

Maglie Twirls Giants To World Series Spot

The Giants play the Dodgers to day with aching heads and light hearts because Sal (The Barber) Maglie already has assured them of a World Series date next Wednesday with the Cleveland Indians.

The Giants clinched the National League pennant Monday night and touched off showers of champagne in their clubhouse by whipping Brooklyn, 7-1. It was fitting that it was Maglie who squashed Brooklyn's faint hopes, officially ending the Dodgers' two-year reign as National League champions by limiting them to five hits in their own backyard.

For 37-year old Sal always has been tough for the Dodgers, even when they were kings of the league. His lifetime record against Brooklyn stands at 22 victories against eight losses.

One Loss At Brooklyn

He has lost only once at Ebbets Field. He dropped a 9-1 decision last July 26 at Brooklyn and was chased in another start there Aug. 13.

But Monday night, he was his old Dodger-taming self, getting better as the game went along. He climaxed his 11th victory at Ebbets Field by retiring 12 of the last 13 men he faced.

His catcher, Wes Westrum, said Maglie "pitched as good the last six innings as he's ever pitched. He wasn't so hot in the first three, but he suddenly got sharp in the fourth and he kept getting better."

Maglie's 14th 1954 victory put New York 6½ games ahead of the Dodgers, who have only five remaining games.

Willie Mays, Hank Thompson and Monte Irvin backed Maglie's pitching with clutch hitting. They collected eight of New York's 14 hits and accounted for five of the seven runs.

Mays Bats In No. 1

A Mays single scored Whitely Lockman in the first inning and Thompson followed with a single that scored Al Dark with what proved the winning run. Carl Erskine, Dodger right-hander who suffered his 14th defeat, was on the short end of a 2-1 score in the sixth when the Giants sewed it up by scoring twice on Don Mueller's single plus doubles by Thompson and Irvin.

Mays topped off the flag-clinching by getting three hits in five official times at bat to take over the league batting lead with a .344 average. Brooklyn's Duke Snider went hitless in three official tries, slipping to .340.

Cleveland ran its latest winning streak to 11 straight by defeating the Chicago White Sox, 7-4. Cleveland now has 109 victories, one shy of the American League record set by the 1927 Yankees. Bob Feller boosted his record to 19-3, helped by Larry Doby's three-run homer, but needed help from Hal Newhouser and Ray Narleski.

Nats Edge Yanks, 3-2

The Washington Senators edged the Yankees, 3-2, with an unearned run in the ninth inning and the Detroit Tigers defeated the Baltimore Orioles, 4-3, in other American League night action. Ted Williams' 28th homer and Tom Brewer's four-hit pitching led the Boston Red Sox to a 5-2 afternoon victory over the Philadelphia Athletics.

The only other National League games were day contests. The St. Louis Cardinals scored five times in the 10th for a 7-2 victory over the Chicago Cubs and the Milwaukee Redjacks, winning 6-2 and then losing, 3-1. Warren Spahn of the Braves joined a select circle when he won the first game to become the first left-hander in modern National League history to post six 20-victory seasons.

Christy Mathewson, Grover Alexander and Mordcai Brown—all right-handers—are the only other NL pitchers in modern baseball to win 20 games six or more seasons.

Upsets Mark Monday Night Ring Wars

NEW YORK (UP)—Two stunning welterweight upsets in widely televised fights left one manager believing about a "sucker punch" today and another praising his fighter as "a coming champion."

Luther Rawlings of Chicago, a 12-5 underdog, stopped Hawaii's Frankie Fernandez in the second round of their bout Monday night at St. Nicholas Arena, while newcomer Hector Constance of Trinidad, B.W.I., laughed off the 3-1 odds against him and produced a 10-round split decision over Chico Varona of Cuba at Brooklyn's Eastern Parkway Arena.

Rawlings' surprise TKO set off a mild ruckus when Referee Abe Simon stopped the bout at 2:29 of the second to save Fernandez from further punishment. The Honolulu veteran, ranked 10th in the division, ran into a barrage of punches shortly after the start of the second round and was sprawled on the ropes when the fight was halted.

However, no knockdowns were scored in the short-lived bout and Fernandez' manager, Sparky Rudolph, objected strenuously to Simon's action.

Rudolph maintained that Simon kept yelling at Fernandez to "stop back and stop hitting on the break," and when Frankie complied he caught a "sucker punch." Fernandez corroborated his manager's statement, adding that the "sucker punch" was a left hook that took him by surprise.

Constance took the Varona fight with only five days notice subbing for top-ranked Del Flanagan of St. Paul. But he impressed fans with his style, dazzling combinations and overall ring generalship.

Bees Cut Back Honey Production

SALEM (UP)—The honey crop in the Ashland, Klamath and Lakeview areas of Oregon is down at least 25 per cent from last year, A. Burr Black, State Department of Agriculture apiary supervisor, said today after an inspection tour of the southern Oregon sector.

Black said the number of bees in the area is about the same. Fewer bees were brought in from California this year but this was offset by an increase in Oregon bees.



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
