

Bruins Take Free-Scoring Victory Over Madras 13-10

MADRAS—In a game played on Madras' hard dirt diamond yesterday the Bend Lava Bear baseball squad took a 13-10 victory from the Madras high school nine. The Bruins won on eleven hits and one error compared to eight hits, six errors for the hosts.

Bend jumped to an early lead in the bottom of the first frame as four Bears crossed the plate to score on four hits and a walk.

The Bruins scored four times again in the third while the Buffs forced one in during the same inning to boost the margin to 7-1 in favor of the visiting Bend team.

Scoring and hitting continued at its rapid pace and by the end of the next stanza the board read 12-2 after the Bears had increased their lead by four scores.

The Buffaloes returned during the fifth and sixth innings when they helped five and three runs respectively scamper across the plate to score and bring them within two points of the leading visitors, which was a small margin of difference in this contest. The hosts scored on four hits and three hits at the plate.

The final inning went scoreless and the game ended 13-10 in favor of the Bend high nine.

Neither team was at full strength for the game since the Madras squad withheld the use of its regular men in several positions so they might be in top shape for the weekend's league tilts.

The Bruins attempted to save their usual hurlers for the double-header at Sweet Home next Saturday afternoon, but found it necessary to use both Kevin Midlam and Donny Lennburg in a relief capacity after novice mound man Jim Crowell left the game.

The Ben team was also hindered by the absence of Ralph Tollen and Jerry Copenhaver. Several of the Bruins found themselves in positions that they had never played before with the result that the game was more ragged than usual.

This is the third win for the Bruins in Central Oregon with only one loss to mar their record. For the season the locals have a three and three slate.

After the dinner, at the Sunday stag, golf movies will be shown and a program is planned. The women's stagette is scheduled for April 27, when dinner and games will round out the evening.

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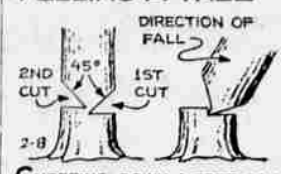

Indians, Braves Get Off to Fast Starts Tuesday

It's a bit early for Cleveland and Milwaukee fans to apply for World Series tickets but the Indians and Braves certainly wasted no time living up to their advance notices as the major league pennant favorites.

Both flashed sound pitching and dangerous long-ball punch in their openers Tuesday to start off on the right foot before huge home-town crowds. A crowd of 50,230 saw the Indians breeze to a 5-1 verdict over the Chicago White Sox while a turnout of 43,619 saw the Braves rally in the eighth inning with the aid of rookie Chuck Tanner's homer to defeat the Cincinnati Redlegs, 4-2.

In other games, the Kansas City Athletics made a successful American League debut with a 6-2 triumph over the Detroit Tigers before a crowd of 32,544 including former President Harry Truman; the Boston Red Sox beat the Baltimore Orioles, 7-1, behind Frank Sullivan's five-hitter and the Chicago Cubs walloped the St. Louis Cardinals, 14-4. New York at Philadelphia, Pittsburgh at Brooklyn and Washington at New York were rained out.

Kiner Booms First

Bob Lemon, a 23-game winner last season, picked up right where he left off by pitching a five-hitter and Ralph Kiner weighed in with his first homer as an American Leaguer to provide the fireworks for the Indians. Lemon struck out three and walked only three as he scored an easy victory over a team that beat him in two of three decisions last season.

Kiner, acquired in a winter deal with the Cubs, struck out on his first two trips to the plate but then walloped a solo homer in the fifth inning. Vic Wertz singled home two runs for the Indians in the first inning and Al Smith hit a two-run homer in the second. All Cleveland's runs were off Virgil Trucks, a 10-game winner in 1954.

At Milwaukee, the fans were treated to even more spectacular heroics.

Ted Kluszewski threatened to wreck the opening day festivities when he blasted a two-run homer, his second round-tripper in as many games, to give the Redlegs a 2-1 lead in the eighth inning. But Tanner, a 25-year-old left-handed hitter who batted .323 for Atlanta last season, promptly tied the score with his pinch homer, tying a major league record.

Fleet Bill Bruton then singled and scored the tie-breaking run when Hank Aaron tripled off the right center field fence. Aaron tallied on Bobby Thomson's sacrifice fly. The victory went to Warren Spahn, while ex-Cardinal Gerry Staley suffered the defeat.

Pinch-Hitters Click

Kansas City made a triumphant entry into the A.L., rallying for three runs in the sixth inning to snap a 2-2 deadlock. Elmer Valo, pinch-hitting for winning pitcher Alex Kellner, drew a walk with the bases filled to force in the tie-breaking run and two more tallies followed on pinch-hitter Don Bollweg's single. Ewell Blackwell hurled the last three innings for the Athletics and was aided by three double plays. Ned Garver was the loser.

