

JAMESTOWN, Va. — (UP) — Big doings in 1957 will celebrate the 350th anniversary of America's beginnings on this tiny island in the James River where the first permanent English colony in America was founded in 1607.

Federal and Virginia state commissions are collaborating to plan a year-long commemorative program covering the colonial era of American history which began at Jamestown and ended with the Battle of Yorktown.

Drive Underway To Save Famous Texan's House

HUNTSVILLE, Tex. — (UP) — Wigwam, a house that is to Texas what George Washington's Mount Vernon is to the nation as a whole, is beginning to fall apart. A drive is underway to get the legislature to do something about it.

Wigwam was the home of General Sam Houston, first president of the Republic of Texas and its military hero in the war to gain independence from Mexico.

On its porch and under the surrounding trees, the general and statesman made great decisions a century ago. There he entertained his friends, and lived with his family. He conducted his law practice from a nearby log cabin.

After his death, the house changed hands many times. Early in this century, Texans began to recognize it as a possible shrine and it was repaired and renovated. But interest waned, and the house fell into disrepair again. At one time, it was used to house chickens and hogs.

In 1926, interest was revived. The house and the park surrounding it were given a financial boost by the legislature, after urging by many persons.

Tennessee Shrine

At present, the house built by the hero of the battle of San Jacinto needs a new roof and general overhauling. The legislature is being urged to spend money on it before it is too late.

The house and park not far from the Huntsville business section attract thousands of visitors each year. Many of Houston's personal possessions have been kept in a small museum there.

Tennessee, where Houston lived before coming to Texas, is also making efforts to preserve a shrine to him. At Maryville, Tenn., a 160-year-old log schoolhouse where Houston taught was allowed to deteriorate. A Maryville newspaper's campaign to have the school house repaired and kept as a shrine met with good response.

Mrs. William Longone, widow of a former professor at Sam Houston State College in Huntsville, has been serving as director of the home and grounds since 1953. But her efforts alone are not enough.

"It is unthinkable," she said, "that the great state of Texas would leave the home of Sam Houston at the mercy of the world — intended and unloved. Sam Houston's home is not being kept up in a manner worthy of the great patriot, nor in accordance with the pride of Texas."

Red Production Of Planes Lags

WASHINGTON (UP)—Russia has long range jet bombers similar to the U.S. Air Force's B32 and B17 bombers, but informed sources said today that the Soviet production schedule is substantially behind that of the United States.

On May Day last year, the Soviets first displayed their two new types of bombers. One is known as type 39 and is a medium bomber similar to the B47. The other is type 37 comparable in size to the B32 heavy bomber.

But officials do not believe the Russians have built the bombers in great numbers yet.

The Air Force will not say how many wings of B37s it has, but there are several of them in operation now. They are stationed in England and North Africa as well as in the United States. None has been stationed in the Pacific.

The B32 recently went into production. The first of these intercontinental jet heavies is scheduled to go into a strategic air wing some time late this spring.

Air Force Chief of Staff Nathan F. Twining said recently that the Soviet long range air force still consists largely of 1200 TU1 medium bombers similar to our conventional type B32s. Twining said the TU1 is not capable of round-trip sorties against U.S. bases without refueling.

Russia does not have anything comparable to this country's B36 heavy bomber which, the Air Force says, will be replaced entirely by the much faster B32s in 1957.

Bigger Houses Are Forecast

CHICAGO — (UP) — Home owners can look forward to bigger houses for less money.

John M. Neff of the Illinois Institute of Technology predicted that within the next few years great progress will be made in improving structural units to reduce building costs. This will enable buyers to obtain more space for less money.

Neff said that future use of prefabricated brick walls and new lightweight materials would greatly reduce the cost of home building.

He said there will be increasing emphasis on research to determine the fundamental structure of clays and non-metallic minerals and added that knowledge of these materials soon will be equal to that of metals and alloys.
