Franks of Redmond, past president of the Oregon Federation of Garden clubs, is in charge of arrangements for the meeting. The club authorized purchase of four study books for use in connection with the school.

The visitors saw the drying sheds, where a temperature of 110 degrees loosens the scales of the cones to release the seeds; the cone shaker, where seeds are extracted, and the building in which final processing is done. Seeds are obtained from forest areas in Washington, Oregon and Idaho, and the young trees started from seed are returned to their native habitat for planting, he explained.

**Check Suspect Waives Hearing**

REDMOND — John R. Akin, Portland, suspected of passing at least 10 short checks within Deschutes county, waived preliminary hearing Thursday morning when arraigned in justice court here.

He was bound over to the grand jury by Justice of the Peace Donald J. Ellis. He is being held in county jail in lieu of \$5,000 bail set by the justice.

Akin was arrested in Klamath Falls Tuesday and returned to Deschutes county Wednesday by Sheriff F. C. Sholes and State Patrolman Albert C. Gassner.

His arrest was made by Klamath Falls police on a warrant from Multnomah county, but he will face prosecution in the local circuit court on a complaint issued through the Redmond justice court.

PRINEVILLE—According to figures released by Delbert Wilcox, postmaster, gross revenue from the sale of stamps, 2nd and 3rd class mail, bulk mailing fees and box rents, has increased \$3,556.02 during the calendar year of 1954 over the preceding year.

According to his records, gross sales for 1954 were \$91,119.46 as against \$87,563.44 for 1953.

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