Ted Lepcio, who hit only eight homers all last season, hit two and drove in three runs as the Red Sox handed the Orioles their second straight defeat. Sullivan, a 15-game winner last season, did the rest for the Red Sox, limiting Baltimore to five hits and striking out four batters.

Don Fony drove in five runs with a double and a single and Ransom Jackson homered as the Cubs virtually duplicated a 13-4 opening day rout of the Cardinals last year. Paul Minner, winning pitcher in last year's triumph, scattered nine hits Tuesday and also collected three hits. Rookie Ken Boyer homered for the Cardinals.

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Deer Kill Last Season Was Highest Recorded in State

Figures compiled by R. U. Mace, chief big game biologist for the Oregon State Game Commission, show that 112,186 deer were taken in 1954 by the hordes of hunters that took to the Oregon woods. This is the largest number of deer ever recorded as taken from Oregon in one hunting season.

The records also showed that 51.7 of the 215,047 hunters were successful in getting their venison.

County-wise, the records ran very much as in past years. Klamath county led the list with the most hunters and the largest number of deer taken. In this south central county 17,077 hunters bagged 9,998 deer. At the other end of the listings was Multnomah county. Surprisingly enough, this urban county provided 368 hunters with 85 deer.

Percentages gave Wallawa county the lead with 78.6 per cent of the hunters getting their deer and at the other extreme, again Multnomah came through with a 23.2 per cent success ratio, the lowest in the state.

State-wide averages show that slightly over one deer per square mile of territory in the state was taken by the hunters! This provided over 11 million pounds of meat to the tables and food lockers of Oregon.

In Deschutes county, 14,204 hunters were in the woods and they obtained a total of 6,954 deer in the season, or a success percentage of 49.0. In Crook county 12,117 hunters bagged 7,280 deer, with a success average of 60.1 per cent. A total of 2,884 Jefferson county hunters were in the woods in the quest for deer and they bagged 1,684 deer in the 1954 season.

Joey Maxim, Olson to Tangle In S.F. Tonight

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—World middleweight champion Carl (Bobo) Olson and ancient Joey Maxim meet tonight in a 10-round, nationally-televised non-title bout at the Cow Palace with King Bobo favored to pound out his 21st straight triumph hat the expense of the former light-heavyweight ruler.

Latest odds had Olson a 2-1 choice. The fight will be beamed at 10 p.m. EST.

Nothing is materially at stake other than \$10,000 which Maxim has to forfeit if he fails to scale 175 pounds or less at this morning's weigh-in. However, the bout is billed as the "outstanding fight of the year" in IBC publicity blurbs and Co-Promoter Bennie Ford predicts a new gate record for a non-title affair in the state.

The Mark for California was set in 1951 when Joe Louis and Andy Walker grossed \$96,000 at the Cow Palace. Ford sees tonight's gross hitting \$125,000. The fight is blacked out in a 150-mile radius of San Francisco.

This is just another bout for Maxim, who admittedly is over the hill and says he would like to retire in another two years. But Sid Flaherty — Olson's manager — looks on the bout as a big stepping stone for the balding Hawaiian toward the 175 pound crown.

Olson always did hit better as a light-heavyweight and expects to weigh in at about 168. A victory might prompt him to remain in the light-heavyweight division.

Olson's supporters are predicting that their hero may go so far as to knock out Maxim, which would only be the second time Pal Joey has been stretched in 14 years of professional fighting. Maxim says that he will box Olson's ears off with pumping left jabs which may force Bobo plenty of trouble as he tries to get inside to land body punches.

Rainiers Sign Larry Jansen

NEW YORK (UP)—Thirty-four-year-old Larry Jansen, for eight years a star pitcher on the New York Giants, is heading back to his native Pacific Northwest to pitch for the Seattle Rainiers of the Pacific Coast League.

Jansen, whose 120 Giant victories included the famous third game of the 1951 pennant playoff against the Brooklyn Dodgers, was released by the Giants Tuesday night to enable him to sign with Seattle.

Jansen, a native of Forest Grove, Ore., had a record of 21-5 in his rookie year with the Giants in 1947 and won at least 15 games for each of the next four years. In 1951, he had a 23-11 mark.

Jansen appeared in only 13 games, pitching 41 innings, last season before becoming a coach on July 12.

Kluszewski Gets Home Run No. 2

MILWAUKEE (UP)—Ted Kluszewski is wasting no time advising one and all that he wants to retain the major leagues' home run crown which he won in 1954 with 49 round trippers.

The Cincinnati Redlegs' big first-baseman hit his second in as many games Tuesday although his team bowed to the Milwaukee Braves, 4-2.

Kluszewski didn't hit his second home run last season until the Redlegs' 12th game of the year on April 25.
