## Bend's Lively Corpse Cools Heels in Jail



Bend's lively corpse was cooling his heels today in the city jail. Yesterday morning about 8 the police department received a frantic call from a woman in an upstairs office of the Penney's building.

"There's a dead man lying out in the hall!"

True to the Dragnet pattern, the officer receiving the call immediately barked into the microphone of the police radio:

"Car 27, car 27, proceed to Penney's building to investigate report of dead man."

But before the patrol car arrived the "corpse" popped his eyes open and hearing the commotion jumped to his feet and scampered hastily down the stairs to Wall street.

Back this morning, dead to the world, the lively corpse was rejuvenated by a commanding tug at his shoulder by Officer Jack Perry of the local department.

Now in jail to conduct a post-mortem of his death-like slumbers is Ronald Everett Beatty. He was booked for vagrancy.

## Fines Assessed In Justice Court
