Legal Battle For Thorne's Estate Begins

CHICAGO (UP)—The socialite mother of Montgomery Ward Thorne touched off a battle today over the young heir's \$1,300,000 estate with a charge that the mother of his girl friend provided him with funds for drugs and liquor.

Wealthy Mrs. Marion Thorne included her charge in a suit filed in Circuit Court minutes after Judge Charles Seidel admitted Thorne's will to probate.

The 20-year-old heir died nine days after making a new will which left half his fortune to Matruen Ragen, 18, and her mother, Aileen Ragen. Miss Ragen was named executrix of the estate.

Mrs. Thorne's suit accused Mrs. Ragen of exercising "domination and undue influence" to promote the romance of her daughter and Thorne.

It said that she gave Thorne money for barbituates, liquor and narcotics and also enough to pay the rent in the small apartment where he was found dead.

After a lengthy inquest a coroner's jury ruled that the mall-order heir died from natural causes.

A second investigation into his death has been opened by Coroner Walter E. McCarron who said he still believes Thorne died "under mysterious circumstances."

Mrs. Thorne's suit charged that Thorne was in a "confused, frightened and weakened mental condition" when he changed his will.

English Princess Marks Birthday Amid New Rumors

LONDON (UP)—Princess Margaret celebrated her 24th birthday today at Balmoral Castle with handsome Colin Tennant as her guest and with another London newspaper speculating on their engagement.

British newspapers splashed the princess' picture across their front pages. The tabloid Daily Sketch kept plugging at the rumor that engagement of the two will be announced at her birthday party.

Lord Beaverbrook's Daily Express, which took the lead in heralding the engagement rumors two weeks ago, printed a birthday portrait of Margaret and maintained that Tennant went picnicking Friday with the princess, Queen Elizabeth, her children and the queen mother.

Another picnic was scheduled for today, if the weather held good. The royal chef, Ronald Aubrey, baked a birthday cake to be served on the heather-swept moors near the castle.

The Sketch printed an exclusive interview with Lady Pamela Glenconner, Tennant's divorced mother, who was quoted as saying, "I have no knowledge of any romance—children of today don't discuss these things with their parents."

"I'm sure that I would have heard by now if there was any truth in this rumor," she was quoted.

"Surely it is more important that Princess Margaret, who is a most charming girl, should have a really lovely birthday party."

That, apparently, was the attitude of the London newspapers in view of the continual denials from palace sources that Margaret's engagement would be announced today or any other day.

But all made it clear that the 27-year old Tennant, heir to a garmy and a chemicals fortune and long-time escort of Margaret, was the only guest at Balmoral Castle outside the royal family.

Panic Flares As Wild Bulls Bolt

UBEDA, Spain (UP)—Panic spread through the Granada countryside today when five fighting bulls escaped from an overturned truck and galloped through farms and villages, challenging all comers.

One bull gored and seriously injured a 62-year-old farmer. Another challenged a tractor, overturned it, and then killed a donkey.

The bulls belonged to the famed breeding farm of fighting bulls, owned by Carlos Nunez.

Congress Blocks Cougar Dam Bill

WASHINGTON (UP)—A bill to authorize "partnership" development of the Cougar Dam site near Eugene, Ore., was blocked short of final passage last night as the regular congressional session ended.

The bill proposed federal financing of the flood control costs of the project, on the south fork of the McKenzie River, with the city of Eugene paying for power development costs. The city's electric board would have controlled distribution of power produced.

The bill was introduced by Rep. Haris Ellsworth (R-Ore) and won House approval. It was supported by Sen. Guy Cordon (R-Ore) but opposed by Sen. Wayne Morse (Ind-Ore) and a final attempt to get unanimous consent for its passage last night was defeated.

Mystery Melody Program Again Returns to Air

NEW YORK (UP)—Remember when a frequent opening gambit to a conversation was "Have you figured out what the new mystery melody is?"

Now you can dust it off and use it again. "Stop The Music" is back on the air.

