

# Features of Agreement Disliked, President Says

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Eisenhower said today that the United States "will not use force" to upset the Indochina cease-fire agreement even though it contains "features which we do not like."

But he said an American statement being issued at Geneva would state the U.S. decision that it was not prepared to join in the main conference declaration.

Indochina. The President also said the United States would view any renewal of Communist aggression "as a matter of grave concern."

He said he hesitated to use such words because they have so many different meanings. He said the agreement was not a satisfactory one that the United States likes, but he did not know of any acceptable alternative he could offer.

GENEVA (UP)—France and the Communists signed a cease-fire for Indochina today, with the United States standing coldly aloof on the sidelines.

The agreement successfully climaxed Premier and Foreign Minister Pierre Mendes-France's pledge to end the conflict in 30 days from the time he took office and France rejoiced at the end of the long, bloody and costly conflict.
