Student Group From Formosa Docks in U.S.

PORTLAND, Ore. (UP)—The ship Hai Fei flying the Chinese Nationalist flag docked here yesterday from Formosa with 33 Chinese students aboard bound for a year of graduate study in the United States.

All of the students were born and raised on the Chinese mainland and moved to Formosa before the Communists gained control of the country. They are graduates of leading Formosan institutions.

Six of the students will go to New York State schools, three to Kansas, two to Illinois, several to the University of Minnesota and others singly to various states.

Star Collapses In New York

NEW YORK (UP)—Actress Gene Tierney was reported today to have collapsed from a serious virus infection. She has cancelled plans for her television debut here next Sunday.

Miss Tierney had been scheduled to appear in "Nora," an adaptation of Henrik Ibsen's "Doll House," on the General Electric theater show carried by the Columbia Broadcasting System. She will be replaced in the play by Phyllis Thaxter.

A close family friend of Miss Tierney said the actress was stricken last week and has been under a doctor's care. But she ridiculed reports that the film star's collapse was the result of a "broken romance" with wealthy Moslem Prince Aly Khan.

Land Use Rules Receiving Study By County Board

The county planning commission, organized this July, continued to feel its way at its meeting last night by exploring existing land use regulations enforced in rural areas by the U. S. Forest Service and the Tri-County Department of health.

Ralph Crawford, supervisor of the Deschutes National forest, outlined land use policies within the forest, pointing out that in planning development of the region some area is set aside for recreation and camp-site use.

Regulations covering the disposal of garbage within the county were reviewed by Albert Westfall, sanitarian for the Tri-County Health department.

The commission, since its first session, has been gathering data on existing regulations and on particular eye-sores within the county. Of particular concern, it has been indicated by commission members, is land use along the county and state highways.

The commission has expressed interest in working out a zoning pattern for land adjacent to highways, providing voters empower county officials to make such regulations at the general election, Nov. 2.

Under state law, a county court must gain voter approval to an empowering act authorizing the enactment of zoning. Such a proposal is currently being prepared for inclusion on the general election ballot.

The planning commission acts as an advisory board to the county court, which holds the legislative powers.

"DAM" IS A SWEAR WORD To the Republicans

President Eisenhower must be congratulated for his courage in coming to Oregon to dedicate McNary Dam—a dam which is the symbol of a federal river development program that the Eisenhower administration, thru McKay and his cohorts, are doing their very best to wreck.

Many people will wonder why the Republicans are holding a celebration at a dam fostered, started, and practically completed by a Democratic administration.

For the past 19 months, Eisenhower administration spokesmen in Eastern Oregon—McKay and Coon—have been preaching for "partnership" dams, but people of the Northwest now know that it was a label for an empty box. "Partnership" has brought no new power projects—only confusion, disillusionment, and prospects for a severe power shortage. "Partnership" means the end of dams like McNary.

No amount of political smoke-screen can obscure the fact that McNary is NOT a phony "partnership" dam, but a sound federal, multi-purpose project.

People of Eastern Oregon will be interested in what the President has to say. Will he make a political pitch for the so-called "partnership" to pull Coon and Cordon off the hook or will he announce that McNary Dam is a cornerstone of one of the soundest federal programs for regional development and for national security ever conceived, or will he admit to the truth of the prediction made at Hungry Horse Dam in 1951, "Look closely at this dam. If the Republicans get in, it will be the last one you will see."

It's high time that we had representation in Washington to fight for more McNary Dams to bring the power and the payroll we need so badly in Eastern Oregon. I pledge myself to that fight.