The Columbia Broadcasting System put the once sensational musical guessing game back on radio Tuesday night and will air it from 8:30 to 9:30 EDT each Tuesday.

A half-hour TV version, beginning at 10:30 p.m., will tee off on the ABC network Sept. 7 for weekly exposure.

"Stop The Music" is the show that, theoretically, keeps a person home by the radio in the hope that he will be one of the few among the country's millions who is telephoned from the New York studio and given a chance to win fabulous prizes by guessing the title of a "mystery melody."

Important Change
There has been one important change from the original version which went on radio in the spring of 1948 and was taken off in the spring of 1952. The TV version was on for three seasons.

The big interest in the original setup was the multitude of merchandise prizes. There were dozens of items and their total value frequently was as high as \$30,000. Now, the prizes are U.S. savings bonds—\$50 for identification of each popular song and not less than \$1,000 for the "mystery melody." For each week that there is no grand prize winner, the jackpot is increased by \$500.

Format The Same
Louis Melamed, producer and director of the CBS program, said there was little change in the program format. Bill Cullen is the emcee, Jill Corey and Jack Haskell are the vocalists and Ray Bloch is the musical director.

"We are having one celebrity guest a week," Melamed said, "which was not true of the old show. And, incidentally, their performances may be interrupted now and then for the phone calls just as are the songs of the vocalists."

"There is a possibility that the radio show will expand to an hour and a half within a few weeks, starting at 9 instead of 9:30."

Same Mystery Man
Those difficult "mystery melodies," drawn from obscure sources, are selected for the new radio and TV shows by a musicologist named Alex Kramer, who performed the same function for "Stop The Music" previously.

"And he's really mysterious about his work," Melamed commented. "The musicians are not even told what the tunes are."

The TV version on ABC will be slightly different. For one thing, the "mystery melody" will be changed weekly whether or not it is identified. There also will be considerable studio audience participation in addition to the long distance phone calls to enhance the program's eye appeal.

And the video program is touted as making TV and advertising history—the sponsor will be a brassiere firm (Exquisite Form) using live models. A TV first.

That ought to stop the music!

Five Chinese Groups Blast Red Regime

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Leaders of five Chinese political groups have issued a "manifesto" blasting the Communists in China and the Chiang Kai-Shek government on Formosa and calling on "all Chinese who love freedom" to form a "Free China movement."

The manifesto was signed yesterday by Gen. Li Tsung-Jen, former president of China and bitter opponent of Chiang, and four other Chinatown leaders.

Gen. Li spoke here earlier this week under police guard after an anonymous circular called for his assassination. He served under the Nationalist leader before the Communists drove him from the China mainland.

The manifesto charged the Communists in China "have served alien interests in blind obedience to Soviet Russia." It condemned the Reds for attempting to "substitute the foreign ideology of Marx and Lenin in place of China's ancient culture."

The two page document stated "millions of people have perished in liquidation campaigns unparalleled in the history of man. The record of Communist persecution is almost unbelievable."

At the same time, the manifesto charged, "Chiang Kai-Shek's regime, secure in its Formosa refuge, seems unmoved and ignores its responsibility to the suffering people on the mainland."

The paper asked "all anti-Communist political parties and groups in China as well as patriots without political affiliation" to join "the Free China movement."

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Formosans Speed Barge Building

TAIPEH, Formosa, (UP)—Nationalist China was reported today to be speeding the construction of 200 assault landing craft for an attack on Communist-held China, using parts shipped from the United States.

President Eisenhower announced that 100 craft had been contracted for in Formosa, but local press reports today said sufficient parts had been shipped her to build 200 and that several shipyards were constructing the vessels.

The reports followed declarations by Nationalist leaders that an invasion of the China mainland by Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek was nearing. Foreign observers said a lack of landing ships and American support had prevented such an attack.

Nationalist circles said these deficiencies were being overcome and observers believed Chiang's forces were being beefed up to a level beyond that required for defense alone.
