Robinson Son Denies Charges

HOLLYWOOD, Calif. (UP)—Edward G. Robinson Jr., 21, as if playing a scene from one of his father's tough guy movies, darkly hinted today that he had been framed on charges of holding up two taxi cabs.

Young Robinson, who has had several scrapes with the law during the past two years, was released from jail Tuesday on \$10,000 bail posted by his father. He bitterly denied the two armed robbery counts against him.

Superior Judge Harold Schweitzer, who fixed bail, released young Robinson on a writ of habeas corpus, returnable Thursday morning in Superior Court. He was charged with armed robbery.

The young aspiring actor was arrested on a street in nearby Westwood earlier Tuesday. With him was N. Peter Dee, 38. Police said Dee was not involved in the robbery but was wanted on a bad check charge.

"All the cabbies are gangling up on me because of last week," protested the son of the cigar-chewing screen gangster. "It's all a mistake...I never even owned a gun."

He referred to his arrest July 9 on charges of disturbing the peace by allegedly banging on the door of

a woman acquaintance and simulating a gun. A taxicab driver called police, claiming the youth failed to pay his fare.

The elder Robinson said he and his wife were "deeply shocked," and "of course I put up the bail."

But cab drivers Michael Plasiack and Harry Chernack were positive that young Robinson was the one who held them up June 25 and July 1. Plasiack said he was slugged over the head and robbed of \$27 while Chernack said he was relieved of \$11.

The actor's son also has been arrested on a drunk charge and on a bad check charge, which was dismissed.

'Spectaculars' Help for Other Shows, He Says

NBC's president supplies the following column in Jack Gaver's vacation absence.

NEW YORK (UP)—With three regularly scheduled series of what we call "spectaculars" coming up on NBC-TV during the 1954-55 season, how are we going to maintain public interest in other shows?

After a few years of "spectaculars", won't they themselves tend to become commonplace?

The answers to these questions, I think, can be found in elaboration of three words—stimulus, excitement and competition.

Briefly, I think it's quite clear that the "spectaculars" will act as a stimulant to the entire NBC-TV program lineup, that the excitement of this new programming is catching, and that, as a result, programming on every night of the week on every network is bound to improve.

Regulars Won't Suffer

Won't regular programming suffer by comparison with the "spectacular" type of show? Just the opposite, regularly scheduled shows will be better than ever. They'll have to be better, due to the highly competitive nature of the business.

Using NBC-TV as an example, during the coming season we have scheduled three regular series of "spectaculars"—90-minute productions that will be seen in both color and black and white and which will use top stars, producers and directors.

Max Liebman will produce two of the series, to be seen every fourth Sunday night and every fourth Saturday night, while Leland Hayward will produce a third series to be seen every fourth Monday night.

Intended as "Peaks" These shows, I am confident, will gain great audience attention and will stand out like peaks in the schedule.

And what about the so-called valleys?

Well, three out of four Mondays we will present in the 8 to 9:30 p.m. "spectacular" time spot two completely new shows that should rival even the "spectaculars" for popularity honors. From 8 to 9, there will be the "Sid Caesar Show", showcasing the varied and wonderful talents of the star of the old "Your Show of Shows."

And from 9 to 9:30, we are scheduling a daring new show called "Medic", produced by Tony Miner, which I am sure will be one of the most talked about programs of the year.

Comics To Fill In

Three out of four Saturdays, we will present in the 9 to 10:30 p.m. "spectacular" time spot three more completely new shows. From 9 to 9:30, Imogene Coca, the other star of the old "Your Show of Shows," will cavort in her own impish way on her own new show, Jimmy Durante and Donald O'Connor will alternate in the 9:30 to 10 period, and in the 10 to 10:30 spot, there will be another new comedy show, as yet unannounced.

And three out of four Sundays, we will schedule the 7:30 to 9 p.m. "spectacular" time spot with "Mr. Peepers," from 7:30 to 8, and the "Comedy Hour" from 8 to 9.

Wins Posted By Incumbents

HELENA, Mont. (UP)—Two incumbent Montana officeholders, Sen. James E. Murray and Rep. Lee Metcalf, emerged today as winners of the Democratic nominations for their posts.

Murray piled up an early lead and kept it through the night to win hands down over his two Democratic opponents for senator.

Metcalf outran his only opposition, Paul Cannon, Butte Merchant, for the Western District congressional post by at least 10,000 votes on the basis of unofficial returns.

Rep. Wesley A. d'Ewart, making a try to step into the upper chamber, thumped Crow Indian Chief Robert Yellowtail on the basis of late unofficial returns by more than 10,000 votes for the Republican senatorial nomination.

In the Second Congressional District, Brig. Gen. Leroy Anderson, commander of the 96th Reserve Infantry Division and a veteran state legislator, won the Democratic nomination over two opponents.

Big timber's Orvin B. Fjare, a Junior Chamber of Commerce leader, took the Eastern District Republican congressional nomination against three opponents.

About 50 per cent of the state's 283,651 registered voters went to the polls after one of the duller campaigns in years.

Appeal of Radar Decision Planned

SPOKANE (UP)—Theodore M. Ryan, Spokane attorney convicted of speeding after being arrested on evidence of a radar tracker, said today he will take his case to the State Supreme Court.

Ryan contends use of radar is illegal because it violates the state law against speed traps. He was fined \$20 in Justice Court and the fine was upheld by the Spokane County Superior Court in May.

State Announces License Change

Some Oregon meat dealers will need a different class of license than they now hold as result of a recent opinion the attorney general's office has given to the state department of agriculture.

Here's the change as result of the opinion: Meat dealers who sell meat in quantity at a price discount based on quantity must now have a wholesale license. This applies whether the sale is to restaurants, hotels, or other meat dealers; under these conditions the license must be a class A one, unless the wholesale business is restricted entirely to poultry and rabbits.

French Officials Set Evacuation Of Hanoi Area

HANOI, Indochina (UP)—French authorities made evacuation plans today for an estimated 500,000 French and anti-Communist Indochinese who must leave the northern part of the country within the next nine months.

The news of the Geneva cease-fire that ended a century of French rule in Northern Indochina came over the radio at breakfast time but there was no panic.

A majority of the population appeared resigned to a new life under red rule.

"Anything is better than war," was the catch phrase heard in the native market places.

Relief at the end of almost eight years of fighting and destruction outweighed the uneasiness of most of the Indochinese. But the French muttered, curses at the Paris government and worried about bankruptcy.

Only anti-Communist Indochinese who cooperated with the French and must leave showed open signs of fear.

Mayor Do Quang of Hanoi told newsmen at least 100,000 of his city's 400,000 inhabitants must abandon their homes quickly or risk reprisals when the Ho Chi Minh government takes over.

It was estimated that 300,000 anti-Communist natives living at the port of Haiphong, and other

parts of Northern Indochina must be evacuated by mid-May.

Exodus Begins
In addition, 251,000 men of the French Expeditionary Corps must be removed and Viet Nam national soldiers either ferried southward below the 17th parallel or disarmed.

As soon as the main road to Haiphong and the seacoast opened early today, several hundred refugees moved out on buses. Some were well-dressed.

Many were to be flown south directly to prevent overcrowding.

Mayor Giani was bitter about the thousands of Hanoi citizens who must be left behind.
