Prayer Day Proclamation Issued By Gov. Patterson

"Abide in Me" (John 15:4) is the theme for the annual World Day of Prayer, to be observed on the first Friday of Lent, which falls on Feb. 25. It is estimated that 20,000 communities throughout the United States will take part in this observance, Governor Paul L. Patterson pointed out in issuing a proclamation designating the special day.

The governor mentioned that President Eisenhower, by starting each cabinet meeting with a prayer, emphasizes his firm awareness that without God's help there can be no lasting solution to the problems facing mankind. "At the same time, he offers a course of conduct which all public officials may well seek to emulate," the proclamation states.

The governor pointed out that since the founding of this great

land, Christians have prayed fervently for guidance in meeting the needs of the hour. "... Today, as never before, there is an urgent need for prayer as we are faced with ever-increasing problems, and in their solution lies the path to World peace."

The local observance of the day will be held this year at the Methodist church, starting at 2 p.m. Mrs. R. E. Johnson is chairman of the planning committee. National Security Training Program Support Sought

Mrs. Craig Coyner, national security chairman for the local American Legion Auxiliary unit, spoke on behalf of the proposed national security training program at the Auxiliary meeting Wednesday evening at the court house. A bill to put the program into effect (S-2 and HR-1630) is now before Congress, and is supported by all major veterans' organizations.

"We believe that the present system of providing trained men for the defense of our nation is both inadequate and unfair," Mrs. Coyner said. "As long as aggressive communism maintains tremendous armed forces, our American must be prepared to defend its freedom, and the burden of this preparation should be shared equally. We are asking for a program that will assure reserve forces of trained men constantly maintained at the essential strength by the training of new groups of young men each year."

Urging her listeners to write to their congressmen on behalf of the bill, Mrs. Coyner said that when the Korean conflict broke out, the United States had few trained reserves except veterans of World War II, men who had already served their country in war and who had a right to expect that they would not be called upon again in advance of those of younger age. "But trained men were needed in a hurry," she said, "so 900,000 veterans of World War II were called back to combat, while 2,500,000 men of military age, who had never served a day, remained at home."

Mrs. Coyner contended that training should be made available to young Americans at a time when it will interfere least with their normal lives—after graduation from high school—with reserve training continued until they have fulfilled their obligation for the defense of the nation.

Mrs. W. H. Cochran, chairman for the polio benefit luncheon held recently by the auxiliary, expressed thanks to members of the organization and the public who supported the benefit. A check for \$115.70 has been turned over to the polio campaign.

Announcement was made of the open house to be held March 4 at the Deschutes County Public Library with all adults invited to attend.

After the meeting, refreshments were served.
