## School Budget Election Called

**MADRAS**—Asa Eaton, county school superintendent, acting as the secretary of the rural school board, announced today that the election on the levy in excess of the six per cent limitation for the Jefferson county rural school district for the 1955-56 school year, will be held Tuesday, April 19, beginning at 7:30 p.m. Voting will be in the schoolhouses of the school districts which comprise the rural school district. The levy in excess of the six per cent limitation to be voted on is \$13,257.11, a drop of \$1550.81 from the levy of \$14,807.92 for the current year.

The total rural school district levy is \$140,287.60 of which \$127,040.49 is within six per cent limitation, leaving the remainder to be voted on by voters of component districts. Included in the rural school district budget is the levy for the Culver school district, calling for \$59,290.00, a slight decrease from the levy of \$59,411.58 for the current year.

The Culver budget call for total excess levies of \$135,340.75, a drop of \$1039.00 from the total of \$136,380.35 for the current year. Within the Culver system, the general fund outlays in the new budget total \$115,913.55, of which \$43,843.55 is for the high school and \$72,070 is for the elementary school.

The current Culver system budget shows general fund outlays of \$114,965.80, of which \$41,999.95 is for the high school and \$72,965.85 is for the elementary school.
