League game, Elks tripped Lundgren's 12-9. Lefty Tommy Wilson and Mike Genna shared mound chores for the Elks and held the losers to five hits while striking out 10 and walking 12. Wilson was winning pitcher.

Outstanding batter of the evening was the Elks' first sacker, George Cleveland, who banged out three singles in three trips to the plate. Lenard Deel of the losers picked up three hits in four official trips.

Hollywood Stars Bounce Beavers By 9 to 2 Count

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—It was either feast or famine in the Pacific Coast League last night, and the two burliest teams in the loop got all the feasting.

The league leading Hollywood Stars wielded baseball bats like knives and forks as they elbowed out the Portland Beavers, 9 to 2. Meanwhile the San Diego Padres, trailing the Stars by only 2 1/2 games, left only the crumbs for Los Angeles as they downed the Angels, 6 to 2.

The famine took place in Sacramento, but new Solon skipper Tony Freitas thrived on it. The Sacramento crew bested the San Francisco Seals, 1 to 0, in a 10-inning affair to hand Freitas a win in his first game as manager. Oakland and Seattle were idle.

No Time Wasted
Hollywood wasted no time after taking its place at the table. The Stars scored two runs in the first frame on singles by Carlos Bernier, Dick Smith and Jack Phillips. Then they jammed five more across in the fourth.

Portland got its teeth into the contest with one run in the sixth, but the Stars let their belt out a notch and added two more tallies in their half of the same frame. The Beavers' final run came across on a double play in the eighth after Eddie Basinski got on an error and Dino Restelli and Fletcher Robbe walked to load the bases.

The San Diego Padres started off like a bunch of old boarding house veterans, too, grabbing three runs in the first inning on walks to Al Federoff and Dick Sisler, followed by singles by Earl Rapp and Harry Elliott.

San Diego added a pair of runs in the third frame, but Max West got a good mouthful for the Angels in the fourth with his ninth homer of the season.

Slowed to Walk
By the bottom of the fourth, the Padres were slowed to a walk, so they added another run on walks to Sisler, Rapp, Dick Faber and Smith. The Angels made it 6-2 in the sixth when Tommy Brown's double scored West, who had singled.

In Sacramento, where nobody was giving anything away, the Solons went all out to hand their new manager a win. Chet Johnson hurled his best game of the year for the Solons, but found himself running nip and tuck with San Francisco's Elmer Singleton going into the last half of the tenth frame. Each man had allowed only four hits.

Then centerfielder Lonnie Attyd did what he hadn't been able to do all season. He banged his first home run of the year over the fence to end Johnson's nine-game losing streak and leave Freitas unbeaten as a Solon manager.

The 45-year old former Solon coach stepped up into the manager spot yesterday, replacing Gene DeSautels, who stepped down from the job "for the best interests of the club."

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Hubbell Turned in Amazing All-Star Feat 20 Years Ago

NEW YORK (UP)—There could be a modern parallel for the unbelievable New York Giants in today's All-Star game.

Just 20 years ago the greatest individual feat in the history of the classic was turned in by a member of the Giants at a time when his team was leading the National League race. King Carl Hubbell set down in order five of the greatest hitters in the American League.

But that was the year the Giants held a lead of 7 1/2 games on Labor Day—and blew the flag to the Cardinals.

Dead Dodgers
They are right up there with a fat lead of five and one-half games now. Everybody seems to think that the Brooklyn Dodgers are dead and from here on it will be a cakewalk for the Giants.

This remains to be seen. But you can't argue with the fact that Hubbell's performance back there two decades ago was the finest in the annals of the dream game.

It has been told often how, as the second All-Star game began in 1934, the lean, lantern-jawed Hubbell gave up a single to Charley Gehringer and walked Heinie Manush. The next man up was the mighty Babe Ruth, to be followed in order by Iron Man Lou Gehrig and burly Jimmy Foss.

"It was quite a spot," the taciturn, gray-haired Hub recalls with a slow grin.

Strikes Out Three
But he struck out Ruth and fanned Gehringer. And then, to prove it wasn't luck, slipped a called third strike past the right-hand hitting Foss.

Going into the second inning, Hubbell struck out Al Simmons and then made it five in a row by getting Joe Cronin, baseball's hardest hitting shortstop, with a twisting screwball. Bill Dickey broke his skin with a single but Hubbell finished off the inning by fanning Lefty Gomez for his sixth strikeout in two innings.

It was a tremendous performance. Yet the fact which is lost in the dusty years of appreciation is that after such an inglorious start the American Leaguers went on to win that game by a score of 7-1.

And that the Giants of 1934, winging along on top just as they are today, that year blew an even bigger lead than they now possess in the National League race.

Victoria got off to a five-run first inning with the help of a three-run homer by Neil Sheridan and downed Lewiston 9-4. It was the third victory in three starts for Victoria and left them at the top of the pack. Bob Drilling picked up the victory for the Tyees.

Unranked in the welters, De Marco scaled down to 141 1/2 pounds to win a fifth-round technical knockout over ninth-ranking lightweight George Araujo of Providence, R.I. at Fenway Park Monday night.

De Marco saved a \$3,500 forfeit by slimming to one pound less than the required 142 1/2 pounds. Araujo weighed in at an even 138.

Patterson hit the deck in the first round Monday night at New York's St. Nicholas Arena but came on to stop Jacques Royer of France, because of brow cuts, at the end of the seventh.

Patterson, scaling 164 1/2 pounds to Royer's 166, had lost a decision in his last previous bout to ex-champion Joey Maxim for his first and only defeat in 15 pro bouts.

At Brooklyn's Eastern Parkway Arena, Troy survived a second-round knockdown and stopped young Tony Anthony of New York at 47 seconds of the fourth round. Troy weighed 161 pounds to Anthony's 157 1/2.

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Dallas Reported After Big League Baseball Club

DALAS, Tex. (UP)—Dallas' campaign to get a Major League baseball team was clamped under a lid of secrecy today, but the wealthy oilman spearheading the drive said it would be pursued "enthusiastically and relentlessly."

Oilman E. E. (Buddy) Fogelson, husband of movie star Greer Garson, imposed the secrecy after talking to Minor League Czar George Trautman yesterday.

"In my opinion, the project to bring Major League baseball to Dallas and Texas became a matter of public knowledge too soon," Fogelson said in a formal statement. "We have placed ourselves in an unfavorable trading position."

"We have created competition, which was otherwise unnecessary, by disclosing our plans."

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
