Island Attacked By Red Frogmen

Communist Chinese frogmen today carried out their first operations against Chiang Kai-shek's Nationalists in the Tachen Island group 200 miles north of Formosa. First reports from Taipei said one unit went ashore at Hsiaoopi Island a second team tried to land on Pishan Island.

No further information was available on the Hsiaoopi landing but the Nationalists said their sentries turned back the team that tried to go ashore at Pishan, killing one of the frogmen.

Formosa Unafraid
There was little apprehension on Formosa itself. American-trained Gen. Sun Yisun, Chiang's military adviser, said the Nationalist army was strong enough to defend Formosa without U. S. assistance.

Sheppard Jury Now Total 8

CLEVELAND, O. (UP)—An eighth juror to try Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard for the Independence Day murder of his wife was approved quickly today and it appeared the entire group would be seated by tomorrow. Four more jurors remain to be selected.

Mrs. Beatrice Orenstein, a plump middle-aged housewife from suburban East Cleveland, took a place in the jury box after brief questioning by defense attorneys.

Mrs. Orenstein, mother of a 15-year old girl and 10-year old boy, said she would not be influenced by the "particular violence" of the murder. She said she would base her decision on "truth instead of influence."

Defense attorneys said yesterday that the jury would not be a "fair and impartial group."

Disappointed, So He Aids Demos

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (UP)—A former Republican state treasurer, disappointed by the Eisenhower administration, met with Democratic leaders today to "do everything in my power" for a Democratic victory in the Nov. 2 election.

William L. Fortune, state treasurer in 1950 and a GOP candidate for lieutenant governor in 1952, offered his services to the Democrats in a letter yesterday.

Fortune said Mr. Eisenhower was a "legislative prisoner of a small group of people" which was not acting in the best interests of the nation.

Exchange Dispute

Seoul: Gen. John E. Hull was reported to have been "very firm" in a showdown meeting

with Korean President Syngman Rhee in a dispute over currency exchange. Hull was holding out for an exchange rate of 254 Korean hwan (won) for one dollar, while Rhee was seeking a 180

hwan to \$1 ratio. Tehran: Iran's lower house of Parliament, the Majlis, overwhelmingly ratified an agreement that will permit Iran's oil to flow freely on the world market.

London: British tugmen respectfully postponed their strike vote long enough to permit Queen Mother Elizabeth to sail for America from Southampton aboard the Cunard liner Queen Elizabeth.

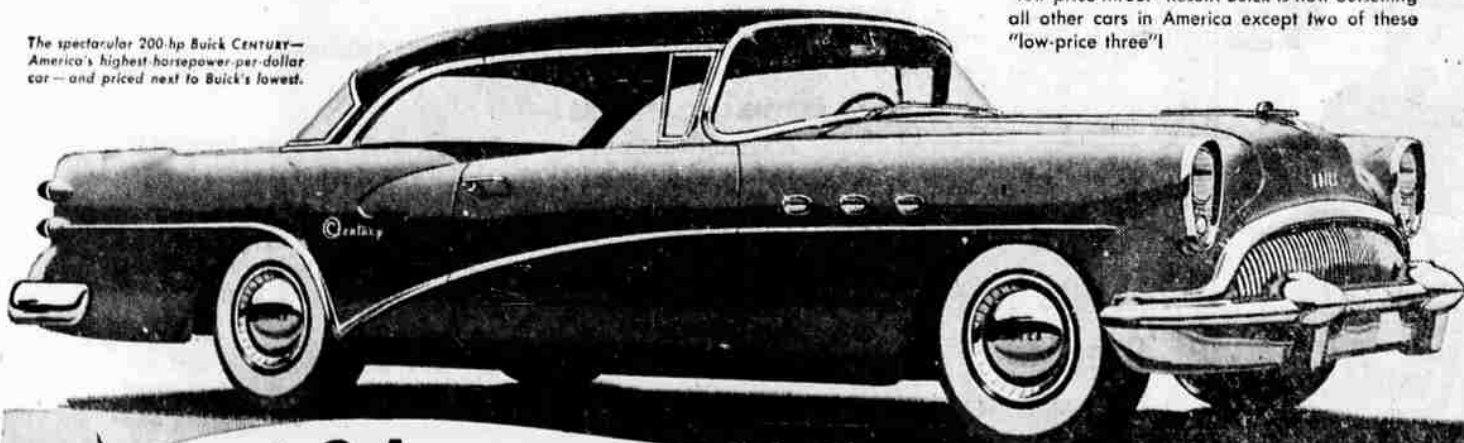

EASY BUTTERMILK ROLLS

In medium saucepan heat 1 cup buttermilk until lukewarm. Remove from stove. Add 2 tablespoons sugar, 4 tablespoons soft shortening, 1½ teaspoons salt, ¼ teaspoon baking soda, 1 cake or package yeast (compressed or dry). Stir briskly until blended. Add 2½ cups sifted SPERRY DRIFTED SNOW FLOUR. Mix to moderately stiff dough. Turn out on lightly floured board. Knead dough gently for few strokes. Replace in pan. Cover. Let rise 40-45 minutes.
