

School Budget Figures Given

REDMOND—Acceptance of the 1955-56 budget for school district number two was voted by the board and budget board March 14. Figures were released Saturday by principal Hugh Hartman.

The total estimated tax levy for the ensuing fiscal year is set at \$177,563.98, compared to \$173,529.75 for 1954-55. Total estimated expenditures are \$295,851.61, against \$287,530.75 for 1954-55, and total estimated receipts \$140,826.61, compared to \$127,001.00 for 1954-55, leaving \$155,025.36 necessary to balance the budget.

This is less than the \$160,529.75 needed in 1954-55 to balance the budget, but the figure estimated taxes that will not be collected during the fiscal year 1955-56 is \$22,478.63, compared to \$13,000.00 for the current year. This higher estimate of taxes that will probably not be collected is explained in a letter from the district's auditor, Bernard C. Davis of Salem, which notes loss to the district through discounts, adjustments to the rolls and uncollected taxes for the year, and recommends the higher estimate for anticipated tax delinquencies.

A figure of \$179,072.00 is set for cost of instruction for 1955-56, higher than the \$170,592.00 for 1954-55 because of normal increments, and including salary for an additional teacher who may or may not be needed, depending on fall enrollment.

Plant operation is up slightly, maintenance and repairs down several hundred dollars. Fixed charges are \$12,340.23 compared to last year's \$11,969.51, owing to insurance due on steam boiler. The emergency fund was raised from \$5,000 to \$6,000 for 1955-56. Bonds and interest are down this year from \$38,977.50 to \$35,700.00 to offset a larger budget for interest in 1954-55 when interest was due before a tax turn-over. The ratio will not remain at that level in succeeding years, however, Hartman pointed out.

A figure of \$1,400 has been added to the receipts representing interest on serial levy. The estimated cash balance is \$15,000, against \$7,500 for 1954-55 which favorably affects the estimated total receipts and cash balance figure of \$140,826.61.

A figure of \$330 is budgeted for special service, representing the district's share toward salary for a trained psychiatrist to work with all schools in the area if the plan becomes effective.

Millage increase for the ensuing fiscal year is estimated to increase about seven-tenths of a percent, Hartman reports. The district's valuation, since consolidation with Oas City and Plainview, is \$4,401,830, an increase of about \$40,000 over last year.

GM Scholarship Set at U of O

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene — The largest scholarship ever offered through the university has been announced by President O. Meredith Wilson. It is a General Motors scholarship, the only GM higher education award to be given in this state.

It will be offered to a freshman entering the university in the fall of 1955. The young man or woman of outstanding abilities who receives the scholarship may renew the award for the four undergraduate years provided the established high standards are met.

The scholarship is designed to make it possible for talented young people to attend college even with limited financial resources. The award has been established on a flexible base and may be as high as \$2000 annually, depending on the demonstrated need of the individual.
